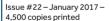

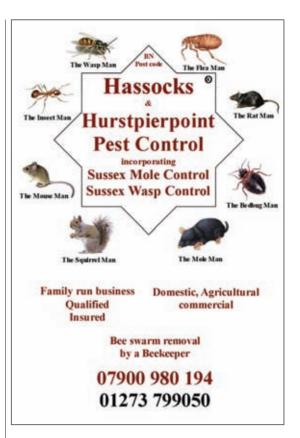

Society boosts school pool cover fund

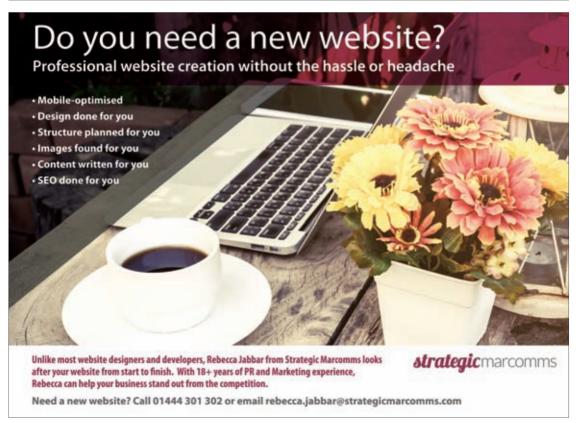
Hurstpierpoint Society has recently given a grant of £2,500 to St Lawrence Primary School as a contribution to the fund which will purchase a cover for the school swimming pool - which is currently open to the elements, making it unfeasible to use it all the time.

Tim Moulds, Governor at the school, explained: "The benefits of the pool improvement will be there for the whole village community. The school will offer the pool to local qualified instructors for lessons and fitness classes.

"Hurstpierpoint is a lively and growing community with a great range of facilities for its residents. The grant from the Hurstpierpoint Society means that we will soon have a swimming pool available to us as well. Many thanks."

The fundamental principle of the Society is 'to watch over what goes on in our beautiful downland village and to ensure that nothing is allowed to encroach on its boundaries without permission or consideration'.

Co-op has moved into new temporary shop

Over the recent Christmas period the Co-op store has moved from its temporary stall on the village green in to the Hurst Community Charity Shop building.

The small size of the pop-up trailer (in situ since the fire in the pet shop during the summer) has meant that it has struggled to keep up with the demands of the many residents who relied on having a supermarket on the High Street.

A Co-op spokesman explained: "The new space will enable us to stock a much better range than was possible previously - which we know our customers were asking for."

The chair of trustees for the Community Charity Shop, Michael Barnes, explained: "We were approached some time ago by the manager of the Co-op who offered recompense for loss of earnings while it was out of use for us. As the whole raison d'etre of our existence was to help finance village community projects along with the church reordering, the trustees soon agreed to the notion, and we closed on 6th December."

However, he is keen to stress that the shop will be open for business again in late spring.

"In the meantime we would ask that residents hold on to items until April/May when we will be able to accept donations of goods once again. Thank you."



Tree forest at school

The annual Christmas Tree Forest was staged once again in the school hall at Downloads Community College last month.

The event is organised by teacher Marc Whitmore who leads the students Community and Charity Focus Group, and this year the forest raised money for the Cancer Research Fund.

The students approached local organisations and businesses from Freedom Leisure to the Royal British Legion, who not only sponsored a tree but inspired the decorations. Each tree has a theme appropriate to the organisation that has sponsored it. Visitors to the Christmas Fair were asked to vote for their favourite tree and make a donation. We were delighted to raise over £180 for Cancer Research UK.

Create Space was founded by Hurstpierpoint resident Zoe Thompson in 2009, when she was invited to set up dance classes at St Lawrence School.

Following a career as a professional dancer and choreographer, Zoe has taught dance for many years in schools, youth centres, stage schools, special needs centres for children and adults and setting up, then becoming Head of Dance at Hurst College.

With a lifetime dedicated to dance, she wanted to expand and reinvigorate Create Space Studios in January 2016 by starting creative, experiential multi arts holiday workshops. The ethos for the company is very clear she explains: "Learn from fantastic, creative, industry artists, who give the most exciting, inspirational experience to young people, whilst providing opportunities to try something new or a little unusual often that's not readily accessed. The process is the most important part, as it's also confidence building and mind opening, but the result being enjoyable with the young creators having ownership." Zoe goes on to say: "I don't want Create Space Studios to be the same as anywhere else. I want it to be a bit unexpected. I want it to be eclectic, and welcoming all abilities at all ages. I want to provide an environment that cultivates the artist in everybody!"

To date the varied artists who have collaborated with Create Space Studios have included two different style singer/songwriter/musicians, a film/TV/stage special effects make-up artist, costume designer, children's author, music producer and graffiti writer.

The first workshop last February was with talented local children's author Helen Baugh. As a fan of Helen's work, Zoe was very excited about the collaboration based around her latest book and felt that having a published author would inspire children to want to write and make up their own stories. Zoe then helped the children to lift their characters and ideas off the page to create drama scenes, enhanced with costume, make-up, learning a sailor's hornpipe and even a sea shanty song!

With the success and brilliant feedback Zoe had, she has continued to invite the highest calibre industry professionals to work with children from ages 5-16 years old and believes that an artist who works in their field brings a depth of knowledge and passion that ignites children's interest and creativity. Packaging each workshop, ensuring quality time learning from the artist, then time experiencing complementary art forms, has become a brilliant way to expand the young people's cultural, historical and artistic contextual understanding. Each workshop culminates in an exhibition and/or

performance for family and friends.

During Take It To The Streets workshop, Zoe brought

respected Brighton graffiti writer Jiroe to teach graffiti techniques, including stencilling and spraying. Everyone created their own canvas, and the older participants even sprayed baseball caps and T-shirts too. Zoe complemented Jiroe's art by teaching capoeira – a Brazilian martial



art (a passion since writing her dance degree dissertation about the roots of capoeira and its rise in popularity), street dance and a traditional south African gumboot dance performed by miners – all art forms that have derived from the streets.

Create Space dance classes have grown from three classes per week to eight, including a Boys Only (6-7pm) and Adults (7-8pm) both in Hurst on Thursdays, newcomers welcome!

Zoe was also involved in the Hurst Festival 2016, including a brand new site-specific choreography, performed by teenage dancers in South Avenue park. She is looking forward to doing another similar project this year, as well as continuing her work alongside brilliant artists providing the best unique experience for young people.

The next workshops, during February half term, include Record A Track, back by popular demand, with Skyline Studios and their brilliant producer Jez Larder. This extremely popular workshop provides an opportunity for young people to record in a Brighton studio, working with Jez who has produced, mixed and engineered tracks for the likes of David Bowie, Simply Red, Estelle, Jonny Moped to name a few... All Singing, All Dancing with Kate Matthews, who will teach children how to use their voices correctly with live accompaniment, then carousel to Zoe who will get them moving. Through The Lens will be with photographer and film maker Michael Wray, who will be exploring how to get the best photograph from an artistic point of view, less selfie - more creativity!

Hurstpierpoint Food Bank, situated in Willow Way, runs on Wednesdays from 9-11.30am.

At this time of year there are a lot of people struggling to put food on the table let alone when they were thinking about Christmas. On the flipside of this, our community is very generous and we have received donations locally from the Methodist Church (for Harvest Festival) and from The Hobina Choir, who recently collected £93.67 at a performance at the Players Theatre.

We also have been fortunate enough to receive a huge food donation from Downlands School in Hassocks.

Teacher Mrs Kirsten Gaymer explains: "This term the Global Ambassadors have been considering the global problem of hunger. They discovered it's not just a far away problem and, whilst there are millions of people suffering from hunger around the world, there are also many families in Sussex that can't afford the food their family needs.

"The Ambassadors decided to take action by organising a school-wide food collection for local Food Banks. There was a huge response, and on Wednesday 14th December two minibuses full of food and keen students visited the Hurstpierpoint and Burgess Hill Food Banks to deliver the mountains of tins, pasta and Christmas food donated by Downlands students and staff. The school collected over 2000 items.

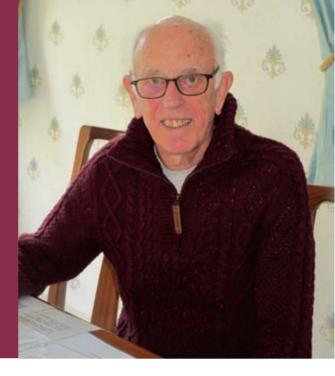

Brian Judge

VILLAGE PEOPLE

Village resident Brian Judge moved to Hurst with wife Janet 35 years ago. He has been Chair of the Hurstpierpoint Museum & Heritage Group since it was first formed in 1995. Its first exhibition was held that same year and still are to this day in the Village Centre.

I was really looking forward to meeting Brian Judge, in the flesh, so to speak, having realised that I had already met him, but only briefly, at a Hurst Festival evening function at the College last September.

We had decided to meet at the village centre, to take pictures of some of the exhibits, prior to having coffee at his place.

Brian had trained as an engineer. After some time spent in Henfield in the 1970s, in 1981 he and his wife, with their three boys, decided to move to Hurst when his work moved from Brighton to London.

Two of the boys attended St Lawrence School and all three went to Downlands. Brian has been widowed now for six years and is a proud grandfather of three.

I spent a delightful couple of hours in his company, over mugs of coffee in his kitchen before moving to his dining room table, where he showed me poster after poster of what the Group had achieved over the years.

He is obviously very enthusiastic and passionate about the Hurstpierpoint Museum & Heritage Group with which he, and most of the group, have been involved in from the start. Way back in 1995 he, and a number of others, attended a meeting at the Scouts HQ from which Hurst 2000 was formed; tasked with taking Hurst through to the next century. Subsequently, various groups were formed. His became the Museum Group. There were five or six in the team in those early days. He was elected Chair and they started to meet regularly.

Mrs Phillips, from Ditchling Museum, came along to explain what they might have been letting themselves in for, but this did not dampen their spirits or deter them in any way. They investigated the possibility of premises, but this seemed beyond them financially, so they decided to proceed on the basis of staging themed displays twice a year using the public library.

Their first exhibition was within six months of their inaugural meeting. They actually put on two separate displays at that time, each lasting two weeks, and they were considered to be a success by those who came to see them.

One member of the group even found two handmade books in a skip in Steyning. They were full of sketches of towns and villages in Sussex with illuminated script. The author may have died before he completed his work and the books thrown out as part of a house clearance. It seemed such a travesty!

The group canvassed local opinion to see if a museum was wanted. They organised guided historical walks around the village. They enlisted local press and radio stations to help keep them in the local eye and participated in village events, such as the Village Fair and other community arts projects.





The Museum Group continued with its Library exhibitions on a regular basis until the extension of the Village Centre provided them with permanent display facilities.

They have loaned temporary exhibitions to local schools and participated in county wide events through the Sussex Museums Group. Over time they have amassed a varied collection of artefacts that they can call on for specific exhibitions. Once they were lucky enough to get hold of an original Victorian passport of Frederick Weekes of Hurstpierpoint, which was given to them by a relative of his based in Worth. This formed the basis of an exhibition.

The Group still meets informally in Hurst several times a year to decide on new displays. When the Village Centre was enlarged, cabinets were provided for the museum's use in the foyer and, as the old Parish Office had become vacant, they were able to have use of this by contributing to the Council Tax.

Every Saturday morning the room was manned by volunteers, and many artefacts were donated by visitors during this period. The room is now used by the Mother and Baby Group and storage of artefacts is now off site.

Thereafter, the local council allowed the group to display their collections in the glass cabinets adjacent to them and the local Hurst Library. This location of their display cabinets in the foyer of the Village Centre means that a free access facility has been provided to the village for over twenty years and hopefully for many more to come.

When asked how they managed to come across such a variety of objects, Brian told me that many were donated following local house and attic clearances in the village and then rehomed in their storage space for further exhibits.

The variety of displays over the years has been truly remarkable, as seen on some of the themed posters Brian showed me. They range from Danny House (2008/9) to the Victorian High Street (2010), the St Lawrence Fair 700th anniversary artwork competition (2012/3), Village People (March 2015), the Pink Flamingos FC (September 2015) and more recently 'Fashion - surely you didn't wear that?' (September 2016).

The latest 'Collectomania' (November 2016) could strike a familiar chord in many of us. It's defined as 'an obsessive desire to collect things'.

Nowadays, just about anything is collectable. There is a whole industry supporting the hobbies of collectors; specialist shops and websites for specific collections; collectors fairs and antiques shops; auction rooms and, of course, charity shops.

I would strongly encourage people to go and view the exhibition.

"They are five of us active in the Group," Brian explained. "Myself, Cathy Messum as Secretary, Tony Bright as Treasurer, Rae Heaviside as Display Organiser and John Avis. The fact that we have all been going on for this long means that it goes without saying that new members would be extremely welcome, as would any village memorabilia."

This recipe is adapted from a recipe on the Real Simple website - here's my version!

Smooth vegetarian soups with a chilli kick (to give the metabolism a gentle boost post-Christmas) can be found in many of my cleanse course recipe collections. This is one to fire you up about healthy eating!



How to:

- 1. Sauté onion and garlic in oil until translucent
- Add veg stock, squash and curry paste. Heat and let simmer for 15 minutes or until squash is tender. Remove from heat and let cool for 10 mins. Blend. Add coconut milk and process until smooth. Season with salt if required.
- Prepare tofu. I find this best if you remove the tofu from the packet, discard the fluid, wrap in a clean tea towel then place a saucepan of water on top. The aim
- is to remove excess water and make the tofu firm without distorting its shape. Cut into one inch cubes. Heat a little olive oil/vegetable oil in a non stick pan over a medium heat. Using a spray oil is a good idea. Add tofu and cook until golden brown, 3-4 minutes per side.
- 4. Toss the spinach, sliced chilli and lime in a bowl, season with salt. The soup may need gentle reheating.
- 5. Serve the spinach mix and tofu on top of the soup.

In this droll Icelandic tale, we meet two brothers, Gummi and Kiddi, who have tended sheep on neighbouring farms for 40 years but never speak to each other. When a disease outbreak prompts the government to impose a cull on livestock, they must put their differences aside to protect their animals, but each has a different idea how to go about it. Credible, hilarious and poignant by turns, Rams is a keenly detailed, well-paced and entertaining tale of family dynamics and radiant humanism, heightened by superb performances and stunningly beautiful cinematography.

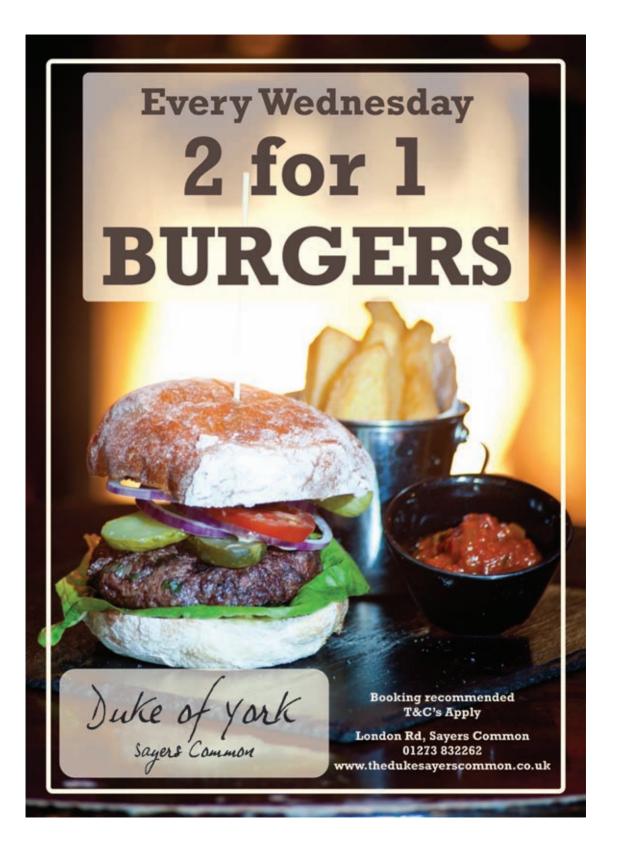
On Friday 27th January we have Maggie's Plan (15). Decent comedies are an endangered species. It's getting harder to spot one that isn't clichéd and contrived and doesn't have you digging your fingernails into your palms with embarrassment, which makes 'Maggie's Plan' the snow leopard of romcoms; intelligent and screwball-funny, with clever and complicated female characters. Greta Gerwig meets a married novelist (Ethan Hawke) and they fall for each other. Three years later, and with a daughter, the couple's relationship is floundering, so she devises a plan to extricate herself and send him back to his ex-wife. Exuberantly performed by the first rate cast (Julianne Moore is hilarious as the pretentious intellectual ex-wife) this is a super comedy, full of funny one-liners and sharp observation.

There is a silent epidemic amongst women; one that is hidden by a mix of embarrassment, shame or, perhaps worse, one that is being normalised by the media and adverts for 'sensitive bladder' products!

If you leak when you cough, sneeze, jump, run or take part in any high impact activity (and that includes bouncing on a trampoline) then you have urinary stress incontinence (USI). Whilst this is common (1:3 women will suffer from this) it is NOT NORMAL. It is most common in women who have been through pregnancy and childbirth but USI can also affect many young women (including the super fit) who have not had children.

Why does it happen?

In the majority of cases, USI arises from poor function of the pelvic floor muscles. The pelvic floor is a sling of muscles that supports the organs of the pelvis and has a key role in managing bladder or bowel function in both men and women. Weak, poorly co-ordinated or damaged pelvic floor muscles can result in reduced control and leakage. It can also lead to pelvic organ prolapse, where the bowel or bladder intrudes into the vagina. These muscles are put under considerable stress during pregnancy and childbirth and in some sports which involve a lot of high impact or impact on the abdomen. Other factors that affect the performance of pelvic floor muscles are the changes in the quality of connective tissues that occur as a woman transitions through menopause.

Do not accept!

Our culture of hiding this problem in plain sight leads us to mask the symptoms. This might be by not taking part in activities that cause us to leak, moderating fluid intake, wearing a pad or clothes that can hide an accident. You can now buy special pants that absorb leaks and reduce odour. These are being marketed to the fit and active 30-40 age group! All of this normalises USI and conditions us into not taking control of our pelvic health. How much better would life be if we focused on education to let women to know that, in the vast majority of cases, USI can be vastly improved or stopped altogether?

The way forward

As is the case with most muscular weakness, injury or dysfunction, co-ordination and strength can be greatly improved by the use of the correct training and rehabilitation. In some cases surgical intervention may be needed, but in uncomplicated cases of USI or mild prolapse good functionality can be returned to meet the requirements of daily life. You also need to know how to manage load when lifting, e.g. taking heavy shopping out of the car, picking up small children or any of our daily activities which challenge our core stability. Which types of exercise are good for your pelvic floor and which ones will load it beyond its capacity? Whilst living there she got married to Stuart. Initially, he had come from Scotland and met Gail for their first date in the village. That weekend, the Cow Parade** happened to be in the village too, so she described to Stuart where she lived according to the description of all the different designed cows down the High Street. He must have thought that she was a bit mad and questioned if it was a right move to meet her there!

However, unbeknown to her, the Cow Parade had moved on and by the time Stuart arrived on the Friday, all the cows had moved away from the village. He must have thought that Gail had made it all up!

Since then, Stuart has bought her several miniature cows for birthdays and anniversaries.

One day Gail happened to mention that she would like a full-size one. Eight years ago her wish came true. A full-size cow, called Daisy, was sold to raise money for the charity and eventually settled in the garden of the Centre. The people with blindness (staying at Torch) loved it and painted it for her, and it became the meeting point for the fire evacuation.

Gail and Stuart moved in October to the new estate of Spireswood Grange. Daisy the cow came with them, and they put her in the front garden. Within the first couple of weeks they noticed that she had been moved but thought nothing of it. In the third week both she and her husband had to go away on business.

While they were away they had a phone call from the site's sales office to tell them the following story of the neighbourhood cow watch:

'Early one evening, neighbours were driving towards the estate when they noticed two girls dragging Daisy along Chalkers Lane. They stopped and ask the girls if it was their cow.

One of the girls ran off but the other said that it was. The neighbours said that they didn't think so and that the cow belonged to someone on their estate. The girl then ran off. The neighbour stayed with the cow while his wife went to find Gail and Stuart. However, as they were not at home, she knocked on a neighbour's door who immediately went to rescue Daisy!

They carried Daisy to their garage, which was opposite the sales office, and put a note through Gail and Stuart's door. Workmen working in the house noticed the note. Not knowing what had happened, they thought it was



a ransom note for Daisy, took it to the sales office who then called them!'

Gail and Stuart arrived back with wine and flowers for the neighbours who had rescued Daisy. She is now in the back garden until concrete shoes are made for her to return safely to the front garden.

She has been sorely missed.

Gail commented: "This has really helped us to get to know our neighbours. We love living in a place where people clearly look out for one another."

This month's route takes us on a 25 mile loop starting and finishing at Proper Cycling & Coffee in Hassocks. This is a largely flat route, perfect for a cold weather blast on the bike or a more leisurely day out exploring the local villages if the weather is on your side.

It's a fairly quiet road away from rush hour, but parts are tree covered so consider some daytime running lights especially at this time of year.

After a few miles the road continues (bear left at the fork with Wineham Lane) on to Wheatsheaf Road (still the B2116) and then bear right on to the A201 towards Partridge Green. Partridge Green takes its name from the Partrych family and used to be based around the station on the Steyning line. The station was closed as part of the Beeching Axe in 1966. Partidge Green is now home to Dark Star Brewery (good beer!) and Hunt Bike Wheels (great wheels!)... a little factoid for you there.... now back to the cycling!

Turn off the A201 on to Partridge Green Road and continue to the High Street. At the T-junction, take a left on to the B2135. Keep an eye out on your left about half a mile on for Stan's Bike Shack. A great coffee stop (albeit quite soon on the route but that didn't stop us!). They do great coffee from their little timber framed building on the South Downs Way.

After a not really needed but rather nice coffee, continue on through Ashurst to the T-junction with the A283. Take a left, then an immediate right on to Horsham Road. Continue past Steyning Grammar School and go left into the High Street.

Take your time as you ride through the High Street, Steyning has existed since Anglo-Saxon times and is steeped in legend and history. There is some stunning architecture to be found including some medieval cottages on the corner of Church Street. A few Kodak (or iPhone) moments here!

Head out of Steyning on Bramber Road (it's well

signposted if you are not following the Garmin/GPX file) and then on to Clays Hill to the roundabout with the A283. Take the third exit here into Bramber. It's worth stopping here and looking up at Bramber Castle (or at least what's left of it!) built about 1070. Very little is known about the castle's history and despite my temptation to make up something impressive I'll keep this factual and will move on!

Leave Bramber through the High Street and cross the river to Upper Beeding. Take a left here on to Church Lane and bear right at the school on to School Road. Turn right at the T junction on to Decons way followed by a quick left then right on to Smugglers Lane. Continue until you come to the main road and turn left. You are not on the main road for long but be careful, it's fast moving and can be busy at times. Take the first right on to Edburton Road and (I hope you've not overeaten by this time) this is where the lumps begin.

This is a lovely undulating road along the base of the Downs. It's usually quiet but currently there are some works in progress for the new offshore wind farm, so keep an eye out for larger vehicles than you may expect during the week. Continue on, up the hill and into Fulking (home of The Shepherd and Dog) then Poynings (population of 432ish... another factoid for you there!) the home of the Royal Oak Pub and rather good they both are too, I hear!

On the bend by the pub there is a large manhole cover that is, to put it mildly, treacherous on a wet day so take it easy as you come round the corner. A slide here could take you out in the road towards any oncoming traffic.

From Poynings, take a right after the church over the hill to Saddlescombe Road. Left here, and then first right fork on to Beggars Lane. Straight over the A281 then parallel to the A23 before crossing the B2117 at Muddleswood. Straight on here up to the Albourne crossroad, right turn and back to Hustpierpoint and Hassocks for more tea and cake!

In Bitter Chill by Sarah Ward

BOOK REVIEW

In Bitter Chill, Sarah Ward's debut novel, is a gripping story involving kidnap, murder and family history. Although set in Derbyshire, Sarah's novels have been compared to Scandinavian thrillers and are a must read for crime fans who like their stories fast paced and well written.

The action switches between the present day and the events surrounding the abduction of two schoolgirls (Rachel Jones and Sophie Jenkins) in January 1978. Rachel returned unharmed but Sophie was never found. Rachel is unable to remember what happened, except that the abductor was a woman, and the case is never solved.

As an adult Rachel leads a solitary life as a family history researcher, haunted by her past but trying not to let it dictate her future. When Sophie's mother commits suicide near the anniversary of the abduction it leads the police to re-examine the old crime and Rachel becomes the focus of press attention once more.

There are some fantastic characters in this novel; particularly the women - Rachel, her formidable grandmother Nancy, and the young ambitious police officer Connie Childs. Ward also captures the 1970s in such forensic detail that I had flashbacks to my own childhood.

I read this in a day as I couldn't put it down and was delighted to discover that it was the start of a series. The second novel, A Deadly Thaw, is out now and is every bit as good.
