



New playground due to open

The children's playground at South Avenue Recreation Ground has been closed for some weeks now but was expected to be reopened in time for the school summer holidays.

The area has been subject to a major overhaul of all equipment and enlargement of the playground by a third, in a project that has been managed by Hurstpierpoint and Sayers Common Parish Council.

Following a strategy set out in the local Neighbourhood Plan document, the council has received £100,000 in contributions from two major housing developers who are building in the village. This money was specifically ring-fenced for items which would directly benefit those living in the community.

Following a public consultation, three contractors entered a design competition which led to the appointment and work commencing in June. The new aparatus will be suitable for use by toddlers right up to teenagers.

Football club builds for future

Last month Hurstpierpoint Football Club informed the Southern Combination Football League (SCFL) of its decision to resign from the league.

The club has played in the league since the formation of Division 3 in 1983 and has enjoyed some enjoyable seasons at intermediate level, most recently in 2013/14 when it lifted the Sussex Intermediate Cup.

"Amongst the highlights," comments the club secretary, "there have been some difficult seasons for the club when we've finished at the wrong end of the league table. Often we've survived relegation on the basis that teams in feeder divisions have not had adequate facilities or other clubs were folding.

'This season has been no different for the club, and, rather than wait for a decision from the league, we have decided that it's time to step down divisions and rebuild the club in the Mid Sussex Football League."

The club's committee are excited about the future. In trying to survive in the SCFL the club has not been accessible to local players, particularly those from the village.

These players are now invited to come and enjoy their football with the village football club.

Felling of Monterey Pine

By David Brown, St George's Millenium Garden Trust A splendid feature of the Garden is a large Monterey Pine. As its name suggests this tree is endemic on the west coast of California. particularly around the coastal town of Monterey - made famous by being the setting for John Steinbeck's novel Cannery Row. This particular tree is some 150 years old and features in an old photo from the 1890s when it was in the garden of the house of the Hannington family, owners of the department store of that name in Brighton.

Sadly this iconic and much loved tree has reached the end of its days, and, following a detailed report from an Arborologist, the Management Committee has decided to have it felled. This work will be carried out during the first week of August and will necessitate the Garden being closed to the public for three or four days.

On a brighter note, we hope that this will not be the end of the story because the Committee is exploring the possibility of creating a 'living' sculpture from the lower parts of the four main trunks, and we are inviting people to send in ideas within the overall theme of wildlife. Steve Scott

VILLAGE PEOPLE



We are lucky that we live in, what seems to me, an extraordinarily creative and talented area. There are some Hurstpierpoint residents who could grace the pages of the national media and be instantly recognised. There are many others who still deserve our recognition, and, for me, Steve Scott is one of these.

Steve, wife Annette, daughter Francesca and son Ollie arrived in Hurst 25 years ago with youngest daughter Emily making her appearance four weeks after their move. At that time, Steve was a Detective Sergeant with Sussex Police. Hurstpierpoint felt like the ideal place for him to access work across the county without uprooting the family every time there was a change in his work role. It is clear from chatting with Steve that his introduction to village life came from his involvement in his children's school life and activities. At many times over the years this has been as one half of a double act - think Barker and Corbett, Morecambe and Wise, Flannagan and Allen (look them up if you don't know!) - alongside none other than Jerzy Lewandowski. Having met the Lewandowski family through their respective children (combined think Family Von Trapp), Jerzy approached Steve to help with the St Lawrence School PTA Fete, saying: "We need a van!" Steve came up trumps with a Police Carrier, not fully knowing its intended use, but all became clear as he drove across the school field, the back doors were flung open, and an assortment of parents and teachers dressed as 'Gladys-ators' jumped out in full fancy dress! (As you read on, you'll see fancy dress is a recurrent theme!)

From this, Steve, pleased to help out, started to MC the school summer fetes for a few years. He says now: "I should have known with Jerzy as a friend that it wouldn't end there!" When Jerzy took over as chair of the St Lawrence Fair, he asked Steve to take on the position of vice chair. Short of time, but with his arm twisted, he agreed to help out! It was during this period that Steve, and you may well recognise him from these as opposed to his 'civvies', led and MC'd the fair as Captain Hook, Judge Dread and Michael Schumacher!

Just as now, pre St Lawrence Fair fundraising was much needed. At that time junior team football didn't feature in the village. Paul Dyer, St Lawrence Primary School Headteacher, allowed the school fields to be used for both football and netball matches. After a group effort from John Adams, Dick Creaton, Jerzy and Steve, Hurst's first junior football tournament took place. The final was played in the arena on St Lawrence Fair day, and although this went well initially, the second year saw an elderly resident almost felled. Steve says: "The ball



was powerfully booted out of the arena!" He took off his huge Judge Dread gloves and threw one to the ground. Over the tannoy he called out to the crowd, laying down the gauntlet for somebody to take on the junior football teams at a more suitable venue! The British Legion generously stepped forward. Ultimately the boy's parents, with the likes of Ken Bartram heavily involved, took over the coaching. And so Hurst Colts, as we know it now, was born.

The annual tournament hosted by Hurst Colts at Court Bushes moved there when it became clear that it was too much for the St Lawrence School field to take. More fundraising was needed! Steve says: "No one person works alone in the village. You ask one person for help and there will always be more who are happy to pitch in." Eight riders including lain Couper, Alison Gillham, Dave Billington, Claire Hampson, and Celia Bartram entered a team for the London to Brighton (2000) bike ride. They put in some extensive, and often traffic stopping, training around the village! Steve is quick to add that he takes no credit for the development of Hurst Colts: "You get involved when your children are young and then pass the baton on to the next set of parents, but I am delighted to see that the tournament is an established fixture in Hurstpierpoint's annual calendar."

A sadder occasion prompted Steve and three friends, Dave Billington, Neil Leaphard and Ian Saville, back on to the saddle – the untimely death of good friend, Simon Vevers. Tandems at the ready and sporting fluorescent pink tutus, they hit the roads again. The community rallied behind the 'bicycle made for tutu' to raise funds for Hurstwood Park Neurological Unit. Another two 'Steves' (Dutton and David) were on hand as ride mechanics.











Once in Sussex they would all stop off at various pubs for refreshments. "It's fair to say, we were never the fastest team!" Steve laughs, adding: "I'd invested in a really comfy gel saddle and after a 45 minute refreshment break, in Turners Hill came out to find somebody had made off with it. I had to finish the last 25 miles with a ropey old saddle!" £5,000 was donated to Hurstwood Park and Steve says: "It's lovely that a small amount was used to buy a bench in Simon's memory."

Steve retired as a Detective Superintendent from Surrey Police Force in 2007 and went on to work part time at Lewes Crown Court, managing a team of 40 volunteers who offer Witness Support. He fully retired in 2015. With more time on his hands, Steve enjoys playing golf at Pyecombe, and snooker with a former neighbour, Dave Richards. The latter became a firm friend in spite of early wake-up calls from Annette's Skoda, which failed to start most mornings, back in the 80s. Steve laughs when he comments that: "It did take a number of years before Dave confessed that he and his wife had moved to their back bedroom, so their start to the day didn't coincide with Annette's early starts at the airport!"

The number 13 is one that features strongly in Steve and Annette's lives. They met, became engaged and married on the 13th of various months. Seemingly a lucky date for them. This luck almost ran out on their honeymoon in Rio. Three robbers snatched a gold chain from Steve as he and Annette were sightseeing. Steve gave chase to one thief but pulled up quickly when he heard the gunshot which had been fired at him! Turning, he saw a further bullet fired at the ground. Annette was now pinned to the wall by the other two men with a gun held to her head! Shocked, Steve stopped his chase and

for a few seconds no one knew which way the situation would turn. The gunmen, seeing their fellow crook had disappeared with the jewellery, rapidly left the scene. Steve and Annette are, naturally, thankful for their lucky escape! At this time they didn't have children. They hadn't moved to Hurstpierpoint. With an alternative outcome, not only could their futures have been different but ultimately ours too.

Steve is modest about his involvement in village life, commenting that: "Everyone does their small bit and it all comes together. Some ideas are taken forward and merged with the new with the best possible outcome for any given event." I ask Steve if he's tempted to offer his help again for future events, and he says that he has been giving it some thought! I sincerely hope he does. His sense of fun and choice of fancy dress costumes can only bring good things to the mix!



James Verrall always wanted to run a family business. His grandfather and father together owned the restaurant Beech Hurst Gardens in Haywards Heath for many years and he'd seen first-hand the benefits of that experience. Now newly married James & Carla are creating a business of their own at Haywards Heath Golf Club.

Carla went to school at Downlands in Hassocks and is a beauty therapist by trade, but has also worked as a carer and most recently an estate agent.

It's summer, so we may be reaching for ice lollies or ice creams each time we hear the chimes from the ice cream van.

If you are keen to choose healthier options there's always the potential to whizz up your own version.

Creating your own lollies is great inspiration for the kids and a great way to up your 5 a day for all.

This is one of my favourite healthy lolly recipes containing plenty of vitamin C and is of course dairy free, yet still creamy and delicious.

You will need:

2 fresh mangos zest of 1 lime

1/4 cup of lime juice (or 1-2 limes) 1/3 cup of coconut milk (note: the best bit is scraped from the tin lid!)

Method:

Just 10 minutes to prep - then six hours to freeze!

Place in a blender and pulse until combined, pour into the lolly moulds and freeze overnight. Run under warm water for a few seconds to remove from mould.

A core part of our programme is without doubt Hurstpierpoint Open Studios, which takes place over the first two weekends of the festival. This year sees 18 artists open their studios to the community showcasing the wonderful artistic talent we have in our village, from jewellery making, sculpture and textile craft to photography, painting and stained glass art.

New parkland to be created

A special board has been created by Hurstpierpoint & Sayers Common Parish Council to advise on the development and maintenance of new parkland in Hurstpierpoint.

The group is formed of 14 members, including from the Parish Council, other groups with special interest and members of the public.

The inaugral meeting of the Hurstpierpoint Parkland Advisory Board was held last month in the Village Centre, where they were able to set out some of the structure of the group and also discuss the land itself.

The concept of the parkland has come directly from the Hurstpierpoint & Sayers Common Neighbourhood Plan (approved in 2015). During the public consultation for the plan, it was strongly felt that if the village was to have more housing, then the community should be able to get something back in return.

An agreement was reached with developers Bovis and Rydon Homes to hand over ownership of key areas of land near their new sites as countryside spaces which could be easily accessed by the community. The deeds for the land will state that it will not be possible to build on the land or use it for any commercial purpose. They will also act as a buffer for future development in the village.

The companies will also - in addition to the land itself - release around £400,000 to the Parish Council to facilitate any necessary work in setting up and maintaining the parkland.

A Landscape & Ecological Management Plan has already been commissioned and this forms the major schedule of works for the large project.

"Most of the work," explains Stephen Hoyles (Parish Council Clerk), "will involve planting hedges, mown footpaths, the addition of seats and finger posts. We don't want to change the landscape but it needs to be safe and simple to maintain. The plan also shows us the opportunities for local conservation too."

The advisory board will meet three times a year and seeks to bring the public into some of that decision-making process.

The ownership of the first parcel of land is due to complete in the next month or so. It is hoped that work will begin on the meadow later in the year.

Stephen continued: "We are very excited about this project and look forward to it becoming a major part of village life here in Hurstpierpoint in the years to come."

TV urban ecologist offers flooding advice

Event hosts HKD Transition, Hassocks Amenities Association (HAA) and the Ouse and Adur Rivers Trust (OART) discussed options and invited West Sussex County Council to give a local perspective.

In early July at Downlands School in Hassocks, popular TV ecologist and self-styled 'Rain Chaser' Dusty Gedge was in full flow. Not for him the monotone durge or the text-heavy Powerpoint, but instead an enthusiastic journey through ways to manage flooding in our local area.

Explaining how climate change has left us with more intense weather, Dusty outlined some simple ideas, from converting grass banks into rain-friendly ditches to making living roofs where plants grow and absorb water. Garages, bin sheds, extensions and other flat-roofed buildings can be easily retrofitted.

He showed us pictures from around the world of vertical gardens (literally a building covered in plants), rain gardens and bio-swales (a green form of water drainage that filters and absorbs polluted water).

The point, he explained, was to think of ways to stem the flow. The UK can relatively easily guard against situations experienced regularly in built-up cities such as Copenhagen where, after a twenty minute storm, life comes to a standstill as the city struggles to deal with vast quantities of surface water.

After the Storm by Jane Lythell

BOOK REVIEW

The Village Read returns to Hurst this year. After the Storm is the second novel by Brighton based author Jane Lythell.

When Owen and Kim meet a couple of British holidaymakers they are broke and plan to sell their beautiful boat and return to the USA. Owen persuades Rob and Anna that chartering the boat to explore a far off island in the Caribbean will be a trip to remember. But ten days is a long time to spend alone with strangers. Especially when they are keeping secrets......

This book is a fantastic read and there are lots of twists and surprises as the plot unfolds. Jane Lythell has a background in film and her prose is very visual. She brings her settings to life and I almost felt the tropical heat as I read.

It's hard to put this book into a genre; it has action and adventure but is also character driven. I was intrigued by the dynamics between the four main characters as the tensions between the two couples ebbed and flowed believably throughout.

Are you in pain or discomfort?

Pain can have a great impact on our day to day lives, often causing limitations and frustration. This can begin to affect our physical and mental wellbeing if action is not taken to remedy the situation.

Concerns over ancient woodland

Nothing affects Hurstpierpoint life more than the loss of rural greenfield landscape, especially when it will also be at the cost of ancient woodland.

In recent years the northern aspect of the village has been heavily developed with builds both north and south of Chalkers Lane. Next will be Little Park Farm, which will receive 140 new homes.

Little Park Farm is a greenfield parcel of land that will sandwich ancient woodland between existing and new housing. The plan also includes extending the culde-sac Iden Hurst through the ancient woodland. For many in the village this is proving an emotive and very controversial proposal.

Ancient woodland is any wooded area that has been wooded continuously since at least 1600 AD.

The development was approved, after appeal, for its inclusion in the Neighbourhood Plan and outline planning permission granted and by the Secretary of State.

The plan includes building a road through this ancient woodland by extending the cul-de-sac Iden Hurst east.

This plan has now been agreed in full.

The developer under this application has now built a road that runs along the eastern edge of the woods. This road does not interfere with the woodland and is substantial. When the 140 homes are completed it will remain in place (unused). So why build a road through ancient woodland when this provides a much less destructive alternative?

Whilst I do recognise positively the fact that ownership for this site is to be formally handed over to the community as part of 'sweetener' by the developers, this access just makes no sense! An alternative has been built that will completely irradiate any impact on the woods status.

The application for this site raised over 1000 objections but has been approved regardless. Neighbourhood planning provides a powerful set of tools for local people to ensure that they get the right types of development for their community. Of the many reasons for people to object the overriding opinion was that ancient woodland should not be interfered with and that the new road made for a common-sense approach. Our only hope now is to approach the developer and appeal to them for a sympathetic reconsideration to the access road.
