There are only a few Hurst High Street premises that the same business has occupied for 40 years, and Castle Solicitors is one of them.

John and Branwen Castle will be known to many locally as their fields of work are commercial property and wills and probate, respectively. John worked for another firm of solicitors at 118 High Street prior to starting Castles Solicitors on the 1st November 1976 (originally known as J R Castle & Co.).

High profile neighbour or not, their work was in Hurst, their friends too, and so, after five years, they moved back to the village. Kent's Farmhouse is a grade II listed building in Malthouse Lane, and it's clear that John and Brannie enjoyed making this their family home for 25 years. In downsizing, they haven't moved far as they are still in Malthouse Lane!

Nicholas and Lucy, who no longer live in the area, are fortunate that they are able to return to their home



village with their own children. John and Brannie clearly enjoy family life, and when not working Brannie spends as much time as possible with their grandchildren. John's interests are varied and he serves as a Trustee for Hurstpierpoint Cottage Trust, Phillipson Ditchling Trust and Weald Tennis Club. John also follows football, and his five-year-old grandson was recently heard saying: "When I'm with grandad I like Arsenal, when I'm with Daddy I like Liverpool, but really... well, I like Chelsea!"


Brannie agrees with John when he says: "We are looking ahead optimistically to the future years with our current team."



Ingredients (makes 12 muffins)

300g self raising flour 1tsp baking powder 150g caster sugar 1tsp ground cinnamon 1tsp grated fresh ginger root 200ml milk

2 eggs 100ml sunflower or vegetable oil 50g grated beetroot 25g grated carrot 25g grated butternut squash

These muffins have autumnal flavour, they are warming and wholesome!

During the Hurst Festival I ran two Longevity Nutrition events at which we enjoyed these delicious muffins containing high anti-oxidant ingredients. As important as the ingredients involved was the social setting; sharing food in good company, we decided, is key to good health at any stage of life.



How to:

- 1. Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6.
- 2. Line a muffin tray with 12 cases.
- 3. In a large bowl sift together the flour, baking powder, caster sugar, cinnamon and ginger.
- 4. In a separate bowl mix the milk, eggs, oil and grated beetroot, squash and carrot until well combined.
- 5. Pour the dry ingredients into the wet and mix until just combined.
- 6. Divide the mixture between the 12 cases.

- 7. Bake for 20 mins or until well risen and firm to the touch
- 8. Remove from the oven and allow to cool for 5 mins before transferring to a wire rack to cool fully.

After meeting Naomi McBain to chat about the charity Hope, I awoke the next morning with a Diana Ross song going round and round in my head. The lyrics of 'Reach out and touch somebody's hand, make this world a better place if you can' stayed with me as did Naomi's passion for her work.

Hope charity was founded by Naomi four years ago, evolving from The Sanctuary Community Toddler Group which has now been running in Hurstpierpoint for nine years. The group looks to build the wider community whilst supporting and nurturing individual and family lives in ways that are relevant. It was seeing the forming of friendships over coffee and cake, the juggling of adult conversations along with keeping an eye on playing toddlers and the nervousness of some in attending, that Naomi knew that there was so much more that could be offered.

Hope charity has four projects, including The Sanctuary. Another, Family Matters, offers non-judgemental, encouraging support to any family member. Naomi stresses this: "We don't have all the answers but we are a listening ear. We can help find the appropriate support if needed."

Naomi explains that the scheme isn't for families that might be perceived as being in need but all families and can be taken up as a one off session or tapped into on an ad hoc basis over a period of time. It allows a community to become an extension of existing family networks.

Community is the key word here, and this can be seen clearly in one of the other projects, the Sparkle groups. These are for mums of any age and aim to offer peer group support through a sense of belonging. Naomi says: "I could see that, even in a place as friendly as Hurst, there were people who seemed isolated, who struggled to engage and form friendships in their peer group." The Sparkle group acknowledges that for some, larger groups and life can be difficult. The meet ups are self-run and supported by Naomi and a volunteer. The group, who are all women, meets weekly allowing time to be taken out from the routine aspects of family life. This can be as simple as sharing a coffee, listening to a quest speaker, baking or trips out to places of interest. From this relaxed environment Naomi has noticed that attendees, after a period of time, are able to share longterm issues in their lives or their sense of loneliness. As a result some have been able to move on into work and studies.

The Playtime project focuses on fun! It is nomadic in the sense that it taps into existing coffee mornings or toddler groups. Naomi says: "Parents and carers are often too busy to play and this group aims to strengthen family relationships through sensory play." She is excited that this project will soon be starting monthly sessions at St Edwards Church in Burgess Hill.

Playtime groups are run by local volunteers who ensure that a community encourages support within itself. Naomi tells me that it's her Christian faith that lays the foundation for all the Hope projects. "Religious faith is not a prerequisite for attending any of the groups," she makes clear." They aim to offer non-judgemental acceptance. It's about loving people where they are, not dragging them up to where we think they should be."

Naomi's personal hope is that the charity will grow to offer nationwide support. "I would love to see change, restoration and reconciliation. Basically, families mended."

I wonder how Naomi finds the time, energy and passion for such a vision. She responds: "It's a privilege to be trusted enough to be allowed to help, a real pleasure."

Naomi recognises that the charity sector is as competitive as any and adds: "Additional support, either from volunteers or financial, is always welcome so that we can continue to grow and encourage a community to support itself where needed."

Hope is also the brainchild behind the Sensory Father Christmas Grotto held at Mabel's Emporium in Burgess Hill. This year it opens on the 3rd December, then every Thursday, Friday and Saturday for two weeks. Naomi laughs when she says: "It's so much more than a visit to Santa! We offer winter-themed sensory play and everyone is welcome to stay as long as they want.

"In previous years Toddler Groups and schools have come to us for their seasonal outing. It's a joy to witness the children's and adult's excitement!"

"My first book was published in my late forties. It's never too late!"

The recent Hurst Festival certainly showcased, again, the variety of local creativity we have here on our doorstep.

Children's author Helen Baugh took part in Loud Literature, giving feedback to aspiring young writers in an event which celebrates reading aloud. This is something that resonates with Helen, who as a child appeared reluctant to learn to read. "My mum was puzzled because she knew how much I loved books," she commented. "It turned out I thought no-one would read to me any more if I could read on my own! Once that misunderstanding

was cleared up though, there was no stopping me."

Helen's rhyming picture books are for children up to the age of six or seven. If you are a parent or grandparent of children this age, you may well have found yourself reading from The Witch with an Itch, its sequel Dragon v Dinosaur, Rudey's Windy Christmas and Giant Jelly Jaws and the Pirates. Or you may have attended Helen's local reading events in bookshops, schools or at Hurstpierpoint Library.

Helen's childhood featured many library visits. She is a keen supporter of library services and says passionately: "I think we're really lucky to have a library in the village. You can order virtually any book from a library, so it's like a portal to a whole universe of books!"

Helen's journey from reader to children's writer has not been direct but circumnavigated other roles and life events. Helen moved from Brighton to Hurst 11 years ago with her husband Andrew and two daughters, Jemima and Maddie. She worked previously as a full time copywriter, a field of work she'd entered at the age of 22. Although always surrounded and fuelled by a love of

words they belonged to the briefs and agendas of others. It wasn't until 2010 that Helen was able to seriously think about writing stories for children.

A post-redundancy holiday, with good friend and fellow local author Charlotte Raby, finally gave Helen the impetus and time to put down on paper ideas that had been ruminating since her eldest daughter, Jemima, was a baby.

On returning home, she submitted the resulting story to Random House Children's Books. Although an

editor told Helen that they couldn't publish this title, for various reasons, he liked her style and asked her to write another. And so, in the spring of 2011, The Witch with an Itch was born.

The publishing process can be lengthy and it took until August 2014 for this title to finally go on sale! During the wait Helen continued to work as a freelance copywriter and acquired a publishing agent. It was the latter that led to a second publishing deal, this time with HarperCollins Children's Books. Rudey's Windy Christmas and

Giant Jelly Jaws and the Pirates are now out in the UK and North America, and a friend of Helen's sent her a photo of the latter title on a Barnes & Noble bookstore shelf in New York. "It was exciting to see!" she adds. "It's also really lovely when someone tweets a photo of children laughing whilst having my books read to them!"

Although Helen still works ad hoc as a freelance copywriter, she has also started carrying out school workshop visits and her delight is evident. "The feedback has been amazing. Several times I've been told that children who had not previously enjoyed reading or

writing have now got the bug, which is wonderful."

In spite of these successes Helen is not resting on her laurels. She is currently working on a new story and has her fingers crossed that it will be accepted for publication soon.

For Helen one of the delights of being a published author is working with talented and creative illustrators. Deborah Allwright – of The Night Pirates fame – and Ben Mantle have both made Helen's work come to life visually. Helen says: "I've been really lucky with the illustrators, both chosen by the publishers, for my work."

It's apparent that the whole road to being published is quite precarious. Helen submits her work electronically, and once the send button is pressed, the waiting begins. Helen says ruefully: "There is every chance of rejection, which can be difficult. But reading about other writers' rejections and long roads to publication in The Children's Writers' & Artists' Yearbook makes you realise you just have to keep going."

Another challenge faced by most authors is the amount of time they spend alone. To counter this Helen works one day a week at a close friend's home office, for both company and the opportunity to share ideas. She has written on beaches, in the garden, even in bed, in fact anywhere it's quiet! In the main however, she writes at home, mostly in her spare room or at the kitchen table. Initial ideas are written with pen and paper but she uses a computer thereafter.

I wonder how Helen is able to compartmentalise her work. "When deadlines are involved – whether for copywriting work or for a publisher – they have to take priority. But there's usually plenty of space in between deadlines when I can work on new story ideas," she says. "There have been some memorable occasions when deadlines have clashed and it's been stressful to get everything done on time, but thankfully that's rare these days. And now that Jemima and Maddie are older and at Downlands, I have more time to write than when they were younger."

Helen says that one of the joys of working from home is that it's in Hurst. When she and Andrew were looking to move from Brighton, the surrounding countryside, nearby train station and excellent schools were all draws to the village. "One additional joy has been finding so many lovely, friendly people here," she said. Helen's talent is in rhyming couplets, a flair she discovered in a Brighton pub when she and a friend created limericks which grew bawdier as the evening progressed! Having been treated to hearing a few, delivered with a broad West Country accent, a lewd Pam Ayres comes to mind! However, it's not this author that Helen matches best but former Children's Laureate Julia Donaldson. Donaldson herself was hugely influenced by Edward Lear, particularly with her book The Snail and the Whale, and Helen clearly shares the talent for both rhyme and rhvthm.

I ask Helen if she sees herself writing in ten years' time. "Definitely," she replies. "The Witch with an Itch, my first book, was published in my late forties. It's never too late!"

On 3rd November we have an overlooked gem in the form of American Splendour (15). This terrifically witty film stars Paul Giametti giving an outstanding performance as the real life Harvey Pekar; a hospital orderly who passed his time writing wry stories about his very ordinary life. A chance encounter at a garage sale with the underground artist Robert Crumb led to his stories being turned into a comic book saga which became incredibly popular and made Pekar an unlikely folk hero, a comic book bard and a curmudgeon with a heart of gold. His appearances on the David Letterman show became the stuff of legend. This film is charming and exhilarating, both stylistically and for its entertaining portrayal of an everyman.

Then, on 18th November, we head to the Mediterranean sun for A Bigger Splash (15), a dazzling, sensuous portrait of desire, jealousy and rock 'n' roll. When a high-profile couple, a rock star and a filmmaker, take a rest break on a remote Italian island, their rest is disrupted by the sudden visit of an old friend and his sexy, yet mysterious, daughter. Suddenly, what was supposed to be an ideal getaway turns into a whirlwind of jealousy, passion and danger for everyone in the group. Bravura performance from Ralph Fiennes as the hedonistic motormouth record producer who shatters the Mediterranean peace.

Our Saturday Cinema on 26th November is the brilliantly well-rounded, fast and funny Zootropolis (PG), and we finish November on Sunday 27th with Brooklyn (12A), the moving story of a young Irish woman lured by the promise of America in the 1950s. But soon her new life is disrupted by her past. and she must choose between two countries and two lives.
