



With over 20 local artists showcasing a range of contemporary and traditional arts and crafts, the Hurstpierpoint Open Studios will once again be hosting its annual event, welcoming the public to view exhibitions and take a peek inside the artist's workspace. Spread out over two weekends, starting 12th-13th September and concluding 19th-20th September, visitors can expect to take a walk through 'a magical trail of local art' spanning across 18 different venues throughout the village.

Often found in an old garage or the back room of a house, strewn with colour swatches, unfinished canvasses and inspirational artefacts; an artist's workplace can really give people an insight into the creative process and the creative mind. The Open Studios experience offers up a unique opportunity to take a 'behind the scenes tour', whilst you absorb yourself in the plethora of local talent on our doorstep. Folk will not only have the chance to view and purchase art but will be able to meet the artists themselves and even discuss commissioning individual pieces.

Running into its 12th year, the event was first set up by local sculptor and painter Mike Cheetham, also an exhibitor, who was inspired by the Brighton Open Studios. "It was after visiting the Brighton Open Studios that I thought, 'what a good idea for Hurstpierpoint'," explains Mike. "I discovered that many other people shared the same view, so I got a group together, which was initially seven and it's gone from there."

With a growing audience and an impressive artist line up, it's evident that Mike and his band of supporters were indeed on to a good thing. There's going to be a pre-event taster happening 10th August - 7th September, so keep an eye out for some of the artists' work in various shops around the village. I was lucky enough to catch an exclusive glimpse of what's to come and meet some of this year's contributors at the home of veteran HOS exhibitor and event co-organiser Sylvia Thornhill.

"We have designers creating paintings, jewellery, sculptures, photography and much more," explains Sylvia. "There really is something to suit all tastes and budgets - something for everyone as you can see! It's a fabulous event for the community and everyone is welcome."

Most famously known for her sculpture 'children of the fair' (you will definitely know it when you see it!), Sylvia has been a member of the team for over ten years and has been providing the refreshments to hungry visitors en route at her home and studio in Pitt Lane for the past eight of those. With this year as no exception, anyone fortunate enough to stumble upon Sylvia's doorstep will be delighted with the warmest of welcomes and one of the most picturesque settings in Hurstpierpoint – an incredible back drop of Wolstonbury.

She will be joined for the first weekend only by her trusty crew of helpers, who will be dishing out light lunches, bacon rolls, tea and, of course, the obligatory cake. Proceeds from these go to support the work of the local group of West Sussex Association for Disabled People. "We are so lucky to have such a fantastic crew of people working with us," says Sylvia.

"There's a lot of work that goes into it but we have great fun doing it, which is what makes it so special. This year I would like to give special thanks to all of the organisers and the artists' thanks go to Claire Grose and Stephen Mortimer who have worked hard in organising this year's event but are not taking part due to other commitments."

The event, which will again this year mark the opening of the 2015 Hurst Festival, is free to all; donations are very welcome and are also in aid of The West Sussex Association for Disabled People. Posters and flyers giving more information will be on display throughout Hurstpierpoint and surrounding towns and villages or you can visit: www.hurstpierpointopenstudios.co.uk. 

So, after many years of talking about it, the High Street is being transformed this month to include new features such as wider pavements, a new traffic flow system and cycle racks.

The work, which has been researched and commissioned by Hurstpierpoint & Sayers Common Parish Council, will start on Sunday 2nd August when the High Street will be closed to vehicles at both ends. The closure will remain in place until Friday 28th August.

It is important to note that pedestrian access to the High Street shops will remain open throughout the works period.

Parish Clerk Stephen Hoyles commented: "This work has been in the pipeline of the Parish Council since 2007, so it's good to finally be starting the project. The primary reasons for the work to be carried out are that of pedestrian safety and to slow traffic speeds down as they pass through our village. We have been talking to residents over this long period of time and we know people are worried about this in Hurstpierpoint."

One of the major parts of the project is making the very narrow section of pavement on the other side of the road, opposite Nationwide, wider. At some points it could be nearly twice as wide. The extra width is being created by narrowing the road on that stretch and introducing a give way priority system.

Outside Nationwide the pavement area will be dramatically increased and will continue along to West Furlong Lane.

On the south side of the High Street an entirely new pavement is being created outside West Furlong Court,

which will continue up to Mansion House. The existing pavement here will be replaced with new keyblock paving and a nib is also being created in front of the steps of the house.

There will be space allocated for a new loading bay outside The New Inn. This will operate in the mornings and become a short term parking bay thereafter.

Outside the Post Office there will be a new crossing point created, and just further along the street another give way priority will be put in place. This will enable drivers to see all the way down the High Street before proceeding down the single lane.

The puffin crossing will remain in the same place outside Fat Fish.


Further along, in the direction of Hassocks, the existing give way priority will remain in place.

During the works the contractor is hoping to reuse as many of the attractive granite kerb stones as possible.

"We are hoping that the new layout of the High Street," Stephen continued, "will encourage drivers to park in designated spaces which will therefore not obstruct the flow of traffic."

The Parish Council are already in discussion with Mid Sussex District Council about the possibilty of increased frequency of traffic wardens on the High Street to enable those spaces to be more readily used for shoppers 'nipping in' to local shops rather than all day parking.

During the period of the works buses will be diverted via Jane Murray Way in Burgess Hill, so bus users should expect slightly longer journey times. The Parish Council has also just announced that it has put on a special



shuttle bus which links the west of the village to Hassocks. The '33C' is a FREE service running from Willow Way through to Pyecombe and Hassocks, For more details of this service and other bus route diversions see www. hurstpierpoint-pc. org.uk

Drivers travelling from one end of the

village to the other are being asked by the Parish Council to avoid using College Lane and Cuckfield Road, as these are not part of the formal diversion and will become congested very easily.

The contractor will be working on-site from 7.30am until 5pm, Monday to Saturdays during August. For any more information residents can visit the Parish Council website or go into the Parish Office on Trinity Road.



Open for business

Lucy Driver, owner of South Downs Cellars and chairman of Hurst Traders Association, is worried about a drop in footfall during August and commented: "Above all we want to tell the people of the village that the shops in Hurstpierpoint are open for business! Shoppers will still be able to freely move around the High Street - in fact, in many ways, it will be an overall more pleasant experience while there is no traffic on

The traders are working together right up to the last minute to try and make extra efforts to entice shoppers into the High Street during August. Some businesses will be giving special offers and there is even talk of a shop window quiz.

The two village car parks will be fully functional during the work, with 120 spaces at Trinity Road car park and 38 spaces in Brown Twins Road - although both are accessed from the West end of the High Street.

The Parish Council have paid for Hurst Traders Association to get a summer advertising campaign off the ground too, 'Open for business' builds on the fact that the High Street will be unusually calm during August.

In Hurstpierpoint we are very fortunate to enjoy a large number of retailers in the village. At Hurst Life, we asked all the shopkeepers if they would like the opportunity to remind readers why their shop is so great. On the next page follows the respondents. Do take the time to have a look - we think you will be surprised at the variety of shops right here on the doorstep.

Make the most of your summer holidays

The scent of freshly cut grass and barbeques fill the air; cloudless, lazy, hazy days stretch out for what seems like an eternity before us - the summer holidays are finally here. Whether you are emptying your piggy bank or saving the pennies for a rainy day, the summer is full of endless opportunities to suit any kind of budget. Armed with a little imagination and a few good ideas, you can transform any threats of boredom and squabbles into a magical whirlwind of excitement and happy memories.

As well as fun filled days at home, kids will love planning a few special trips out. September will soon be looming, so before the holidays run away with you - sit down together, put pen to paper and come up with a shortlist of fun things to do which everyone can enjoy. Luckily, with lots to do right here on our very doorstep, you don't even have to go far. Here are a few ideas to get you started...

Go to the beach

With the coast almost a stone's throw away, we have the beauty of not having to endure too many 'are we there yets,' – so make the most of it! Splashing in the surf, walks along the promenade, people watching, collecting shells and stones; the seaside has a timeless allure that appeals to kids of all ages.

Brighton & Hove - 10 miles from Hurst

If you like to be in the hustle and bustle, or you have older kids to entertain, then Brighton pier is your best bet. If that doesn't float your boat or you fancy somewhere a little quieter, then West Hove is a better option - if you're lucky, you will even find the odd bit of sand. You can get there by car in around 20 mins, catch the train from Hassocks or jump on the 273 towards Brighton.



Camber Sands, East Sussex - 58 miles from Hurst

If you're up for venturing further afield in search of sandier shores, then Camber Sands is well worth the drive. There are miles of unspoilt, golden sand dunes to explore and if you fancy a bit of culture on top of that, then the medieval town of Rye is a few miles from the beach. You can get there by picking up the A27 towards Eastbourne.



Go swimming

Many of my fondest childhood memories were those spent at our local outdoor swimming pool. It was a place to catch up with old friends, make new ones, perfect dives and practise dance routines; the fun was endless!

Pells Pool, Lewes - 15 miles from Hurst

Pells Pool is the oldest documented freshwater, outdoor, public swimming pool in the UK. There's a paddling pool for younger kids, a tree lined lawn and a snack bar. The queues are infamous so, unless you head down super early, be prepared for a long wait – they operate a one in / one out policy.

If you don't have access to a car, you can catch the train from Hassocks or hop on the 273, where you will find links from Brighton.

The Triangle, Burgess Hill - 2 miles from Hurst

I recently found out that in the summer the Triangle strips off its winter coat to reveal a fully-fledged, heated, outdoor swimming pool!

Go for a picnic

There are few better ways to soak up the summer. To me, picnics are a true celebration of British summertime - a chance to bring people together, share fresh food and eat alfresco from beneath the dappled shade of a willing tree. If you have little ones running around, it can be difficult to keep them in one place for too long, so a spot with a play area or a back garden is perfect.

South Avenue Recreation Ground - Hurst

Home of the famous St Lawrence fair, South Avenue rec ticks all the boxes - a beautiful, tree-lined green, with stunning views of Wolstonbury, plus a play area for both little ones and older children. Situated just behind the High Street, it's conveniently located if you need to top up provisions.

The Millennium Garden - Hurst

This is my most recent discovery in Hurstpierpoint. The garden is part of what was originally the landscaped garden of St George's House. Most of it was sold off for housing but public donations enabled the village to save a piece of the land, which is now run by a trust as a 'wild garden'. It's a real hidden gem, tucked away right at the bottom of Trinity Road, accessed through Trinity Court, which is just off Brown Twins Road – very easy to miss!



Jill Windmill - 3 miles from Hurst

If you fancy something a little more dramatic however, take a short journey over to Jill Windmill in Clayton, where you will find a fully restored, 19th century, working corn mill. The mill is open every Sunday in August between 2-5pm, plus an extra on Bank Holiday Monday between 11am-5pm.

Footpaths run up to the windmills from both Clayton village green and Clayton Pumping Station.

Go on a bike ride

Cycling is great way to get out and explore the hidden paths and dusty tree tunnelled lanes of the villages. If you don't have your own bikes, you can hire some from Hassocks Community Cycle Hire, which is situated directly outside the exit of Hassocks Railway Station (on the southbound side). Whether you do have your own or are borrowing from them, you can pop along and pick up a free cycle route map of the area. See www. hassockscommunitycyclehire.com for more details.



Go for a walk

I have spent many a lazy afternoon ambling around the village, with no real agenda, just seeing where life and my inquisitive toddler takes us. Walks don't always appeal to older children, so entice them with extra activities – build a den in the woods, or take a bug jar and see what creepy crawlies you can take a closer look at. I found a bug jar at Helter Skelter in the High Street.

If you'd rather plan a route before you set off, you can head down to the village centre and pick up a footpath map for £3 from the library or the Parish Council Office, or try these -

Wolstonbury Hill - Hurst

It's definitely one to cross off the list, the panoramic views are breathtaking. Some routes up are quite steep and the terrain is very bumpy at times, so make sure you plan ahead to suite your abilities. I would not recommend taking a buggy, unless you have an all-terrain model and the suitable muscle, we learnt the hard way! Babies and younger toddlers are best in a carrier if you have one. It takes around 20 minutes to reach the summit, depending on how fast you are travelling.

High Street

Take a stroll with an agenda – head down to Gibsons, the High Street grocer and let the kids out pick their favourite fruit and veg. Hampers delicatessen stock some organic nuts, seeds and preservative free organic coconut milk, all perfect for making smoothies; a great activity for everyone. You can even turn your creations into ice lollies! I found some lolly moulds at the Cookshop on the corner of High Street and Cuckfield Road. Or pop into the fantastic Mama Ganoushe café to buy one ready made!

Or just potter!

Remember to leave some time for pottering! It's my favourite pastime of all and gives me the space I need to recharge after busy days. Much of our lives are spent rushing around and kids don't always need all the entertaining we think they do. Wake up with no agenda in mind, try to take the day as it comes by being mindful in the moment, allowing things to unfold naturally.

Sometimes, if we let go of our need to organise and plan every activity, it encourages a raw and natural kind of creativity that we just can't plan. You may be surprised what you discover and what your children come up with themselves. As John Lennon's famous phrase goes, 'life is what happens while you're busy making other plans'.

HEALTHY LIVING

'Get strong! Get active enough to get your heart rate up and stay flexible. Move often and with purpose and enjoy your ability to do so or you'll lose it!'

We all know we need to exercise but how much, how often and how hard seems to vary dependent upon who you ask.

Most of us know that we are not doing enough to keep as fit as we need to be if we want to be able to play with our grandchildren. Remember: 'Life begins at 60'.

So, I thought I'd share my top ten pointers on getting fit for the life you want to lead.

1) 'Use it or lose it' is nearly true. The less we move the harder it becomes, especially as we age. However, 'lose it' is not completely right. People of all ages can get fitter and feel better by simply finding an appropriate form of exercise. The oldest marathon runner at London last year only took up running in his 70cl

- 2) Find something you enjoy. Golf, delivering papers,
- 3) Committing to a regular activity helps build habits. This is essential if you truly want your life to change.
- 4) Look for a supportive community; join a club or become a regular at a friendly fitness class.
- 5) Invest in yourself. Paying for expert advice is hugely worthwhile, ensuring you get the most out of your chosen activity, improving your performance and building your confidence, all of which will make you keener to keep pursuing that activity. Book some sessions with the golf pro, book a yoga retreat or attend a workshop.
- 6) Set a goal and work towards it. This really helps you get in regular sessions and gives you motivation when sometimes the sofa is more appealing. It's also great for explaining to your mother-in-law why you can't have that lovely looking piece of cake. When dieting, peer pressure is one of the biggest causes of failure. Why not enter a running event or take part in the local tennis tournament?

7) Set a regular time as a family or a group of friends to do something active; an early morning bike ride every Saturday morning or a family stomp to the Downs every Sunday afternoon. When others are expecting you to be there you won't let them down.

8) Don't feel activity has to always be lengthy or hard to be worthwhile; blasting your body for an hour at the gym once a week is of no great benefit but a regular evening walk round the block for 20 minutes after

9) Don't think you have to get completely battered to have a great workout, in fact over-training has a negative impact on performance. But similarly, don't panic if you get out of breath!

10) Try to be active in a way that raises your pulse for at least 20 minutes every day.



We launch our Autumn season in September as part of Hurstpierpoint Festival, for which we have programmed something for everyone.

We open up our Festival programme with Richard Linklater's amazing film, Boyhood (15). Boyhood is an absolutely terrific film and is an astonishing achievement in a number of ways. Filmed in stints of a few weeks every year over 12 years, it tells the story of a family, focusing on their young son, who grows from the age of 5 to 18 before our eyes. The film is a work of magic; despite the fragmentary nature of the filming it is beautifully structured, utterly seamless and the performances are superb. Everyone will be swept along and moved by this love letter to life.

We then have a film that will appeal to everyone from the age of ten up - Guardians of the Galaxy (12A). The film is that most welcome of things, a genuinely exciting sci-fi blockbuster movie that doesn't take itself too seriously. Peter Quill, is abducted from Earth by an alien ship as a young boy. We meet him 25 years later working as a hired thief. But when his latest target, a mysterious orb, attracts the attention of an intergalactic villain, Quill finds himself thrown together with a motley crew in a race to save the Universe. Witty, thrilling and filled with fantastic music, this is one of the most surprising blockbusters to come out in the last 12 months.

For families we have Epic (U), an adventure comedy that reveals a fantastical world unlike any other. When a girl finds herself magically transported into a secret universe, she teams up with an elite band of warriors and a crew of comical, larger-than-life figures in the exciting adventure to save their world... and ours.

In addition to the films we have an encore screening of the National Theatre performance of Shakespeare's searing story of political manipulation and revenge Coriolanus (15), with the brilliant Tom Hiddleston in the title role. When an old adversary threatens Rome, the city calls once more on her hero and defender: Coriolanus. But he has enemies at home too. Famine threatens the city, the citizens' hunger swells to an appetite for change, and on returning from the field Coriolanus must confront the march of realpolitik and the voice of an angry people. Fast, witty, intelligent, dynamic, irresistible - Hiddleston is sensational.



By Peter Hampson If you are hosting a party over the summer - why not serve this delicious chilled dessert to your guests?



Ingredients:

400ml double cream
200ml milk
140g toffee popcorn, plus a little to serve
2 gelatine leaves
4 tbsp caramel (Carnation do a ready-made one)
1/4-1/2 tsp flaky sea salt

Method:

- Pour the cream and milk into a pan, add the popcorn and bring to a gentle simmer, pushing the popcorn under the liquid and squashing gently on the bottom of the pan. Bubble for 5 minutes and then remove from the heat, transfer to a pot and chill overnight.
- Strain the popcorn cream back into a clean pan and gently reheat, discarding the remaining bits
 of popcorn. Meanwhile, bloom the gelatine leaves in cold water to soften for 3-5 mins. When the
 popcorn cream is steaming and the gelatine is soft, remove it from the water and squeeze out
 any excess water. Place in the hot popcorn cream and stir until dissolved. Set aside to cool a little.
- Mix the caramel with the sea salt to taste. Divide the salted caramel between 2 glasses or pots. Pour the popcorn cream on top and chill for at least two hours.
- Serve each pot topped with a few pieces of toffee popcorn.

For Teen Readers: Young Teens: An Island Of Our Own by Sally Nicholls Jonathan is the older brother we would all like to have. Left parentless,



The Parent Agency by David Baddiel, brilliantly funny and gripping, this is an epic wish fulfilment adventure for every child (well those over the age of 9!).



The Singers have been making music in Hurstpierpoint and district since 1950 and are a friendly, varied group who enjoy making music together.


