

Village Cinema scoop awards

Hurst Village Cinema was recently awarded commendations for Best Film Programme and Best Marketing in the annual Film Society of the Year Awards, which are run by Cinema for All, the umbrella organisation that has been supporting the Film Society and Community Cinema movement since 1946.


Not only this, they were shortlisted for the overall award for Film Society of the Year. That award was eventually won by an organisation from Sheffield, but so highly was Hurst Village Cinema's overall work and the quality of what they do considered, it was decided to give a Special Mention award to our local community cinema.

Cinema for All is the new trading name for the British Federation of Film Societies and they have hundreds of local cinema groups across the country under their purview. Every year they hold a national conference in Sheffield to bring community cinema organisations together to meet, share news, advice and experiences. The Village Cinema team got to meet people from the film industry, licence holders and funding bodies, attend workshops and panel sessions and also see advance screenings of films.

The Film Society of the Year awards is held at a ceremony in central Sheffield and these awards are designed to celebrate and reward the efforts of volunteer led community cinema. Cinema for All gather information about the year's programmes, publicity materials, community work and events from all film societies and community cinemas around the country who are affiliated to them. These are then evaluated and a shortlist for each award is put together to be judged by an independent body. Any film societies who have demonstrated excellence in a number of categories are then considered for the overall Engholm Prize for Film Society of the Year.

Given the numbers and quality of the community cinemas being considered, even making the shortlists is an achievement, and receiving the Special Mention in the overall award demonstrates that Hurst Village Cinema is regarded as one of the best community cinemas in the country.

CONSERVATION & DESIGN 2014 AWARD WINNER, HURSTPIERPOINT SOCIETY



If you have children of school age or younger then you have probably considered, or are considering, some form of childcare for them. If that's you then did you know about the Hurstpierpoint & District Childminders Group?

The association is a group of 14 registered childminders who are all local to the village, all are mums and all have a passion for taking care of children.

Abi Powell, one of the group and a childminder for the past seven years, commented: "Many parents don't understand the benefits of using a childminder and therefore have not even considered it."

Childminders, for instance, are all Ofsted inspected on a regular basis, keep learning journals for each child in their care and also write in a daily diary too. "The child's learning is a big part of our work and we are very proud that everyone in our group has been scored as Good or Outstanding by Ofsted," Abi continued.

One of the key benefits of a childminder is flexibility. The members of this group offer hours from 7.30am-6.30pm and can create tailored contracts which fit around the parents' working hours - many charging in half and quarter hour periods. Suzy Bennett, a parent of two boys and client for the last six years, comments: "We really appreciate the flexibility and adaptability on the odd occasion that we have needed to change an arrangement."

The minders here in Hurst can also offer additionally useful services like pick-up and drop-off to/from local schools and pre-schools. Gill, a childminder for four years, says that the the school run also offers other perks: "As well as the obvious exercise and road safety training the children also meet many other people enroute too. In fact, one parent said to me recently that more people say hello to her son when she's out in the High Street than to her!"

This sense of socialisation is important too. There is a fortnightly meeting in the village for the local childminders where they bring together all the children, plus many of the group choose to meet up and go out on other occasions too. Carole, a childminder for 26 years, knows the children love it: "Whether it's to nearby


Washbrooks Farm, round to another minders home or just up to the park after school, the children always enjoy being out and about with their friends. For this reason we do it as much as possible."

Sarah Solomon, another Hurstpierpoint parent, comments: "Our daughter thrives under the care of her childminder. Having looked after her from babyhood she feels secure, loved and has a great sense of continuity." Childminders are also able to mirror the routines at home which can be a great bonus for parents. Sarah goes on: "The strong bond she has with her childminder will last a lifetime." Carole, now minding the children of children who were once in her care, explained: "Some older children - now at secondary school - still like to pop in, they say 'Hi', grab a snack and see their siblings before going home - which is just lovely."

Each minder in the Hurstpierpoint & District Childminders Group works hard to create a homely environment that is both loving and educational. And with the support and backup of other local childminders this means makes the services they offer a great opportunity for parents living in/around the village.

Joanna Herbert, mum of Aimee, summed it up like this: "It can be a worrying time trying to find the right childcare, not only do you want someone who you trust to look after and care for your child but also someone who can fit in with a busy schedule. Our minder is able to do all of this which is why both my husband and I were so pleased to find her."

All the childminders in the group are listed on the opposite page. If you are considering childcare for your children please call any of the ladies. They will be pleased to discuss your requirements and arrange to meet up.

Linda Levett might be among the busiest retired people I have ever met! A Hurstpierpoint resident for eight years, Linda lives with her husband John. She is a fundraiser for Alzheimer's Research UK, helps to run the bar at the St Lawrence Fair, Hurst-Bar-Point, not to mention spending time with her family (including eight grandchildren) and pursuing all her interests and hobbies - bird watching, walking and supporting Portsmouth Football Club! She also helped out as Assistant Editor for Hurst Life in the early months, but most impressive of all, she is currently the High Chief Ranger (National President) of the Foresters Friendly Society.

I managed to pin this busy lady down and get her to explain a bit more about the Society she has been a lifelong member of. On first hearing about The Foresters Friendly Society, I imagined a group of tree loving folk, but Linda and her husband John soon filled me in about this age old, countrywide Branch Society founded in Leeds in 1834.

"We don't know exactly why the Society was called this, perhaps forestry was a dangerous business to be in and the Society was established to give financial assistance to the workers and their families if they were injured or killed?"

The Ancient Order of Foresters (AOF) became a registered Friendly Society in 1834, although there is evidence that it existed as a society as early as 1790.

In the late 19th century, Forestry spread throughout the world, particularly to the British colonies but also to the United States. In 1892 the Order was opened to women with the formation of female courts. In the 20th century, between the wars, the AOF was an approved society operating within the National Health Insurance Scheme, so it had both voluntary and state members. Unlike many others, it survived the slump in

friendly society membership after the creation of the National Health Service in relatively good order, and still flourishes, offering both financial services and social activities, and has 190 branches (known as Courts) and around 80.000 members in the UK.

Linda is a committed, traditional Forester, and was joined into the Society by her father, Jack Arlow, at birth. Growing up in South East London, Linda and her sister, Shelagh, attended many social functions with their parents and their first High Court (Annual Conference) – of many – was in 1957. Their father was a delegate and they would spend the week playing on the beach and joining in the various social events in the evenings. Linda was initiated into the Order when she was 14 years old and is a strong believer in the mutual ethos of friendly societies.

When her daughters Georgina and Alexandra were very young, Linda's husband left, and she had no choice but to seek part-time work, commuting into the City of London to support her young family. Indeed life as a single mother must have been hard, but her commitment to her family and strength of character won through, and she brought her children up single handed. This was surely the birth of the drive in her to succeed at all costs, a strength and determination that has got her to where she is today.

The Foresters Friendly Society continued as a secure and solid part of Linda's life and even introduced her to her husband John, who is also a staunch member and a Past High Chief Ranger himself. John is originally from Portsmouth (hence the football team) but was living in Dorset when they got together. They had known each other for around 30 years, meeting frequently at Foresters' conferences held around the country.

Linda told me that: "five years ago we both discovered





we were single, so John asked for my phone number. John lost the number but asked a mutual friend and eventually called me six months later and the rest, as they say, is history!" They were married in November 2012 at the Hickstead Hotel.

Linda relocated to West Sussex from Bromley, Kent, to care for her late mother, who had broken her hip and had the onset of dementia. Both her daughters and their families, and her sister, all live in Hurstpierpoint too, so Linda is able to enjoy having her immediate family on her doorstep. When John and Linda got together, John fell in love with the village and soon became one of the quiz masters in the New Inn!

Linda's journey as a member of The Foresters Friendly Society continued to ascend, when having previously been elected District Chief Ranger of South London in 1997 and two years ago Chief Ranger (Chairman) of the Southern Home Counties Area, she was installed with the highly coveted title of High Chief Ranger on 15th June this year. Her duties include chairing meetings, attending and speaking at functions and events around the UK, Linda's name is inscribed on the impressive gold Chain of Office she wears to official functions.

She told me with undisguised pride that she, "is only the sixth woman in 181 years of the Foresters Society to become a High Chief Ranger!" Quite an achievement considering she is currently battling serious illness, something that through sheer determination and strength Linda is hopefully overcoming.

It was the experience of nursing her mother through dementia that led Linda to feel compelled to raise money for Alzheimer's Research UK during her term of office. After a Foresters' Conference in Torquay, Linda visited a National Trust property, Buckfast Abbey, and in the shop they were selling old fashioned traditional sweets "John asked for my phone number, lost it, asked a mutual friend for it and eventually called me six months later! The rest, as they say, is history!"

in small packets and these seemed perfect to sell and raise money for dementia – using the theme 'Memory Lane'. Linda contacted the company but they were not happy selling to non-retail outlet. However, she told me that, after three months of persuasion, they finally agreed and she is now selling the sweets with all profits going to Alzheimer's Research UK. The branches in the Foresters also hold various events and raffles with many of them donating the proceeds to her charity. Recently five members did the Three Peaks Challenge in Yorkshire. This was a great achievement as they live in Lincolnshire which is very flat... Last month Linda had a runner in the Great South Run – and at least one, so far, in the London Marathon next year. All monies raised will go to Alzheimer's Research UK.

The New Inn in Hurstpierpoint holds a Quiz Night every first Tuesday of the month and this year all money raised is for Linda's charity. The next quiz is on 3rd November at 8pm if you want a fun night out and donate to a very worthy cause – and John will be quiz master!

Linda is also holding a Charity Ball in aid of Alzheimer's Research in Eastbourne on Saturday 16th April 2016, in The Floral Hall. For more information on this contact Linda at linda.levett@hotmail.com

From that choir some of the ladies got together to form a smaller all female vocal group. Herbie at his house has an old lambing shed, or 'bothy' in his back garden. (A bothy is an old Irish term for a farmworkers quarters or mountain shelter.) In the beginning, Herbie generously allowed the group access to the bothy in order to rehearse; The Bothy Singers began.

Monkfish Thai Green **Curry with Mussels**

For 4

This was one of our favourite dishes at the New Inn so here's your chance to recreate it. If you don't want the hassle of making your own curry paste buy a decent one.

- 2 monkfish tails cut to make four even pieces. You may have some wastage You will want about 6/8 mussels each
- 6 spring onions
- 2 red chillies
- 3 teaspoons green Thai curry paste
- 1 teaspoon garlic purée
- 2 teaspoons fish bouillon
- 2 teaspoons fish sauce
- 10 kafir lime leaves
- 1 tablespoon dark brown sugar
- 2/3 tins of coconut milk
- Some butter for frying

Head Chef at the New Inn, Pete Hampson turns his hand to a delicious fish recipe with chillies to keep you warm as the weather turns!

Pete has lived in Hurstpierpoint since he was two and his ambition is to complete his recipe book before he gets too old to remember all the recipes!



Method:

Slice the spring onions on a diagonal, keeping two back for decoration. Slice the chillies on a diagonal and keep these back for decoration. Make sure you wash your hands afterwards!

Gently fry the spring onions in the butter and add the fish sauce, fish bouillon, garlic purée and Thai paste. Cook on a gentle heat for 2 mins. Add the sugar and lime leaves. Gently add the coconut milk. Keep tasting. Remember you are cooking for yourself. If you like it hot, add more paste, if you like it sweeter add more sugar, if you like it milder add more coconut or simply add some cream.

Season the monkfish and place on a baking sheet in a preheated oven 180C. The fish will take about ten mins but keep checking as it will depend on the size of the tails.

Meanwhile steam the mussels and discard any that don't open.

Cook some rice and place in the middle of a bowl. Pour the sauce round the rice adding some mussels as you go. Place the fish on top of the rice. Scatter with spring onions and chillies and some course ground black pepper. For extra cheffyness we place some lemongrass cut in half lengthways but this is optional.

If you would like a recipe for the Thai paste why not pop in to the pub and I will happily write you one out. Happy cooking!



Angel's wings are heavy things

Remember how good it felt to have your picture displayed on a wall at school, or to listen to applause after playing in a concert or the release of emotion in a daily diary entry? Lead of Occupational Therapy and Education at The Dene, Jo Watters-Pawlowski explains how creativity can have a part to play with in-patients recovery.

The Dene itself is a large facility tucked away in Goddards Green, which provides medium, low and acute secure services for men and women with mental illness and personality disorder.

The Dene and its patients came to my attention after it exhibited patient's artwork at The Holy Trinity church in September. Not only is the artwork really good, modern, honest, often bursting with colour, it's heartfelt and moving in its simplicity and vibrancy. I wanted to find out a bit more about the artists and the people behind their creative journey.

On arrival at The Dene, reception is friendly but brisk, modern and bright, no mobile phones and security is paramount here.

I'm greeted by the very welcoming and friendly Jo Watters-Pawlowski (inset). Quietly spoken and calm, she's just as I imagine her to be; arty, cool, but with a steely sense of protection towards the patients at The Dene. It's obvious from the start she's immensely proud of their work and achievements.



Jo works very closely with the Occupational Therapy team

who are equally driven and talented people some who specialise in art, music and creative writing. Combined they deliver art-based therapeutic intervention and results of this work are exhibited around the hospital, submitted to external art competitions and community art venues.

"We use creative therapies to support people with mental health issues, and try to channel new techniques and creative thinking to help the patients find out 'who they are'. The outing to the exhibition at The Holy Trinity church was a confident step towards developing a feeling of social inclusion, and to allow the exhibitors to see themselves not just as patients, but as artists."

She told me about how the Koestler Trust invited a patient to submit a piece of art work to be included in a special book to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the Koestler Trust in 2012. The Koestler Trust Awards is the UK's best known charity for art by offenders, detainees and secure patients. This was founded by Arthur Koestler who established the Koestler Trust in 1962 after his own experience of being incarcerated and the need to use creative arts as a catharsis to imprisonment.

The Koestler trust sent Jo a beautiful piece of hand-made paper for one of the patients to paint or



draw on. The work submitted for the Koestler Trust 50th Anniversary formed a page in a unique book of art created by prisoners, secure patients, youth offenders and other detainees from across the British Isles.

The patient seemed reluctant to do it, dismissing the project at first. Jo explained: "The hardest thing is helping the patients to overcome their sense of failure, as they have very high expectations of themselves. It's our role as facilitators to reduce that anxiety and help them have fun creating whatever it is they want to create."

At last the patient painted the most wonderful, vibrant tree, laden with heavy fruit, and a positive, perhaps subconscious message of hope.

The title of a heartbreaking and seeringly honest book of poems by one of the patients, 'Angel's wings are heavy things' sums up the benefit and importance of Jo's work, proving that creativity is often the best form of communication when all others have failed.
