Lucy Wilsdon, of Park Cottages on Manor Road, will be opening her garden for the first time this year after recently completing the overhaul which she started at the end of 2015.





Hurst College supports local tea party initiative

Hurst College is supporting a tea party initiative run by Hurstpierpoint and Sayers Common Parish Council.

The College has loaned the school minibuses and a driver to the initiative which takes place every month and offers a chance for older people who live in the community to go to a tea party at someone's home.

The project was conceived by the Parish Council and several local residents in August 2015, with the idea of taking a small group of elderly people into different local residents' homes to enjoy tea, cake and a friendly chat.

The number of people attending the tea parties has varied from nine to twenty-five, depending on the size of the home. The latest addition to the scheme has been to provide a short spot of entertainment such as piano, flute playing or singing.

Roberta Taylor, Assistant Clerk at the Parish Council, said: "This initiative was started to try to reach older people who might not be able to get out easily and offer them an interesting and safe outing.

"One of the main problems we have had was organising transport for all people attending. We recently approached Hurst College for help, and we were readily offered the use of one of their minibuses and a driver.



It was a great relief for us, and the driver was kind and patient. We appreciate their help with this community project – an example of one part of the community helping another."

The Parish Plan Community Life document 2011 identified assisting elderly people to participate in community life as one of its action points.

A royal appointment for Fergus...


Local magician and WWII veteran Fergus Anckorn recently attended a garden party at Buckingham Palace with The Not Forgotten Association. The charitable association was founded in 1920 and provides support for our injured service men and women of all ages. He attended with his daughter Deborah, who lives in France.

Fergus, who is now in his 98th year, spent 3½ years in Japanese prisoner of war camps following the British defeat in Singapore in February 1942. Critically wounded during the height of the battle, having been blown up in his Artillery lorry, he was declared dead by a passing British colleague, who took his 'dog' indentity tags and handed them in for the casualty list. Luckily, he was not dead and was later taken into hospital and survived yet another ordeal, which was to be known as the Alexandra Hospital Massacre, whereupon the victorious Japanese army executed most of the patients and staff at the Hospital.

Fortunately, yet again, he survived. Fergus was then sent up into Thailand (formerly Siam) and was engaged in forced labour as a POW, during which time he partook in the building of the infamous bridge over the River Kwai. Fergus' hobby had always been conjuring and during his time as a prisoner he helped keep the morale of other prisoners up by taking part in entertainment productions staged by the troops. He was also summoned on occasions to perform in front of the Japanese Camp Commandant, who took a keen interest in magic. On one such occasion Fergus nearly lost his life yet again, when the Commandant told him that he was having some important colleagues over for a meeting and would like them to be entertained. He asked Fergus what he needed for the show and Fergus replied: "An egg." Realising he had been given a docket saying 'Give this man what he wants' to go to the cook house with, he very cheekily asked the Japanese cook for 50 eggs!

The show went extremely well and Fergus made good use of the one egg in the featured trick and, following applause all round, he returned home to his hut. The next morning he was summoned to the Commandant who was scowling and said to Fergus: "You do trick with one egg... Where 49 others?" Fergus thought he was surely staring at a swift death sentence, but staring around the room he suddenly had inspiration. "Your show was very important to me, I had to practise all day."

He got away with it! This is one of many stories which are in Fergus' book The Conjuror On The Kwai, which was written by Peter Fyans and forms the base of a two man show which Fergus & Peter present to schools and community festivals by invitation. The show is essentially an interview-style production with graphics, which educates the audience by telling them first-hand what life was like in a war zone, followed by starvation and captivity. Interestingly, it not only covers the obvious negativity of his experiences but is also scattered with a good deal of humour and hope. The show proved to be a significant hit as part of last year's Hurst Festival programme.

In later life, Fergus started giving talks to the public and schools feeling that it was an important part of our history for the story to be told. Since 1996 he has tirelessly raised many thousands of pounds for The Burma Star Association, to which he has donated any income from his talks. He has also been very public about his lack of animosity towards the Japanese, studying the language and visiting Tokyo & Osaka in 1994.

Fergus lives in Hurstpierpoint and magic still plays a huge part in his life, attending The Magic Circle in London every Monday. He joined in 1936 as the youngest member. At 97 he is now the oldest member!

Along with other events and celebrations taking place on Sunday 12th June to celebrate the Queen's official birthday, there is one in particular to listen out for!

At 12 noon the Hurstpierpoint Bell Ringers will be ringing a quarter peal (that's 1,260 changes to those of us who don't know) which lasts for 45 minutes.

The bell-ringers, who meet at Holy Trinity Church on Thursdays to practise, have a strong membership and are pleased to have a group of young teenagers in their group. At a recent coffee morning at the church, the group were on hand to demonstrate rope making (smaller versions of the real thing!) and chat to an interested group who were fascinated by this craftsmanship. The inclusion of the 'Sally', the coloured rope at the end which is pulled, is an intricate process needing a steady hand and just the right amount of tension. The history of bell-ringing is entwined into our modern day language with phrases such as 'ringing the changes', of which there are 5,000 in a full peal. The history extends further back to when pubs, along with churches, were the focal points of village life, and pubs were named after how many bells the church had, and there was a real status in numbers. Holy Trinity has eight bells, two of which date from 1775. It was during the 17th century that eight bells became more common and were used as the yardstick for bellringers and composers.

William Stafford, Rachael Mahoney, Sophie Payne and Josh Hutchinson were on hand to answer questions, proudly sporting their Sussex Young Ringers uniform. They are a few of the young contingent who, in April of this year, came first in a regional competition. Rachael said: "The atmosphere is a mix of excitement and nerves!", with William adding: "And if anyone asks, bell-ringing is nothing like the Mars advert!"

Bell-ringing, once learned, is a skill that can be kept for life. Member Sue Elrick said that having come to bell-ringing in her 50s she has definitely found it harder to learn than the younger members. John Norris, who started out in 1959, said: "Young members do find it easier and once learnt can ring bells anywhere. When they leave the village for university, employment or to get married, they often

end up bell-ringing elsewhere." Their departure leaves the way open for new recruits and is open to all ages. The prerequisite seems to be hand to eye coordination as opposed to brute strength, although there were a few comments about aching backs and arms!

There are over 5,000 spires in the UK, which with eight bells apiece necessitates 40,000 bell ringers nationally, a figure which has remained unchanged for the last 50 years and reflects the strong interest in this historic activity which still holds its own today.

At the time of going to press Kieran Murray will have recently celebrated his 19th birthday. Kieran was born and has grown up in Hurstpierpoint, with his mum, dad, Bertie the dog and the ginger cat.

Kieran is known to many for his gigs at various pubs in the village and private events. He opens his mouth and sings, and in that moment people stop talking. Kieran has a phenomenal voice, think Ed Sheeran meets George Ezra (more of this later), and when he stops singing people start talking – about him!

It was at the age of ten that Kieran first sang the James Morrison song You Give Me Something - a song that was to prove significant later – and in that moment, his mum, Lee, thought 'We think he's good, let's explore this further'. Kieran started lessons with Hurstpierpoint's Sam Nixon, who still remains a constant as a vocal coach. I asked Kieran if he believed he was good straight away? "No, it was when Sam said she thought I was, that I began to believe it." Dave, Kieran's dad, says that Kieran started singing much earlier and at the age of two could be heard belting out Sex Bomb by Tom Jones in the car with his Grandma Margaret – although at this stage they couldn't really tell if he was good or not!

Kieran's talent continued to develop throughout his school years and he says he received support from Downlands' teachers such as Miss Hunniset and Mr Smith. The latter he performed with at a school talent show, Kieran describing Mr Smith as being a 'brilliant quitar player'.

It was Downlands that suggested he go on to Central Sussex College to study A Levels. I asked Kieran if he was surprised to hear the recent news that the Haywards Heath site is due to close. "Not massively shocked," he replied, "but it is sad as the staff in the Arts department were fantastic! I don't know where students will go to from this area to study the arts now."

For Kieran, the next step was to audition for the

esteemed British Institute of Modern Music - Brighton, more commonly known as BIMM. When he saw the list of audition songs he knew it had to be James Morrison's You Give Me Something and it did – a coveted place at BIMM. Kieran will complete his Foundation year this summer and is staying on to study for a three year degree course in song writing and vocals. This year has been more intense than Kieran anticipated, although he's enjoyed studying Michael Jackson, David Bowie and The Beatles, to name but a few, and is looking forward to his degree when he'll be learning more about the music business and focusing on developing vocals and performance skills. Still, you know what they say about all work and no play, and Kieran is no different from many teenagers in his other interests, namely his girlfriend, working part-time at Morley's Wine Bar and his X-box!

You would think all of this would leave little room for much else in Kieran's life but you'd be wrong! Kieran is the youngest village resident to be interviewed for Village People to date, and what drew me to chatting to him was not just his musical talent but his involvement in our local community. Last year, Kieran joined the St Lawrence Fair Committee and I was interested to know why. Replying passionately, he said: "I've lived in Hurst all my life and I know how much work is involved (in the Fair) but I'm not sure everyone knows how much hard work goes into it." His involvement has, unsurprisingly, used his musical talent in sourcing other bands for the Friday night pre-Fair gig on the green. This evening started a few years ago and has become the gentle, although not necessarily sober, easing into Fair day! Kieran is checking out sound systems - he has just purchased a massive pair of speakers which had pride of place in the dining room and looking at the best site for the stage. He's looking to improve it and make it better for everyone, and of course he hopes we'll be blessed with good weather!

Kieran is using his contacts to influence the line-up

and as usual local young talent, of which there is much, will be showcased. Recently Kieran played in Brighton with Jamiroquai, having been asked to audition singing one of their songs, Virtual Insanity. "It was proper cool," he says, adding: "Although they won't be performing in Hurst, the line-up will be great!" Kieran describes his fellow committee members as lovely, saying that he has met new people. He said: "I feel respected as a young adult, by people I've grown up with." Adding: "It has helped being over 18 when it comes to enjoying refreshments at meetings!"

The immediate future is mapped out with studies for Kieran, and he'll be living at home, which he and his mum and dad all seem happy about. Kieran sees this as an opportunity to save for musical equipment and paying for his car. I ask him how he finds driving in the area and he raises his eyebrows and grins at the mention of the High Street. "Stuck in the High Street? Check out all the shops while you're sitting there waiting!" he suggests. His friendship group is local, often meeting at local pubs, although he misses friends currently travelling in New Zealand saying 'he wishes he could be there!'. I ask Kieran if travelling is on the cards, post degree? Wistfully he replies: "Possibly. I'd like to travel, using the world to influence my music."

If you've heard Kieran you'll be familiar with his style, although he says: "Local gigs affect the song choices. If the audience ask for specific songs then that's what I'll sing!" He feels that he's more of a soul/indie rock singer, influenced by the likes of Stevie Wonder. If you haven't heard Kieran yet, there'll be opportunities over the summer months, in addition to The Friday Fair Night on 1st July.

Kieran describes himself as confident, he enjoys meeting new people at college and chatting with customers at the Wine Bar, but he doesn't come across as arrogant. He is keen to name all those who have helped him so far in his singing career and quick to make suggestions of others from his peer groups who would make great candidates for future Village People features. He may be heading far, but he definitely won't be alone, as at the very heart of Kieran there is a strong sense of family and friends, which is why there is no doubt that he loves living in Hurst. I ask him if he sees himself living here in the future, to which he replies: "It's a lovely village, but I'll have to be really successful to buy my own place here!"

In addition to medical supplies, Charley says she either ships, or takes out in her own baggage allowance, 'anything and everything'! And so it was agreed that these W.I. ladies would make and collect toys for the children orphaned by Ebola. And boy, have they been busy!

Claudine's husband gave the description of 'not being able to move for boxes of knitting!' at their home, and this must be true for the other ladies who have participated if the array of donated items shown here is anything to go by. Charley was able to visit a recent meeting to collect all these goods and it's clear that these W.I. members have, unsurprisingly, taken Charley and her work to their hearts. I say unsurprisingly, as Charley is an extraordinary young woman. For her last few visits she has been working with the London based charity Street Child, but she fundraises independently and travels alone. She has made a true friend in Martha, her contact who she works with when she arrives in West Africa, and at the time of writing she and Martha will be busy distributing the donated toys. Additionally, Charley will be running a 10K marathon to raise funds for Street Child, in temperatures tipping over 32C, and acknowledges she may not be able to keep up with the locals but will be able, hopefully, to take in the stunning scenery! Back here in the UK Claudine says: "We've decided to keep collecting and making for Charley throughout the year, and she'll be coming back to us, to give a talk in the future." Sierra Leone is now classified as Ebola free but there are many children orphaned or separated from their families by the disease and the country's civil war. Charley's motivation is, as she says, 'not to cure the world but help one child at a time', and having the support of the Sayers Common and Albourne W.I. does really seem to be making a difference.

Method:

Squeeze the pulp from the fruit into a blender, add the lemon juice and blitz for a few seconds.

Put the cream, sugar and chocolate into a pan and heat gently until the chocolate has melted, keep stirring. Add the blitzed liquor and stir well.

Sieve into a jug, rubbing the mixture through with a spatula and scraping any mixture from the underside of the sieve. Discard what is left in the sieve.

Pour into six small ramekins and chill for three hours. When ready to serve, sprinkle the top with sugar and melt with a blowtorch until bubbling and caramelised.

The short course is a mile and a half along footpaths and through Danny Park. It is well marshalled and signposted and keeps well away from the roads.

The race is open to adults and children, and there are prizes for under 16s. Tom Roberts has been the fastest boy for the last three years with a record time of 11:23 in 2015, the same year that Jessica Emerson set the course record for girls with a time of 15:58.

Little Washbrook, go past the buildings and follow the footpath signs. Cross a stile and pass the nursery on your right, then another stile keeping left around the side of the field and into the woods. This short stretch has lots of tree roots so be very careful. Carry on to the south as you come out of the trees, past the stile and over the field until you reach the woods.

(3) On Fair Day there will be a marshal here to send the long and short course runners in different directions. For the short course you turn left on the course of the Roman road. Follow the path that leads through the trees, across another field then over the new bridge with metal gates. This brings you through the tunnel of trees and as you emerge in Danny Park turn sharp right until you reach the drive by the cattle grid (4).

Turn left along the drive until you come to (5) the big fallen tree on your left, where you turn left to follow the footpath through the new metal gate and straight on to the gate by the farm track. (6) The race route doesn't go to Tott Farm just ahead of you, but it turns left, over another stile then you turn right at the metal gate (7) to go up the slope north towards Little Torch ahead of you. (8) When you climb over the stile on to the footpath you are nearly there. Watch out as you cross South Avenue, although on Fair Day it will be closed to traffic and full of food stalls. The finish is straight ahead at the back of the bowls club.



BOOK REVIEW

The heroines of Wedding Night are sisters; Fliss, who is editor of a prestige travel magazine, and Lottie, who works in HR for a pharmaceutical company. The sisters are very close and Fliss has always been protective of her younger sibling.

Kinsella cleverly splits the narrative so that the point of view switches between Lottie and Fliss, this allows the reader to engage with both sisters and know more about what is happening than they do. By the end you will be rooting for them both to get their happy ending.

As the story begins Lottie is convinced that her boyfriend Richard is about to propose; he has booked a special lunch, asked whether she likes his surname and wants to ask her a 'big question', so Fliss is shocked to hear that they have broken up. Lottie usually reacts badly to break-ups and makes 'unfortunate choices' but Fliss is determined that this time will be different and will go to any lengths to secure her sister's happiness.

Fliss has troubles of her own. She is in the middle of a messy divorce and trying to make sure her problems don't affect her work, but soon finds herself abusing her position to keep Lottie from making the biggest mistake of her life.

The plot moves along at breakneck speed and it is packed with humour and farcical situations.
