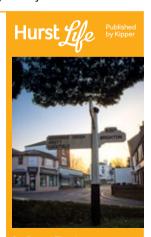

Fundraising Fashion Show

The fashion show is being organised by a group of caring members of the community as they seek to raise money to help Tilly, who lives in Hurstpierpoint with her family but suffers from Pitt Hopkins Syndrome. This condition is a very rare genetic disorder that causes significant learning and physical disabilities. It is thought that only around 200 people in the UK have been formally diagnosed with Pitt Hopkins.

One of the organisers, Gill Blackburn, said: "We are trying to help the family financially as they seek to adapt their home to enable Tilly to have everything she needs on the ground floor. She's such a sweet girl, we just want to do all we can."

The fashion show, which features all local models, is being held on Saturday 25th April and starts at 7.30pm. Tickets are on sale now from The Mint House and Ashley & Thomas. The entry price of £15 includes your first glass of wine. All proceeds from the event will go to Tilly and her family.

Stolen dog reunited at village vets

In September last year Jasper, a one year old whippet, vanished from Leighton Buzzard, Bedfordshire. Incredibly, six months later he has been found right here in Hurstpierpoint.

Jasper was brought into Heath Veterinary Clinic after being found by Wendy Jones. On arrival vet Rhian-Mai Jones immediately scanned him for a microchip. The details of his owner, Michael Ford, popped up and she immediately got in touch to let him know Jasper had been found. Michael and his family were shocked and elated.

Later that evening, local resident Natasha Carr came into the clinic stating she had lost her dog. It transpired that Jasper was indeed the dog she described.

In October last year, Natasha saw Jasper (to her family known as Blue) chained to a caravan in a carpark close to Hurstpierpoint and was immediately concerned due to his malnourished appearance. She handed over a sum of money to the person who appeared to be his owner in order to take him home straightaway.

Natasha commented: "He looked so neglected I had to do something and immediately took him home, it never occurred to me he may have been stolen."

On learning that Jasper had been stolen from Michael and his family, Natasha said goodbye in what was an emotional farewell. Michael added: "We honestly thought that we'd never see Jasper again and cannot thank Wendy and Heath Vets enough. We thought he had been stolen but had no proof, now we know the truth."

Hurst Lanes Introduction 21 miles / 34 km

So you've been watching the weather for months, your bike cowering at the back of the garage, cobwebbed and unloved? Well, it's time for that to change; there's a feeling in the air of a new season with fresh promise. It's time to grease your chain, pump up your tyres and head out into the countryside.

This ride is a relatively short introduction to the beautiful, secret lanes that surround you. Avoiding the main roads, you'll find peace, quiet and a sense of exploration. You can ride the route with any roadworthy bike and you should manage the distance if you're at least moderately fit ... but don't underestimate the steady ascent in the middle! Take a snack and plenty to drink, and remember that you're doing this for fun. Pace yourself, and take a break if you feel you're overdoing it.

From the centre of Hurstpierpoint, head east towards Hassocks. After the sharp left-hand bend at the entrance to New Way Lane, turn left on to College Lane. Be careful as you pass the houses here, as there's very little room for cars. At Hurstpierpoint College, take the left turn on to Chalkers Lane, then the first right on to Danworth Lane and relax; you're now in countryside proper.

You don't need to navigate now for a mile and a half, until you reach the end of the lane. Turn left on to Gatehouse Lane and almost immediately go across the Goddards Green crossroads by the Sportsman Inn. Mind your head as you cycle under the vehicle barrier, and carry on along Bishopstone Lane until you hit the A2300. Cross carefully on to the continuation of Bishopstone Lane, then immediately turn left on to Job's Lane, a hidden back-way parallel to the A-road. After two-thirds of a mile, turn right on to Stairbridge Lane and continue north for two and a half miles, in the process crossing the A272 onto Buncton Lane. You should detect a change in the landscape; you're seeing the same unremarkable but charming Sussex fields but the road has started to head upwards.

At the end of the lane, turn left on to Broxmead Lane, and cross above the roaring A23. Turn right on to the old London Road and keep climbing until you reach the roundabout by the Esso petrol station. Turn left here on to Jeremy's Lane and you're immediately surrounded by dappled woodland. Enjoy glimpses of the Downs in the



distance on your left and within half a mile you'll be able to congratulate yourself on having reached the highest point of the ride.

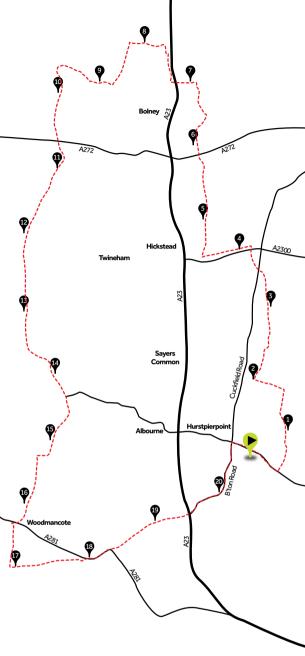
At the end of Jeremy's Lane, turn left on to Colwood Lane and drop down the hill, turning right on to Cross Colwood Lane at the end. Leave some energy in your legs for a short but stiff climb up to the end of the lane. where you'll turn left on to Spronkett's Lane. It's blissfully downhill now, crossing the A272 on to Wineham Lane.

Keep on Wineham Lane for three miles until the end, then turn left on to the B2116 and take the next right on to Blackstone Lane, signposted for Blackstone. Enjoy riding through the small village and keep on to the end of the lane at Woodmancote, where you'll turn right on to the A281 and then immediately left on to Bramlands Lane. Bear left after about 100 yards to continue on Bramlands Lane, then at the end of the lane a mile and a half later turn left on to Clappers Lane and immediately right on to the A281.

At the Ginger Fox, bear left on to the B2117, climb gently past Shaves Wood and follow the road back to Hurstpierpoint and home.

The Spring film season at the Village Cinema kicks off with a brilliant, taut and satirical thriller that is destined to become a classic – Nightcrawler (15).

Jake Gyllenhaal shed 30 pounds to become the lean, mean, career hungry anti-hero Lou Bloom.

Lou is looking for a job and will try to talk his way into anything. He is a self-help book junkie and is fluent in all the patter they provide, but it isn't working for him and he's getting desperate.

Then one night he comes across a nasty traffic accident and notices a film crew jostling with emergency crews to grab some footage. Nosily enquiring, he discovers that these are freelance operators who try to find the grimmest events in the underbelly of the city, film them and sell the footage to whichever TV news station will pay the most. Lou decides to muscle into their cut-throat, dangerous world and will do whatever it takes to get a good story, which leads him into dangerous territory.

Gyllenhaal is a revelation, giving an utterly compelling, electric performance as the morally ambivalent Bloom, and he is supported by a terrific, multi-layered performance from Rene Russo as the harassed news editor who is repelled by him but needs the footage he is selling.

The film is an acidly funny and scathing social satire on both the rolling news culture and the self-help literature industry, as well as being a pulse-pounding and highly entertaining thriller.

Many parents choose a career in teaching because it fits in well after you have had children. For Jane Roweth that's exactly when she left! She realised that she wanted to choose the hours she worked so that she didn't miss out on spending time with Molly and Cam.

Jane lives with her husband Malcolm and children in nearby Hassocks and runs Aspire Fitness from a studio in the village.

Jane studied Sports Science at Loughborough University before going travelling in her 20s. Her travels took her around the world doing various things, including teaching watersports in the South of France, trekking on camels in India and working as a fitness instructor at the original Les Mills gym in New Zealand.

On her return to the UK, Jane decided to train as a teacher and completed her PGCE in 1993. More travelling followed, with teaching jobs in various schools in Australia, ski repping in the USA and teaching in London before settling in Sussex and taking a permanent job at Oathall Community College in 1997.

Jane loved the job, that was until she had children of her own. At this point she began to feel torn, and running after school clubs (something she had always really enjoyed) became tough when she knew her children were being looked after by someone else.

So in 2008 Jane completed a Personal Training Diploma, became one of the first qualified kettlebells instructors in Sussex and in early 2009 Aspire Fitness Solutions was born.

"It started with just a poster on a noticeboard in Hassocks and we trained in the park," Jane explained. "I soon realised that I was actually able to make a difference; people were telling me how they'd finally found fitness activities they enjoyed and could stick to." One of the first members of the original running group, Marina Bullivant, has since gained a 'UK Athletics' qualification and is now a running leader with Aspire.

Jane's mantra is being fit for the life you want to lead.

"This means different things for different people. For some it might be being able to play on the floor with the grandchildren, while for others it could be running a half marathon."

Zoe Holmes, from Hurstpierpoint, put it like this: "Before I began training with Jane I was convinced that I would never be able to run, never mind enjoy running. However, my attitude has been transformed as I now realise that anyone can run as long as they take it at their own pace - it's amazing! I still enjoy going for a run and love the fact that it fits in so easily with family life."

Aspire Fitness offers a number of options, including small personal fitness classes and running groups. You can also benefit from semi-private sessions in the studio where there are just one or two people with you. In a semi-private session although you are training with others, everyone is working on their own goals, which have been set with Jane early on. "Those sessions are very supportive and we all seek to encourage each other in the small setting," Jane explained. Traditional one to one training is also available.

Aspire now also includes yoga sessions, which are run by Mali Bowers who was teaching yoga in New York City for three years before moving back to Hurstpierpoint.

Last year Jane was able to reflect as she invited over 100 guests to the Aspire Fitness Solutions 5th Birthday Party. "I'm very proud of what my clients have achieved," she beamed. "Many had previously tried traditional gyms and not been able to stick with it; others believed that they would never be able to change but have proved themselves wrong."

So, one final tip from Jane: Get active with your friends or family every week. It's a social, fun and free extra weekly session!

"It was whilst travelling on a bus in New Zealand, entertaining the other passengers with my guitar. That's when I knew," Chris said, as he told me when he knew he wanted to be a professional musician. Yet somehow his journey led him to become a bestselling children's writer.

Chris Bradford lives in Hurstpierpoint with his wife Sarah and two sons Zach and Leo. Chris is an accomplished author with 23 books in print, sold around the world in 20 languages. He is best known for his Young Samurai series set in 17th Century Japan as Jack Fletcher trains to become a samurai warrior. However, writing fiction wasn't Chris' first dream.

At 22 he left Exeter university with a degree in English Literature under his arm. "But not with any desire to write literature," Chris explains. No, music was his thing, but first he had to get some travel out of his system. He travelled around Africa, the United States, Australia and New Zealand - where he had the 'light bulb moment'.

On his return to the UK Chris turned his thoughts and energies into, in his words, "becoming a rock star"! He studied at the London Music School and soon formed a band with friends – Clearway. "We were a five piece rock band with a bit of funk thrown in," Chris explained. "A kind of cross between Coldplay and The Red Hot Chilli Peppers. They were great years!"

He describes the success of Clearway as 'surviving rather than thriving'. They played to packed clubs and recorded a number of albums, albeit self-funded. The band's highlight was undoubtedly playing at the 21st Celebration of the Commonwealth in front HRH Queen Elizabeth at Kensington Gardens in 2001.

But Chris now had his heart set on becoming a songwriter and, through his carefully planned networking amongst the industry, he was invited to join the comittee

of The British Academy of Songwriters, Composers and Authors (BASCA). Here he represented young songwriters and found himself sitting next to composers who had written for the likes of Cliff Richard, Elton John and Elvis. One of the first ideas he brought to the table at BASCA was for them to produce a book about how to write a definitive hit song. To his surprise they all loved the concept and he was tasked with talking to publishers about the book. To his even greater surprise publishers loved the idea too and it wasn't long before he was offered a deal!

This became a seminal moment in Chris' career as his BASCA colleagues asked him to put the book together. Without any previous experience of writing, he said 'yes' straightaway for one simple reason. Researching for the project would mean he'd get in front of songwriting heavyweights like Guy Chambers and Don Black - this would expand his network of highly connected people and therefore create opportunities for working with them in the future. It was a dream ticket for any budding songwriter.

It is at this point that both the book and the story take a brief pause.

Having signed the book contract, Chris then went abroad on a pre-arranged humanitarian trip to Nicaragua for six months. Working with sustainable development charity Raleigh International, he was part of the team building a school hostel in the town of Achuapa and it was here that he met his wife Sarah, as she worked as translator and project manager for the build. "I've long had the belief that travel is better when taken from a local perspective, so working on the school provided the perfect vehicle with which to see that part of the world. Being able to help that community was an amazing opportunity too. We all learnt so much," Chris told me.

When he returned he moved to High Wycombe, got on with the book project and also began teaching at the Academy of Contemporary Music in Guildford.

The book - Heart & Soul: Revealing the Craft of Songwriting - was published in May 2005 and received much critical acclaim at the time. Indeed Tim Rice said of it: "This book offers a rare glimpse into the mind of the professional songwriter. I highly recommend it."

Chris' book was so successful that he was immediately commissioned to write four more on similar subjects by Sanctuary Publishing.

After an informal chat with a literary agent, he was invited back for a meeting in which Charlie Viney offered to represent him. "Charlie told me he saw potential in me. More so, in many ways, than I even saw in myself at that time."

It was clear to Chris that he wouldn't be able to make a living from writing books about the music business and so was exploring other areas of his life to see what gave him inspiration. "I suddenly realised that there were three strands that ran throughout my life: music, travel and martial arts," Chris explained. "Karate Kid came out when I was 10 and it was so inspirational for me as a child. So I explored the idea of fictional stories based upon real events from ancient Japanese times. When I mentioned it to Charlie, he just said: "Have you told anyone else about this? I hope not. This is gold!"

And so it was there that the idea behind the Young Samurai series was born. Since the age of eight Chris has learnt various martial arts and now it was becoming extremely useful. Chris has developed what he calls 'method writing'. He drew on his own skills and experience to carefully choreograph the fight scenes in the books because he understood exactly how they would play out. In fact, for that first book he spent three weeks in Japan as he researched the areas and history of the 1600s.

After writing and re-writing The Way of the Warrior, Charlie sent the manuscript to a few of his contacts in the publishing industry and told Chris not to expect to hear anything for at least a month. The very next day Puffin called and wanted to talk!

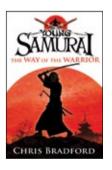
It was around this time that Chris and his wife-tobe moved into Hurstpierpoint. "We originally thought we would look at Lewes, but, when I saw the road sign pointing to Hurstpierpoint, I couldn't resist the unusual name! It was literally love at first sight for me," Chris says. Among other things the pair were struck by how friendly people were here. He loved the idea making a home in a

place where locals said "hello" regardless of whether they know you or not.

Chris signed the deal for the first in his fiction book series on 11th August 2007 and later that same day married Sarah at the Weald & Download Museum near Chichester.

Way of the Warrior was published in 2008 and now has eight Young Samurai titles. This series was followed by Ninja and the more recent Bodyguard books, in which his method writing led him to qualify as a fully fledged bodyguard to get into the role. I caught up with Chris just before he left for Paris on a media launch tour of this latest series.

"I've been lucky enough to travel around the world but Hurstpierpoint is my slice of heaven. It's perfect for me."

Chris loves to walk to the shops and has always been a supporter of the High Street businesses in the village. He tells me he's known locally as 'The Sword Man'. "Does your wife mind?" I ask. Chris smiles and says: "Sarah just laughs at me; she keeps me very grounded!"

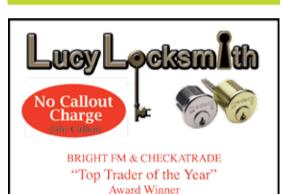

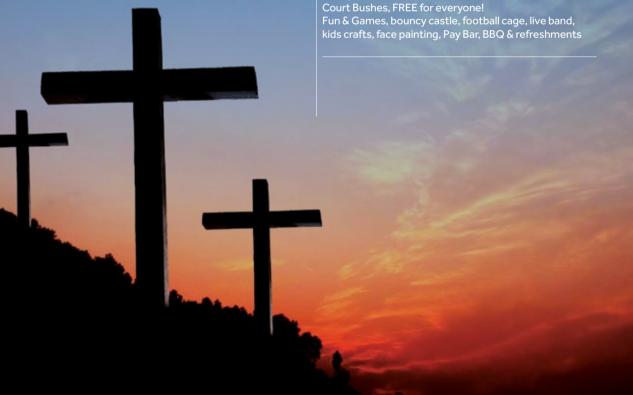

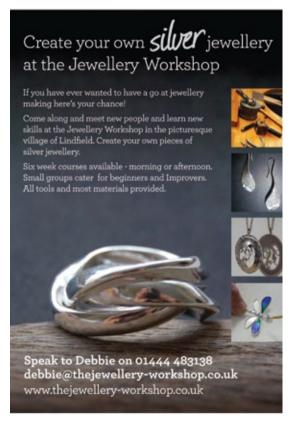

The Miniaturist by Jessie Burton

BOOK REVIEW

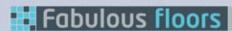
"There is nothing hidden that will not be revealed"... On an autumn day in 1686, 18 year old Petronella (Nella) Oortman knocks at the door of a grand house in the wealthiest quarter of Amsterdam. She has arrived from the country to begin a new life as the wife of illustrious merchant trader Johannes Brandt in what is pretty much an 'arranged marriage'. There is no sign of Johannes and she is met by his sharp-tongued sister Marin, outspoken maid Cornelia and Otto, Johannes' manservant, who was a former slave. Only later does Johannes appear and, as what seemingly appears in consolation for his reluctance to consummate their marriage, presents Nella with an extraordinary wedding gift: a cabinet-sized replica of their home.

Fuelled by humiliation, Nella engages an elusive 'miniaturist' to furnish it. But when the parcels start arriving, exquisite Lilliputian items that somehow mimic, foretell and comment upon the events unfolding in the house, Nella becomes increasingly obsessed with the cryptic messages from the miniaturist, uncertain if she is prophet, guide or spy as her creations mirror the closed world of the Brandt household.

The book unravels at a cracking pace. Nella has only been in Amsterdam four months before the climax of the plot is reached and Burton does well to keep us guessing beyond this point as to whether the miniaturist will be the key to the Brandt household's salvation or the architect of their downfall. The backdrop of Calvinist Amsterdam is a place of fascinating contradictions, a trading city full of canting priests where greed and puritanism sit uneasily together, and it is important to remember these influences as these 17th century characters often display 21st century behaviour. However, the pace and suspense more than make up for this flaw. The Miniaturist is a work of fiction but Petronella Oortman's Cabinet House is on display in The Rijksmuseum, Amsterdam.

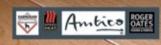
