Pupils and parents work on textile wall hanging

Pupils at Hurst College spent a week with artist in residence Mandy Bangerter to create a textile wall hanging for the 20 Years of Girls celebrations. Parents joined the group over a weekend to take part in the event.

Head of Art at Hurst College, Jo West invited Mandy to respond to a brief to create a textile wall hanging for the College to celebrate the anniversary.

Mandy commented: "I spent a fabulous week with some motivated and talented students who really embraced the concept of adding stitch skills and using sewing machines into their art and photography work. Painting,



printmaking and photography, together with ICT skills, were used to transfer imagery on to fabric to begin our composition with stitch."

Many of the students had not used a sewing machine before but within minutes were excited by the expressive mark that can be made using free machine embroidery. The finished piece now hangs in the Art School at the College.



Hurst agent runs for charity

One of the village estate agents really is going the extra mile later this month when she takes on the Virgin Money London Marathon to raise money for Arthritis Research UK.



Think first shop Hurst!

Columbines beauty salon celebrated its 25th year of trading last month, so who better than its founder and owner Ann Winney to come up with a fantastic idea to promote shopping in our High Street?

You may have started to notice some great little jute bags on people's shoulders recently with the words: 'Think First, Shop Hurst and support local!'. Indeed, they have been spotted as far afield as Burgess Hill, but what is the story behind them?

Ann explained: "I was conscious that there were a lot of new properties being built in the village, so therefore lots of newcomers. I felt it was important to encourage these new residents to shop locally. Then I came up with the idea of the bags to help bring our High Street to people's attention."

Available for free to new residents, they are distributed by estate agents and development sales offices, so when you collect the keys to your new home you get a jute bag full of goodies. Each one contains contact information, special offers and free samples from many of our High Street businesses. These include wild bird seed from the pet shop, toothbrush and toothpaste from the dentist and a wooden spatula from the Cook Shop.

The bags themselves are also available to everyone from many of the High Street shops for £3, and are a fantastic, environmentally friendly way of spreading the 'shop local' message.

The bags, although the brain child of Ann who rallied High Street businesses to get involved and filled them all too, were paid for by the Parish Council, Hurst Community shop and the Co-op, with all proceeds from sales going back into buying more bags.

New development supports local bees

A new community in Hurstpierpoint is creating a buzz with local wildlife as well as homebuyers. David Wilson Homes has made its Spireswood Grange development bee-friendly as part of its pledge to support British wildlife.

The sales arena and show home garden at Spireswood Grange, off Chalkers Lane, feature bee-friendly plants and shrubs, such as Skimmia Japonica, Hebe and Cotoneaster, in a bid to help the area's population of honey bees. In addition the herbaceous perennial planting and climbers at the new community, such as Bergenias and Clematis, help to give pollinators a food source throughout the summer months. Prunus trees also provide an early blossom for bees, helping to support them on warm spring days.



Ann commented: "Our High Street has seen a lot of changes over the years, with shops coming and going. At one time we had a lot of banks and then most of them closed. Everyone thought it would be the end of the High Street; but we're still here. We are all doing what we can to make Hurst a real destination for local shoppers."

It's no doubt that Ann's positivity and drive have contributed towards her business being so successful over the years, and this can-do attitude is an important factor in helping the High Street to become as great and profitable as we all know it can be.

Large development refused

Hurstpierpoint and Sayers Common Parish Council has welcomed the decision by the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government to endorse its Neighbourhood Plan and refuse permission for the development of 120 houses and a 120 bed care home at Sayers Common.

The application was initially refused by MSDC in 2012 but later approved by the Planning Inspectorate on appeal by the developer in October 2013. However, in November 2013 the application was called in by the Secretary of State and the Inspector's decision was overruled in September 2014, largely on the grounds that the number of housing units involved in the

application was in conflict with the then emerging Parish Council Neighbourhood Plan (now 'made').

The Secretary of State decided that the application should still be refused, and has cited the importance of Neighbourhood Plan policies in reaching his decision, in particular the policy designed to protect the essentially rural character of the village. He considers that the size of the proposed development is in direct conflict with this policy and should therefore be refused.

Stephen Hand, Chairman of Hurstpierpoint and Sayers Common PC, commented: "By rejecting this application the Secretary of State has sent a strong message that overdevelopments which so blatantly ignore Neighbourhood Plans and the wishes of local people will not succeed."

April will be a wonderful month at the Village Cinema. Our first film, on Thursday 7th April, is the wonderful Japanese drama Departures (12A). Departures is a quiet, heartfelt, profound and beautiful film, which is also filled with humour. When his orchestra disbands, Daigo Kobayashi moves back to his hometown to look for a new job. Seeing an advert entitled Departures, he mistakenly thinks it is a potential entrée into the travel industry. Instead it is a job in a funeral home, preparing bodies for burial. Too embarrassed to admit his new career to his family, Daigo keeps his job a secret, until he's faced with a difficult situation that compels him to reveal it. Winning the Oscar for Best Foreign Language Film in 2008, this surprisingly funny film is the perfect blend of story, visuals, performance and music. No-one who has seen this film does not love it - do not miss it.

We have a real treat on Sunday 17th April, the brand new Steven Spielberg film, **Bridge of Spies** (12A). In this terrific drama inspired by true events, Tom Hanks stars as James Donovan, a Brooklyn lawyer thrust into the centre of the Cold War when the CIA sends him on a near impossible mission to negotiate the release of a captured American U-2 pilot in exchange for a Russian spy. Steven Spielberg masterfully captures the atmosphere of tension, mistrust and misunderstanding prevalent in the Cold War era, with Hanks brilliant as the down to earth Donovan and Mark Rylance superb as the Russian agent, a role for which he won the Best Supporting Actor award at this year's Oscars.

Our last film in April is the superbly gripping thriller **99 Homes** (15) on Friday 22th April. A single father, desperately trying to support his son and his mother, goes to work for the ruthless businessman who evicted them from their home. He is seduced by the glamorous world of high finance and seeks the chance to provide for his family's security - but to get it, he will have to deprive other families of their homes.

Tickets for our weeknight films are £4 members/£6 non-members. Doors/bar 7.30pm, film 8pm. Tickets for our Sunday Cinema films are £3. Doors 3pm, film 3.30pm.

Hurstpierpoint has a fair few very recognisable residents, and who no doubt get stopped for a chat often on their way to the Co-op. Lucy Webb has yet to reach this level of local fame, but met with a man who is high on the list of VIP village people.

My children often gasp at Kevin Carey as he walks down the street with his wife, Margaret. Partly due to spotting him in church and partly because of his trademark beard and windswept hair, they often whisper: "look mummy, it's Jesus!" Actually, they rather shout this loudly, as whispering is a tone reserved for plotting against parents, but no doubt Kevin takes this kind of attention in his stride.

He and Margaret invited me to their house for a chat, and I was shown to Kevin's 'snuggery', as he calls it. It's an amazing room, a conservatory that looks out onto the rooftops of Hurst high street, the perfect hub for Kevin's many and varied projects. His walls are lined with classical music and Braille books, and in front of him sits his keyboard, a specially adapted computer he is working on getting manufactured at a fraction of the current market price. More about that later.

Kevin tells me: "I have four jobs, and the one I care about the most is being a lay minister in Holy Trinity Church. I preach and teach there, and being a Christian is the most important thing in my life."

Kevin is also the chairman of the board of the RNIB, commuting often into London to work at the charity which supports blind and partially sighted people. I've often wondered what it must be like for a blind person to enter the mayhem of a London commute, but he tells me that the staff at Victoria know him now, so they help him through barriers without being asked.

I ask the question that I'm assuming often goes unasked in our very British way, how do people react to his blindness day to day?

"I find it uncomfortable at times, people tend to compound the issue by their own discomfort, and I find

myself burdened by this as well as my blindness, making it more difficult to function."

Indeed it seems Kevin's own perception of his capabilities has no limits, with a lifetime of achievement that is very impressive. His energy and drive to achieve is perhaps not coming from a deep seated wish to prove himself able, but more because of his boundless and inspiring self-belief.

Kevin runs a business simplifying websites such as BBC iPlayer, Sky programme guide and NHS websites for easier use; he says that engineers tend to overcomplicate things.

He is also a prolific writer having written three novels, several books of poetry and theology and a play he describes as 'a nativity play for adults'. Indeed, one generally looks at the nativity in terms of how children portray the story, but it's an interesting take on one of Christianity's best known stories.

He loves classical music, singing in the parish church choir, and has written as a music critic for a braille music magazine. His passion is Mahler and Bach, and he describes himself as 'a bit arty, among other things'!

Kevin and another great village personality, Michel Olszewski, 'dreamed up' the Hurst Festival, which his wife Margaret currently chairs. She is also a church warden, a well known and active member of the village community in her own right.

I want to know a bit about Kevin's journey to Hurstpierpoint, so I asked him a bit about his background up to this point.

He explained that he was born in Yorkshire into a strict Roman Catholic family and attended a boarding school run by nuns. I pondered that this kind of upbringing







sometimes has the effect of putting people off religion, but he tells me: "It didn't make me react against it, being a Christian has always been part of my DNA, I've always know this."

Kevin went on to study History at Cambridge university, then spent a year at Harvard on a scholarship, where he ran the university radio station playing eight hours of music a night in 1973.

Kevin's all night show was a favourite of 'bakers and lorry drivers', playing a mix of art rock and jazz, and comedy from the likes of Lennie Bruce and Bill Cosby. Here he discovered Miles Davis, Keith Jarrett, and it was through the conductor and composer, Leonard Bernstein, who was at Harvard giving lectures on the history of modern music, that Kevin was first introduced to Mahler.

On returning to the UK, he applied to the BBC and worked as a broadcaster for two years.

The loss of this job in 1976 coincided with the complete loss of his sight (he was partially sighted before this), and Kevin was forced to re-think his life.

It was at this point that he was head-hunted by Sight Savers, an organisation which aims to improve the lives of blind people and prevent blindness, to head up its Caribbean office.

On paper this sounds like a fantastic gig, but in reality Kevin found it hard going, but threw himself into work. He tells me: "Out there, if you're not working, you're drinking, so I became a workaholic." British radio and cricket kept him going, but admits if you're not a fan of Calypso you're pretty much stuffed out there.

He returned in 1984, and in 1987 decided he should revive some of his political aspirations, and stood as SDP candidate MP for Brighton Pavilion. Like all the rest of his local colleagues, he lost!

Kevin and his first wife arrived in Hurstpierpoint because they drew a circle round Haywards Heath and explored the surrounding villages until they found what they wanted.

A typical week for Kevin consists of two to three days in his RNIB office in London and in the past three years, frequent trips to Boston, US, where he's working on behalf of RNIB to develop a cheap computer which produces Braille. The idea is to get it manufactured for a fraction of the price it currently costs, opening this life changing technology up to a wider audience of blind people. The potential for this is huge, and when you imagine that current technology is heavily visual, you can really understand the need for this project.

Kevin admits he loves the corporate side of life, enjoying being part of a big organisation like RNIB, although likes to keep his life varied, with teaching, writing and freelance IT work being important in the mix. He admits he hates doing one thing at a time, keeping his work stimulating by juggling multiple projects.

Outside work, he describes himself as a 'foodie' and has a wine cellar in his home, and it goes without saying that he loves travelling. Having visited and worked in around 80 different countries, his favourite destinations include Italy (for the food and the people), Peru and Japan. A varied list, and one that perhaps reflects the multi faceted aspects of his character.

He reflects on his personality, and admits that he gets more radical (politically) as he gets older, buts hates to push these or his views down people's throats. "I prefer to help guide people towards making the right decisions for themselves about how to live a good life. How to tackle the major questions in life, and help and encourage in the process of achieving this."

Inspiring stuff from an inspiring man.

"We have called it An Evening of Swing, and the audience will be able to hear great songs like Night Train, Someone to Watch Over Me, Over the Rainbow and the classic Blue Moon."

The event promises to be a great concert, which starts at 8.15pm at the Village Centre on 25th April. Tickets are free with donations requested for Motor Neurone Disease Association.

Band members come from all over Sussex to be part of Downsbeat Swing Band, but Peter says they are always looking out for deputies. "We work from scored arrangements so a reasonably good level of sight reading is a must for membership of the band, as is an instrumental skill level of intermediate or above. Most important is the sense of swing and a desire to play and enjoy this type of music," Peter explains.

High Street trade issues

Stephen Hand, Chairman of Hurstpierpoint and Sayers Common Parish Council, explains the current status...

Background

Last summer's project to redesign the road layout resulted from many residents telling us over many years that they were fed up with risking life and limb on the narrow pavements in the High Street. From 2012 the Parish and County Councils prepared a joint plan to address the issues, taking on board many suggestions from local groups and people during public exhibitions and meetings, and the advice of transport consultants. A number of options to the selected plan were analysed by professionals, including traffic lights, and all were rejected for various reasons.

Current situation

It is clear from the public response since September that, although many people find the changes beneficial, some serious issues still remain in the public perception. These issues fall into two categories

- 1) High St Retail Economy It has been reported that retail business turnover fell in August (the month of the changes) and September across all shops by between 10% and 60%. Currently, across all shops, it appears that this is still down by between 10% and 30%, although some report no drop in business. Several shops have closed, but it does seem that most are reopening in different ownership.
- 2) Continuing safety concerns Regrettably, stories of pedestrians being brushed by cars, lorries and even buses climbing the pavements to squeeze past other vehicles continue. There is evidence from residents of the High Street that these incidents are less frequent than before the changes. Typically these are caused by bad if not dangerous driving rather than the road layout.

Parish Council response to issues

The Parish Council believes that, while the adverse publicity that has accompanied the road layout changes has deterred some people from coming to the village, there are a number of factors that are contributing to the current situation. The Council has resolved at its meeting of the 25th February to develop a joined up plan in conjunction with County and District Councils to address the concerns of Traders and Residents. The areas to be addressed will include

- 1) Business Promotion and Development
- Many rural High Streets are suffering serious downturns in business and many villages have vacant shops. Trends toward online and Retail Park shopping are affecting village shops everywhere, and the Parish Council will work with Economic Development staff from MSDC and WSCC to understand the wider economic picture for rural high streets and work with County and District Councillors to promote our High street and village generally using lessons from others.
- The Council is keen to work with traders to promote the attractiveness of our parish villages. We will initiate and support projects with this aim. For example, the

Council has contributed to new 'welcome bags' for people moving into the village containing information and samples from the traders and information on services and societies.

• Lack of parking has been cited as a reason for falling trade in our High Street. The Council has requested MSDC to create '3 hour' car parking bays in Brown Twins Road car park. This would allow people to stay longer to visit hairdressers, shops and cafes or restaurants. The Council will also look for ways to create parking at the east end of the village, which would help bring people in from Hassocks and mean less traffic having to use the High Street.

2) Traffic Movement

The Council has commissioned an independent review of High Street operation to address concerns and make recommendations for improvement, including:

- reviewing the operation and improving the marking of the loading bay outside the New Inn
- improving the visibility of signing for the current car parks in Trinity road and Brown Twins Road
- continuing to press MSDC for better parking enforcement in the High Street and elsewhere
- continuing to press Sussex Police to support eliminating the dangerous and antisocial driving taking place

Pete has lived in Hurstpierpoint since he was two and his ambition is to complete his recipe book before he gets too old to remember all the recipes!



Bobotie Serves 6-8

Ingredients

2 slices of bread
200ml milk
1 tbsp sunflower oil
2 medium onions, peeled
and finely chopped
1 tsp crushed garlic
1 tsp freshly grated root
ginger
1/2 tbsp curry powder
1 tsp turmeric
900g minced beef or lamb
2 tbsp brown sugar
1 tbsp tomato chutney
Juice of 1/2 lemon
75g raisins

Salt and pepper

Topping

2 large eggs The reserved milk from soaking the bread

Method

Preheat the oven to 170C, gas mark 3.

Soak the bread in the milk for about ten minutes, then strain, reserving the milk, and fluff the bread up with a fork.

Heat the oil in a pan, add the onions and sauté until soft. Add the garlic, ginger, curry powder and turmeric, and mix quickly to coat the onions in the spices. Add the beef/lamb and continue to stir over a medium heat until browned.

Add the sugar, mashed bread, chutney, lemon juice and raisins to the mixture in the pan and season with salt and pepper. Spoon the mixture into a casserole dish and bake in the oven for 35 mins.

For the topping, mix the eggs and the reserved milk together, then remove the casserole from the oven and pour the egg mixture over. Season with cracked black pepper and bake for a further 15-20 mins.

I love spring even though I know we are about to enter such a busy, intense time. It is the most special time as we welcome so much new life on to the farm. We nurture and care for our animals all year round, so when spring arrives and calving and lambing start it is immensely rewarding and sometimes emotional. We love sharing the whole experience with our visitors to the farm during our spring open days.

We are tenants of Saddlescombe Farm, which forms part of the National Trust's Devil's Dyke estate on the South Downs. Saddlescombe has a unique collection of traditional farm buildings, some of which date back to the 16th century. The buildings do not necessarily lend themselves to modern farming but we love working with them and the atmosphere they create, particularly during lambing time.

At this time of year, the first job of the day for Roly is to jump on the quad bike with Belle our faithful sheepdog and start his daily checks around the farm's sheep flock and herd of traditional Sussex cows. Recently the mornings have been misty and magical. Saddlescombe is in the heart of the South Downs, and often, at the highest points of the farm, we can see over the mist across the Downs. The animals always seem very quiet too at this time of day. Roly will often see lots of wildlife, which is always exciting to hear about back at the breakfast table before the school run.

As lambing gets nearer we bring the sheep back across the road and closer to the farm and our cottage so we can keep a very close eye on them. Gradually they will all lamb and we bring them individually into the lambing barns and put them in a 'mothering up' pen together. This is to make sure they have their special bond and the lambs are feeding well before we put them out into the fields again. By that time we hope the grass will be really growing and the mums can take all the goodness in and turn it into milk for their lambs.

We are open for four days during lambing this year, 2nd, 3rd, 9th and 10th April. Please come and join us, we love sharing what we do. 


