



Plans to improve the village street scene

Suggestions have been made at recent council meetings that both residents and visitors would find Hurstpierpoint more attractive if they were clearer indicators to the built-up area, past the main thorough fares, into the High Street. These indicators would demonstrate that the village is cared for and that the local community takes pride in its environment.

A number of ways of achieving these were suggested by the Strategic Working Group, however it was decided that these would be mainly based on visual indicators, such as signs and floral displays.

As a premise to further schemes, such as tree or floral planting in Sayers Common, entrance 'gateways' to Hurstpierpoint and Sayers Common and replacement of the bus shelter at the Village Garden in Hurstpierpoint will be part of the project.

Paul Mayne, assistant clerk at the Parish Council commented: "We are planning to install some flower baskets on poles along the High Street in Hurstpierpoint and some flower beds at Fairfield Crescent, Iden Hurst and College Lane. This is part of the Council's work to improve the appearance of our village and we hope to have them in place by the Spring."

Young people scoop award at London ceremony

A group of local young people have been the recipients of an award at a glittering ceremony in London's Leicester Square recently.

Five members of the Youth Catholic Council, which is part of the work of St Edwards the Confessor, Keymer and St Luke's Church in Hurstpierpoint, collected the Cardinal Hume Award - given for 'living out the option for the poor'.

The YCC chose their charity to focus on as Off The Fence in Brighton and their Project Antifreeze. Together they organised a number of fundraising events including a 'Big Sleep Out' and winter collections. They also hosted a Youth Mass, where the readings and songs linked to their views on poverty and were presented in a less traditional way.

The London event was hosted by charity Million Minutes, in partnership with St Mary's University, Twickenham.

St Luke's priest Father Trevor Welland said: "This is a fantastic achievement by some of your young people in the parish and at St Paul's Catholic College. They have taken this idea of raising awareness about the issues that can affect the homeless and challenged us all to participate in some very practical ways of doing something about this very visible social issue. In doing this, these young people are showing us ways of living out the Gospel of Justice in our little part of Sussex."



Join in with Cycling Without Age

If you're wanting to help others in 2018 then I'd really appreciate some assistance setting up Cycling Without Age Hurst & Hassocks, to give local elderly residents the opportunity to feel the wind in their hair.

Cycling Without Age (CWA) is a fantastic global movement which gives free trishaw rides (see picture) to elderly people who are no longer able to cycle themselves. It gets older people out in the fresh air to explore their local area and share stories with pilots (volunteers doing the cycling). The joy it brings is quite incredible, especially to those who spend a lot of time inside and on their own. Please visit the CWA website and watch some videos for more details at:

I met Ole Kassow, the inspiration behind this movement, and just thought it was such a brilliant idea that I needed to get involved to benefit older people in Hurst and Hassocks. So I applied and was accepted as a CWA Affiliate and I'm now looking forward to hopefully enabling lots of intergenerational friendships.

CWA began in 2012 and there are now over 450+ chapters around the world, including ones in Brighton, Eastbourne and Arun District, and over 50,000 elderly people have had rides.

To make CWA a reality for our elderly residents what I'm looking for initially is help with fundraising as we'll need to raise money to buy our trishaw, get it insured etc. Anyone with experience with fundraising and crowd-funding, social media and project management systems (CWA use Podio) please step forward. There are lots of resources available to us and other CWA chapters are happy to share their experiences. I've already received some great advice from Duncan, who set up the Brighton chapter, which has successfully raised funds for two trishaws.

Once we've sorted out the funding then we'll be looking for volunteers to be trained up as pilots. If you're not the fittest cyclist that's OK as the trishaw is an electric bike.

If you're into cycling or just want to give something back and be involved in something really positive then it would be great to hear from you. And also if you are a care home or group already working with the elderly it would be wonderful to hear from you too and see how we might work together.



Sharing premises with the Village Centre, the public library is situated conveniently close to town and receives around 34,000 visits a year, but less than half of the village's population are members. So we'd like to remind you of all the things we have to offer - and see if we can tempt you to join us in 2018.

At Hurst Library we have a good range of fiction, popular non-fiction, large print, audio books, dvds, and children's books. We move items around the county to refresh the stock regularly and if we don't have the book you want you can request books and they will be delivered to Hurst for you to collect. In the year 2016/17 we loaned 35,142 items and customers placed 1,181 reservations, so the staff are kept busy!

Anyone who lives, works, or studies in West Sussex can join the library and it's free. You can borrow 20 items – we issue books for three weeks at a time and you can renew in person, online, or via our library app. You can even sign up for an email reminder that will let you know when you have three days left on your loans, so library fines can be a thing of the past.

The opening times at Hurst Library may be inconvenient if you work away, but once you have a library card you can download our e-books, e-audio, and e-magazines, so you can borrow items without visiting the building at all. You can join by visiting the library or use the online form. If you join online you will be given a temporary library card number and can make reservations straight away. You will not be able to borrow items or use online services until you receive your library card, but this will be sent to you in the post.

If you can't make it to the library at all, you can apply to join our 'Home Library Direct' scheme – a DBS checked volunteer will visit you at home and bring you library books. We are currently recruiting volunteers to help with this, so if you are looking for a volunteering

opportunity, please check our website for details of how to apply.

With a library card you can use the library computers for two hours a day and we have a colour printer, a photocopier with scanning capabilities and Wi-Fi, so the library is a great place to work or study. We subscribe to a lot of online resources, most of which may be accessed from home using your library card number, but for some things (like Ancestry, Find My Past or Which?) you will need to use a library PC.

If you do plan to study in the library make sure you don't come in during rhyme time! Every Wednesday morning (10-10.30am) we hold a sing-a-long session for under 5s and it gets a bit lively.....



During the summer we run a Summer Reading Challenge for primary school age children and Hurstpierpoint was praised for having the highest percentage of finishers this year – so thank you to all of our volunteers for supporting us through this busy time! Thanks also to the local schools who support the scheme so enthusiastically and the parents and carers who made library visits over the summer to ensure their children completed the challenge and received a medal.

The library is used as a venue for events during Hurst Festival including a film screening of 'The Battle of the



Somme' in 2016 and a 'Jane Austen and the military' talk in 2017. As part of the festival we host the annual 'Loud Literature' event organised by Belle Amatt, which features local writers.

The Library Service can help you find information too. Our team of information librarians can help you access all the information you need and they can be contacted using an online form (available via the library service website), or library staff can pass your enquiry along.

If you need a 'Blue Badge' you can hand in your application form at the library and library staff can certify your supporting documents, then you can come back to collect your badge when it has been processed.

We have recently added to our collection of Reminiscence Packs and will have an example on display at the library from January – March 2018. These packs are great resources and are not only for people living with dementia, they can be borrowed by anyone and have proved to be popular with care homes, teachers and family carers. Subjects include: Afternoon Tea, Childhood Toys, Football and Games, Gardening, Getting Ready to Dance, High Days and Holidays, Make Do and Mend, Men's Night on the Town, Schooldays, Seaside, Tools and DIY, Transport and World War II.

We recently started a reading group at the library and there are still a couple of spaces left, if you would like to

join us, the next meeting is on Wednesday 10th January (11am – 12 noon) when we will be discussing 'Old Filth' by Jane Gardam.



We currently have a 'Relax with colouring' group every Thursday (2pm-3pm), but this has been slow to take off and may close down, so if you are interested in colouring please come along soon....



Immediately after Christmas is often a time when families evaluate their elderly relatives' needs – having spent a good number of hours in their company. Comments like 'mum doesn't make the trifle quite like she used to' and 'dad seemed to struggle carving the turkey this year' have both been mentioned to me by worried children."

David, who used to work in the IT industry, decided to make a change in career direction after experiencing some good (and not so good) care for his own parents while he was living 200 miles away. "I was adamant that only the highest quality home care services possible would do when it came to entering the home care market myself," he commented. "Having been a worried son on the other side of the table, I knew what level of customer care I had to be able to deliver."

David researched the domiciliary care market widely and visited a number of franchisors to make sure they shared the same ethos. "Everycare ticked all the boxes for me, with its enviable high standards." He started the business, serving Hurstpierpoint and the whole Mid Sussex area, four years ago. David has an office team based in Burgess Hill and employs over 45 carers visiting many of the Mid Sussex villages.

Nestled in the heart of our village, adjacent to the Trinity Road car park, can be found the Hurst Community Charity Shop. It had to be vacated over a year ago to re-home the Co-op, after it had been partially destroyed by a fire, which affected the rear part of the shop and the adjoining pet shop in the High Street. "The pop-up situation was very basic and very chilly during the previous last year's winter months," Co-op staff remembered.

An agreement was eventually reached between our local council and the Co-op management, to enable the Co-op to re-home in the Charity Shop, after some upgrading was done, whilst the necessary work was undertaken in the High Street premises.

"All our stock had to be stored elsewhere," recalls manager Wendy Box, which was no mean feat, as the shop stores the most incredible amount of objects,

anything from clothes to jewellery, haberdashery, toys, books. You name it. Anything but edibles!", she says laughing.

The concept of a Hurst Community Charity Shop goes back to the mid 1990s. "In 1995 the Scouts vacated their charity shop near the roundabout, as they had then reached their fundraising target," says Michael Barnes, who chairs the Trustees. "The shop had been so successful over the years, that it was decided the

Parish Church should take over the premises in order to build up a fund, which would be used for any future development of the facilities at Holy Trinity Church. Right from the beginning it was decided that the funds raised should also be shared with the local community, especially St Lawrence School, as this was being upgraded at the time."

"Thus," he continues, "the Hurst Community Charity Shop started trading on 5th March 1995, with many

of the previous scout-helpers continuing to give their support to the scheme. In March 1996 the rent-free period was over and the premises were let commercially to Columbines. We were not to be daunted, so by May of that year we had taken over the old printing works by the Post Office. It was in a sorry state when we started, so it was all hands on deck to get the place shipshape and ready to open, but sadly we had to close in

the December, as new landlords wanted the space.

"By this time," he adds, "We had raised about £18,000 for the Church Fund and had distributed the same amount to local organizations and individuals thus helping and encouraging them to also achieve their aims; all this had been enabled in just over a year and a half from the shop opening, but, sadly, we had nowhere suitable to continue with our venture. Then, in May 1997, the Parish Council said we could lease the Old Scout



Hut from them, but it was in need of restoration and refurbishment before it could be used. So we shared the costs with the Council in order to get the building ready for opening in January 1998, just one year after we had been forced to close. With a new and bright building, giving good window and interior display areas, our takings have gone from strength to strength."

All this had been achieved with a committee acting under the auspices of Holy Trinity's Parochial Church Council (PCC). In August 1999 the shop was granted Independent Charity status and so 'The Hurst Community Charity' officially came into existence then.

The Hurst Community Charity Shop has been able to continue to help others in the area to reach their goal and at the same time build up a good fund for the church. To date the venture has given or promised to give away over £351,500 to over 85 different organisations and individuals all within our area of Hurstpierpoint, Albourne and Sayers Common.

"None of this could have been done without the dedication of the many people, who voluntarily help the Charity, some in the shop and some behind the scenes and also the many of you who come in to buy what others have freely given," he continues.

On 5th June 2016, the Charity Shop celebrated its 21st anniversary, where several beneficiaries were invited to Holy Trinity Church, and also to celebrate the

80th birthday of our then manageress, Rosslyn Stenning, who had been with the charity since the beginning.

Rosslyn retired as our manager at the Annual General Meeting a few weeks later.



"The Hurst Community Shop functions on an entirely voluntary basis, so if you think you could spare a couple of hours a week to help your local community in this way then please call in; we would love to see you," says Michael Barnes.


Manager Wendy Box is very pleased to be opening again. There will be a special opening ceremony on Thursday 18th January when David Gold and Lesley Manning will officially reopen the building at 10am. "We are delighted to have all new lighting and flooring since the Co-op moved out, as well as a fantastic new notice board fitted for us by the contractors." Wendy would also like to thank all the volunteers for their continued support throughout the past year.

The team will be ready to accept new donations from Monday 15th January, between 9am and 12noon only.

After 18th January, the normal opening times will be 9am-1pm and 2-4pm Monday to Saturday but closed Wednesday afternoon.



The Tenderness of Wolves by Stef Penney

BOOK REVIEW

A thoughtful novel set in Canada in 1867: the snowbound settings make this a perfect winter read and Scots born Stef Penney clearly has first-hand knowledge of cold winters.

The novel begins with the discovery of a body and the disappearance of the main suspect (teenager Francis Ross), but this is not really a crime novel as the identity of the killer is never the main focus for the reader. The unexpected actions taken by the suspected killer's mother are what drive the plot.

British-born Mrs Ross is a quiet woman with no close friends and a determined nature, which is slowly revealed as the plot unfolds. She finds a guide to help her follow her son's tracks, hoping to clear his name, but there are others who are also trying to find him, with less benign intent. Many people are drawn into the search, and their varying reasons for hitting the trail add many layers to the story.

When the book was first published Penney was criticised for not having travelled to Canada to do her research: relying instead on libraries and her imagination - but as she remarked at the time. she didn't visit 1867 either!

Preparing for colder winter weather

An update from Hurstpierpoint & Savers Common Parish Council

Last winter was very mild but we can never be sure what the weather will bring. We work with the other local councils to try and ensure the best arrangements with the limited resources, in dealing with any snow and ice that might come our way.

When necessary, the County Council will grit these main roads:

- Hassocks Road and the High Street to Albourne (B2116)
- Albourne to Sayers Common and the A23 (B2118)
- Cuckfield Road (from the High Street to Goddards Green and A2300)
- Brighton Road (B2117)

In severe conditions the County Council enlist the help of some local contractors and farmers to clear, but not grit, some other minor roads in Hurstpierpoint following heavy snowfall:

• Trinity Road, Western Road, Marchants Road and College Lane.


These have been chosen because of their particular location and where gradients can cause problems. If you live on any of these please try to keep your car off the road, to help the snow clearance.



Wherever possible bulk bags of grit will placed as follows:

- Western Road, in front of the allotments gate,
- Willow Gardens, corner of Willow Way.
- Iden Hurst, corner of Cuckfield Road.
- Marchants Road, corner of Cuckfield Road.
- Charity Shop/Chantry Stables noticeboard,
- Health Centre, Trinity Road, next to footpath/bench,
- Cherrington Close, corner of Highfield Drive.

These are available for nearby residents' use on pavements – but not for private use. Where possible our local maintenance team will be around to help organise their use. You only need to lightly sprinkle the grit – otherwise it is wasteful and adds to water pollution.

1 medium butternut squash, peeled, cubed & roasted

1/2 cup uncooked basmati rice

1-2 tsp olive oil

1 large onion, chopped

3 garlic cloves, finely chopped or minced

1 large red pepper, chopped

Pinch of salt, or to taste

Black pepper

2 tsp ground cumin

¼ tsp paprika

Juice of one small lime

One 15-oz can black beans, drained and rinsed

January is a month when we often want to bring in some healthy meal options, up the exercise and step away from the indulgences of the festive period. This doesn't mean that we need to sacrifice taste or be in any way hungry. Big on flavour, this recipe certainly satisfies not just the taste buds but the appetite too as its full of fibre, protein and delivers a spicy kick to keep us fuller for longer. It is one recipe of many that makes up my January Health Kick plan.

Prep time 25 Minutes, Cook time 50 Minutes



Method

Preheat oven to 180C. Whisk olive oil up with 1 teaspoon of garlic puree, coat the squash cubes and season with pepper. Massage with hands. Once thoroughly coated roast the chopped butternut squash for 45 mins or until tender. Half way through cooking time, stir the squash flipping over the chunks to allow them to brown on all sides.

Cook the basmati rice until al dente, then rinse and leave to drain for a few minutes.

In a large frying pan over medium-low heat, add some oil, the diced onion, and chopped garlic. Sautee for about 10 minutes on a low heat, stirring frequently. Now add in spices and lime juice. Stir thoroughly.

Add chopped red pepper, drained black beans, and

cooked rice and sauté for another 10 mins on a low heat.

When the butternut squash cubes are tender remove from the oven and allow to cool slightly. Add 1.5 cups of the cooked butternut squash to the pan and stir well.

Warm the tortilla wraps flat in the hot oven for a few minutes until they are floppy. Lay flat on plates. Lots of delicious options with different fillers but this one works well: smear the wrap with mashed avocado. Then add bean filling to tortilla along with a little salsa. A drizzle of sour cream plus shredded coriander and spinach works well too. Avoid over-filling as then it's hard to eat.

Leftover rice/bean mixture can be reheated the next day for lunch in a wrap or with a baked potato.


