Lee and Andrée Tite, owners of Pierpoint Pet Supplies, have spoken of the 'amazing support' from the village community following the fire last September that devastated their popular High Street pet shop.

The couple received a cheque from Hurstpierpoint Village Fair and they have been overwhelmed by the generosity of the village, including crowdfunding and bucket collections to help them pay suppliers and replace lost stock, with anything salvageable from the ashes given to the Kit Wilson Trust for Animal Welfare.

"Trade since the fire has been down about 65%, but is slowly starting to rise. I think standing outside our shop in the High Street selling our Christmas stock in the freezing cold reminded people we are still trading," says Lee (pictured, right).

"The support from so many people in the village has been fantastic and humbling. We would like to thank every single one of them."

Pierpoint Pet Supplies is currently operating from a pop up shop at Washbrooks Farm, while they also run free local deliveries twice a week.

"Peter and Jess at Washbrooks supplied us with their old office portakabin which they moved with a tractor from the bottom of a field to the car park. We are so grateful to them," said Andrée. "And the dog-friendly tea room helps, not to mention a village of animal lovers!"

Both born and bred in the village, Lee and Andrée are hopeful that building work will start soon to restore their high street shop, which was founded by father and daughter Bob and Andrée Ward in 1991, with Andrée and Lee fully taking over the family business nine years ago.

The couple, who have two daughters Tallulah and Roberta, ran Hurstpierpoint Youth Club for 21 years; have worked in the village pubs and Andrée volunteers at Hurst Rainbows, who are sure to create a colourful float for the Fair procession, while Lee will be driving the Cottis Playgroup float.

"We have seen the Fair change over the last four decades and in our opinion it is now the best it has ever been with a real carnival atmosphere," says Lee.

The Village Fair committee also presented certificates recently to the Hurstpierpoint Army Cadet Force, who help out on Fair day fetching and carrying, setting up and breaking down stalls – last year in torrential rain – with their work going towards their Duke of Edinburgh Awards.

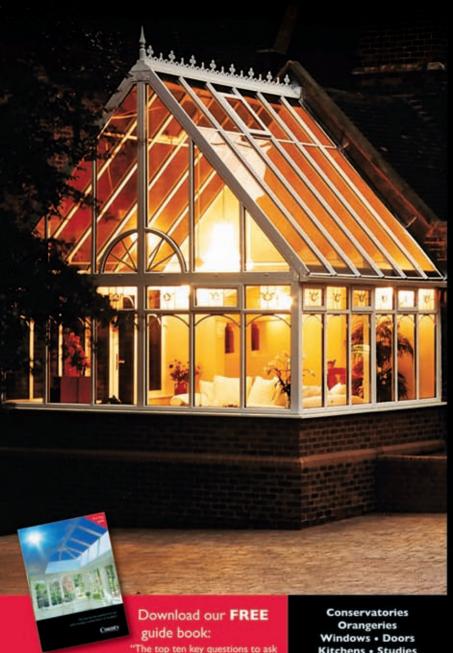

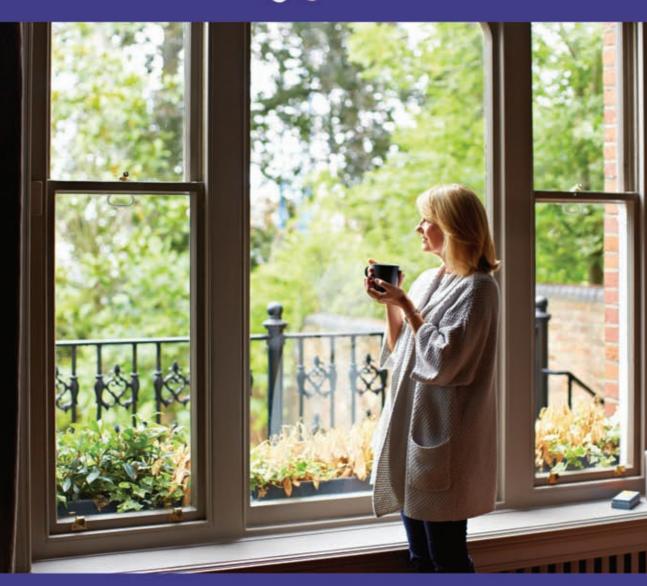

Meet the Albourne Preschool team

The preschool in Albourne (Albourne Under 5s) is an OFSTED registered establishment. It's been established since 1978 and was founded by Sue White, who retired recently after 38 years of dedicated work.

The school is co-run by Eve Gerhold and Tina Ware (part of the pre-existing team), who now share its responsibility.

It is based at the Albourne Village Hall, near the primary school and shares links equally with St Lawrence (Hurst) and Twineham.

Albourne Preschool offers a warm, nurturing, small, safe and rural community environment for your toddlers aged two to four and operates on a flexi-time arrangement from one to five times a week depending on needs, or even if Nan wants a day off from babysitting!

It was obvious to me, as a mum of a now grown-up daughter, that all the activities are chosen with care. Emphasis is placed on stimulating the child's natural curiosity, with themed nature-seasoned activities.

Ofsted commented in its last report: 'Interesting activities engage children and they are eager to take part. For example, children became engrossed as they peeled and carefully cut up an onion'.

"One of the great favourites," says Eve, "are the welly walks, inspired by Forest schooling, which is a form of outdoor schooling where emphasis can be placed on managing a wildlife garden, cooking on a camp fire or even making a pirate ship."

The next planned outdoor activity will be a trip in March to see the lambing at Saddlescombe Farm, near Devil's Dyke.

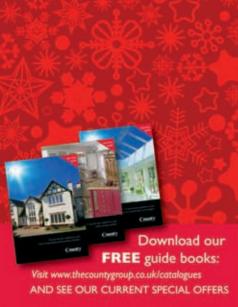

Last year, I was fortunate enough to visit Nepal and went to one of the schools in Kathmandu. Hit by the earthquake, several buildings needed rebuilding. Classes were still being held in a rusty cycle shed on the playground - without walls and open to the rain of the monsoon. I was struck by the optimism of both the staff and children in the face of disaster and difficulties.

The school was very proud of its library, which contained books which in England would have been updated years ago.

In Nepal, 40% of children do not attend school. The school I visited has fees of £150 a year, which for some families that earn less than £10 a week is out of reach.

Following an appeal to the parents of Hurstpierpoint Gymnastics Club parents, I was able to take some things there in December.

Subsequently, all the 150 books were exhibited in the playground, as it was much warmer outside than inside the school! Children and staff alike had never seen such colourful books (e.g. Dangerous Animals), with pop-ups (e.g. Ten Little Caterpillars) or texture (e.g. That's Not My Fairy). The school was keen to put them all directly into the library for children to access once a week. No school books had ever been allowed home before. I persuaded them to experiment with a Book Bag scheme for home reading. They were reluctant but agreed to give it a go.

I organised named Book Bags and four classes, approximately school Years 2, 3 and 4 consisting of one hundred children, took books home for the first time ever. Some of the families did not have a single book in their home. Every book was safely returned and exchanged, having been read to all the family. The children in Years 5, 6 & 7 wanted to have books too, but more would be needed to expand the scheme. The staff told me that about 10% of the parents were illiterate in Nepalese and even more in English. With no heating, many classrooms having no windows (just a hole in the wall), a very small library and no hall, I organised an outdoor classroom. To combine these needs I started a Shared/Paired Reading time each day, where Year 2s

were paired with a partner from Year 5 (Year 3 & 6, Year 4 & 7) to read alternate sentences, help with words and storylines. More often than not, the younger partner assisted the older one! This was so successful, that the staff agreed to add this activity to the timetable.

I left the school with heartfelt thanks to all of you ringing in my ears from everyone at the school.

The immediate needs are for more books to maintain and extend the schemes started, and for book covering material to extend the life of the books. The largest wholesaler in Nepal hadn't ever stocked 'sticky back plastic'. We need more books - new or nearly new and colourful.

To help finance the carriage, we have been given an executive pair of tickets for a West Ham game, including Two Directors Box tickets, with two Academy Lounge Passes for pre-match & half-time refreshments and two Boardroom Passes for full-time drinks with the Chairman, David Gold. These will be auctioned this half term - best bid for this magnificent prize by 17th February. The tickets must be sold to someone connected to the Club in any way and not re-auctioned via eBay or similar. Bids currently stand at £80 (at the time of going to print). Scottish-born Janice Kent arrived in Hurstpierpoint with her husband Bill and their two children, one at Sixth Form College and one at Secondary School, when they moved into their new family home 30 years ago.

Janice had decided to retrain in a new career, which took a little time and was very rewarding. It was only when she collapsed at work in January 1995 that she realised that something was seriously amiss. It took some time to get a diagnosis, but she received this when she was referred to St Bart's in London, where her daughter was working at the time. She was diagnosed as having Chronic Fatigue Syndrome, also known as ME.

In 1999 she decided to set up her charity with her husband Bill when he retired and she was feeling somewhat better – reMEmember (The Chronic Fatigue Society) was the first registered charity in Sussex to be set up to help patients and is based in Hurst.

One of the local patrons is none other than Howard Flight (now Lord Flight). He readily became a patron because one of his old school masters was severely affected by ME and he understood the problems that patients could experience.

Both Janice and Bill then spent some time contacting local ME groups around Sussex to assess their needs and concerns. What was needed was diagnosis and support for patients, who are badly affected

with many symptoms not just fatigue. They also have poor prospects, as many of them are far too unwell to work, even part time, let alone have a career, as many of them did before they were unwell.

In 2000 they started their first newsletter.

In 2001 they started running self-management courses in Hassocks with a colleague, Graham Wood, as he and Bill had vast experience of running self-management courses. They had both trained as trainers at Sunningdale (the Civil Service College). With Janice's

professional experience in pharmacy, working with patients and her holistic Yoga training, they were well placed to develop a course tailored to the specific needs of ME patients. Graham attended the same school as Lord Flight and knew about the problems patients faced too.

Philip Bedingham testifies: "I have had ME/CFS since 1999, and I was a participant on one of the first self-management courses that Janice and Bill ran. I found the course really helpful

and encouraging. The importance of pacing* was clearly explained, which is a key factor in managing CFS. The less we do, the less we are able to do, and so we have to continually gently push at our boundaries while not pushing ourselves too far. A tricky balance to keep!"



*Pacing is a technique used where ME sufferers are encouraged to split their activities into small bites and be in control of their time and activity.

Another milestone was reached in 2003, when all those concerned in Sussex were invited to express their needs and concerns at a meeting called by Lord Flight, with an invited member from the Mid Sussex Primary Care Group (NHS body). After further discussions with him and reMEmber, the Trust agreed to commission a service for the whole of Sussex. The Public Health specialist from the Mid Sussex Trust put in a bid to the Department of Health for funding, that was released after the Chief Medical Officer's Working Group reported. Janice was a member of that group. The Sussex-wide CFS/ME Service was launched in 2005 and is based in Haywards Heath.

Following this, in 2005 the Mid Sussex District Council, Mid Sussex Times and local Bright Radio presented reMEmber with the Mid Sussex Charity of the Year award.

Rachel Whitlam (pictured with her daughter) says that she was 40 years old when a blood specialist from Tunbridge Wells told her that she had CFS/ME. "He

didn't diagnose it exactly," she says, "rather he just dropped it in to the end of a half hour consultation about my blood disorder. I had asked if it was normal for someone with chronic immune neutrophils to have visual problems and pins and needles with extreme tiredness. He said it was exactly what he would expect from someone who had CFS. It was something of a groundbreaking moment and the start of my journey to recognise what had been wrong with me for the best part of my life."



After reading an article that Janice had written on ME/CFS and reMEmber, Rachel says: "I rang the charity helpline and spoke, for the first time in my life, to someone who actually seemed to know exactly what I had been going through."

Since then the charity has grown on a worldwide basis and the newsletter is dispatched as far as the USA and Australia and has developed nationally as well.

Bernie was diagnosed with ME in 2010. After many years of struggling on her own, she came across reMEmber. "I found the course of managing the illness life changing," she emphasises, "and talking with other people with similar problems certainly improved the feeling of isolation and gave me hope for the future. The main strategy which helped me was pacing."

Janice and Bill have been asked to join the APPG (All Party Parliamentary Group) on ME, of which Sir Nicolas Soames is a member and patron of reMEmber. Sir Peter Bottomley is the Chair of the APPG. In addition the Countess of Mar invited them to join her group (Forward ME) at the House of Lords.

In 2015, reMEmber was awarded the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service. The award was presented by Susan Pyper, the Lord-Lieutenant of West Sussex at a ceremony at Danny House in November 2015. Janice and Bill were also invited to a garden party at Buckingham Palace in May the same year.

This year reMEmber was awarded a small lottery grant from Awards for All, to develop a new website.

"The way forward to cope with a chronic illness is to help yourself," Janice says. "To change my life and focus on what I am still able to do."

As for the charity that she and husband Bill started all those years ago: "It has been a pleasure to see our charity grow and help hundreds of people with long-term illness, and we are grateful to our trustees and volunteers who have worked so hard to make this happen."

reMEmber regularly organises a number of fundraising events. The next one will be at Danny House on Friday 3rd February at 7.30pm. An Evening with Peter Owen Jones promises to be an entertaining night with an excellent speaker and well-known television presenter. 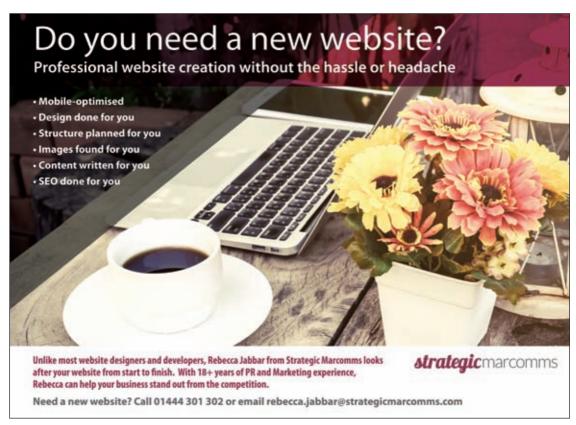

Ingredients (pancakes for 2 people)

2 eggs
60g all-purpose flour
100 ml vegetable stock (cooled)
250g shredded cabbage (as finely as you can)
3 spring onions (sliced finely)
2tsp freshly grated ginger
2tsp vegetable oil

Serve with Okonomiyaki sauce and, if desired, a little mayo. Can be garnished with sushi ginger and spring onion.

Tuesday 28th February is Pancake Day. It's a day which always makes me wonder why we don't eat pancakes more often. They are so simple and versatile. Here's an idea for something a little different. I have chosen this Japanese street food dish to share with you as traditional food from this part of the world is generally fresh and healthy; something I always give focus to in my Longevity Nutrition workshops.

Okonomiyaki is a Japanese savoury pancake containing a variety of ingredients. The name is derived from the word okonomi, meaning 'how you like or what you like', and yaki meaning 'grill'. So this is my kind of pancake as it contains simple ingredients of your choice so can be adapted to personal taste.



How to:

Beat together the eggs, flour and stock. Add a little salt. Stir in the shredded cabbage, half the onions and ginger.

Heat the oil in a non-stick frying pan. Pour in the mixture and tilt the pan enabling the pancake mix to spread evenly as you would with your usual pancake making.

Cover and cook on a low heat for around five minutes or until the base is crispy and golden. Then carefully invert on to a plate, now pop it back into the pan so the other side can cook. The pancake is done when the mixture is set and both sides are golden.

Garnish with the rest of the onion plus sushi ginger if

desired but remember this pancake is about 'what you like'. So I would go for the addition of fresh coriander. But more traditional variations include bacon, beansprouts or even noodles. This is the basic recipe but additional options are endless.

These pancakes are traditionally served with Okonomiyaki sauce which can be purchased from Asian supermarkets or try making your own. Whisk up the following with a fork in a small bowl: 4tbsp ketchup, 3½tbsp Worcestershire Sauce (or Japanese Usutah So-su), 2tbsp oyster sauce and 1tbsp honey. TIP: Some people just use HP sauce!

The Girls' Brigade (GB) is nearly 125 years old and will be celebrating this milestone in 2018 locally, nationally and internationally. It all started in Dublin in 1897 when girls who attended Sunday School asked their Sunday School Teacher, Miss Margaret Little, if they could come together for different activities on a week night and that's exactly what happened. It was called The Girls' Brigade of Ireland. A few years later, in Scotland, there was something similar, The Girls' Guildry, and then, in England and Wales, The Girls' Life Brigade (GLB) was born. These three organisations came together in 1965 to form The Girls' Brigade (GB).

GLB started in Hurstpierpoint some time before 1947 with girls meeting at the Evangelical Church. However, in 1947 it moved to the Methodist Church, retaining its title of 1st Hurstpierpoint Girls' Life Brigade which is unusual. Normally, if a company closes in one church, it cannot retain its name after transferring to another church.

The first Captain was Miss Ruth Clark, followed by Mrs Gina Upton (1964-1979), then Mrs Daphne Cooper (1979-1987) and from 1987 to date Mrs Margaret Taylor. Between these Captains, they have seen over 800 girls pass through the Company.

The Company is divided into four sections, Explorers aged from school Reception Class to Year 3, Juniors Year 4 to Year 6, Seniors Year 7 to Year 9 and Brigaders Year 10 and above. Each girl works for a badge every half-term, the Explorers come under the heading of n:vestigate, Juniors n:gage, Seniors n:counter and Brigaders n:spire. When a girl satisfactorily completes a subject, she is awarded her badge and a certificate. As well as enjoying working for badges, there is plenty of time for craft and games during the evening, and the older girls always seem to incorporate some form of cooking or food sampling during their session!

Every year we take girls to canvas camp either to a site in East Sussex or, for the older girls, a lakeside campsite near Ringwood. The girls enjoy looking after their tents, vying with each squad for Best Tent Award or Squad Points which all add up to prizes at the end of the week. They love playing wide games, their visit to the seaside for beach activities and 'Hunt the Officer' and, of course, the nightly camp fire.

Other activities that some of the older girls and Leaders have been able to do is taking part in the National Remembrance Day Parade in Whitehall, watching the regiments at the Trooping of the Colour to celebrate the Queen's Official Birthday, seeing Prince William and Kate Middleton before and after their Wedding Ceremony as they travelled in an open coach through Horse Guards Parade and, from a vantage point, on Westminster Bridge viewing the Water Pageant celebrating the Queen's 90th Birthday. One of the current leaders has also had the opportunity to travel to





Australia and Thailand as part of the delegation at GB's International Conferences in those countries.

The Company was fortunate in gaining the Best Dressed Stall award at the 2016 St Lawrence Fair.

GB encourages the girls to take part in Social Action. Recent events have been supporting the Guide Dogs for the Blind Association, holding a Skip-a-thon and putting together Christmas Shoeboxes which are sent abroad so that children who would not otherwise have anything to open on Christmas morning receive a shoebox full of presents.

We have a very nice uniform, which many of you will have seen as the girls march in the Village Remembrance Sunday Parade every year.

The Girls' Brigade is a Christian organisation and, in Hurstpierpoint, meets at the Methodist Church in Cuckfield Road on Wednesdays in term time 5.15-6.30pm for the Explorers and 6.30-8pm for the other sections. BOOK REVIEW

With Valentine's Day just around the corner why not try reading 'Eligible', a witty and engaging look at courtship that is also a retelling of Jane Austen's great love story 'Pride and Prejudice', with the action moved to contemporary Cincinnati. I avoided the other books released by the Austen Project (Sense and Sensibility by Joanna Trollope, Northanger Abbey by Val McDermid and Emma by Alexander McCall Smith) but was tempted to give this one a try as I enjoyed the author's previous work.

When the story begins Mr Bennett has suffered a heart attack, which brings career girls Jane and Liz home from New York. It soon becomes clear that the Bennett home is in a state of disrepair and there doesn't appear to be much money available to fix anything, although Mr and Mrs Bennett deny they have money worries. The New Yorkers soon find that being back in the family home with their parents and three younger sisters causes them to revert to childhood patterns of behaviour, with Jane as peacemaker while Liz is infuriated by her extravagant mother and workshy siblings.

Curtis Sittenfeld has wisely chosen not to try to recreate the classic novel but to pay homage to it, the same approach used for 'Bridget Jones's Diary: most of the names and situations will be recognisable, but this is a book than can be read and enjoyed without spoiling the original.

Pick up a copy on your next visit to Hurst Library, there will be copies on display throughout February.

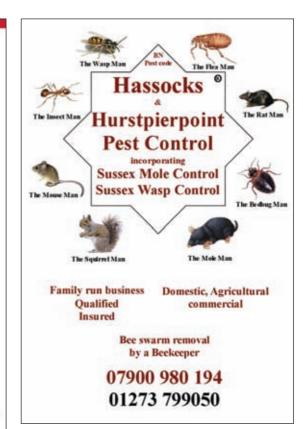

Go north to Handcross

ON YOUR BIKE

This month's ride is suitable for intermediate riders and takes the riders 38 miles through some stunning country lanes and villages to Handcross. Our cycling correspondent Ross McCracken says not to ride it in the pouring rain..... or on a Wednesday..... Trust him!

Once again the route starts at Proper Cycling & Coffee in Hassocks and heads out under the railway bridge and straight over the crossroads towards Hustpierpoint.

Just after the Hustpierpoint 'welcome' sign take a right turn into College Lane.

Continue until you reach Hustpierpoint College and turn left (mind the enormous pothole!). Take the next right, being careful on the bend, into Danworth Lane.

Danworth Lane is a lovely, quiet lane but avoid it in bad weather. The rain brings a lot of debris on to the road, the centre of which is green and slippery with moss in places.

Just over a mile on Danworth Lane (it does turn into High Hatch Lane but just keep on going) continue over Cuckfield Road by The Sportsman pub into Bishopstone Lane. The lane is marked as a dead end but fear not! It is open for cyclists and pedestrians.

Continue on until you reach the main road. Go straight over the main road and fork right continuing on Bishopstone Lane.

Continue on this quiet, largely traffic-free, road and after a relatively flat route so far it's time to enjoy some more undulating terrain to get a bit of warmth in those legs. Take care again if it's damp here and stay clear of the moss in the centre of the road.

At the end of the lane cross the main road and continue straight on. Again, take care crossing the main road as visibility is limited.

You are now on Pickwell Lane, another fine example of the beautiful lanes available to us here in West Sussex. Sadly, currently ruined by flytippers - very disappointing and such a shame. Don't let it put you off however and enjoy a few more short, sharp climbs.

At the end of the road turn right into Broxmead Lane, signposted to Cuckfield.

Remember to sit up as you ride here and enjoy the views over the hills to your left.

There are some lovely houses here, too, demonstrating several periods of differing architecture.

At the end of the lane, after a steep climb, turn left on to the B2115 then take the first right on to Mallions Lane. It's a small turning so don't miss it!

Continue for around a mile.

Watch out for the 'Slow Ducks
Crossing' (they must be of the lazy
variety) and keep an eye out for the plastic deer on your
left in the woods (yes, you read that correctly). Then turn
right into Staplefield Lane.



At the end of the road continue straight over and ride down the side of the cricket pitch to the T-junction with the B2114 Cuckfield Road. Turn left and head up the hill towards Handcross.

Continue through Handcross High Street to the roundabout and take the second exit continuing on the B2110, High Beeches Lane. Just over a mile later on that road you will find the coffee stop, High Beeches, on your right hand side.

Unless you have come on a Wednesday, you will find a warm welcome and great coffee here. I was, however, met with locked gates and a feeling I should have googled the opening times before I set off!

Assuming you've had more luck than I did and enjoyed your refreshments, leave High Beeches the way you came and head back through Handcross (a great pub, the Red Lion, here is an alternative stop if you fancy something stronger, or it's a Wednesday!). Head down the hill back to the cricket pitch turning right back the way you came. Once you've gone back up the side of the cricket pitch this time turn right on to Staplefield Road towards Slaugham (population 2,226... a little educational fact there!).

Go through the tunnels under the A23 on to quieter roads.

As the road opens up go through Slaugham (I'd recommend The Chequers pub here if you've not already stopped) and turn left about a mile further on into Slaugham Lane, heading south towards Warninglid.

Continue past the primary school and the Half Moon pub and go straight over the B2115.

The route gets a little lumpy here, so it's a good opportunity to work off at least some of the coffee stop. Bear left at the next junction heading towards Wineham



and go straight over the A272 on to Wineham Lane. There is a good opportunity to pick up some local produce for sale at the side of the road here... even the bales of hay are very reasonably priced if you can get one in your saddle bag! There are also a number of palm trees along the road. Not very Sussex but it seems to work here for some reason!

A few miles later bear left on to Henfield Road towards Woodmancote and turn right into Blackstone Lane. Go through Blackstone into Woodmancote to the A281. Turn right then immediate left on to Bramlands Lane. Do be careful at the junction here, it's not got the best visibility and scooting across the road having missed a cleat is a scary experience.

Continue on Bramlands Lane (take the first left hand fork), then turn right after the bridge into Clappers Lane.

Enjoy the undulating countryside here and the challenge of a few tough climbs with the descents as a reward. There's a great view of the Downs here, too, just before you enter Fulking.

Take care in the wet, it's slippery, and take a left at the end of the road. Now follow the base of the Downs on Poynings Road.

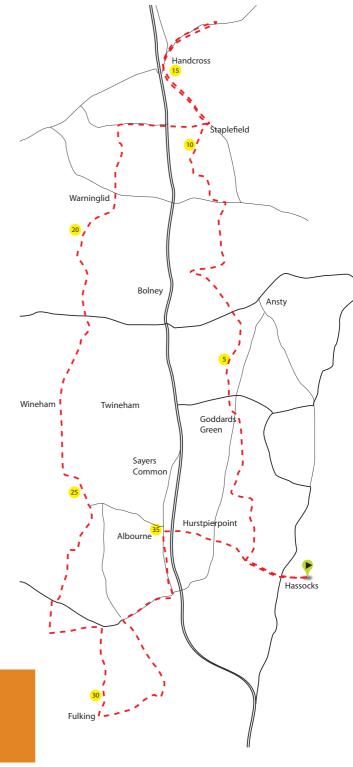
Once through Poynings past the Broad Oak pub on your left, turn right, signposted to Devils Dyke, just after the church. Be ready for a steep climb here but remember, you are only five miles or so from that next coffee and cake at Proper Cycling & Coffee (they do beers and wines too!).

At the top of the hill turn left on to Saddlescombe Road. Head down the hill while your legs recover and take the second exit at the roundabout signposted towards Henfield and Horsham. You are now on the A281 so take care on this faster, busier road. One mile further on turn right at the Ginger Fox pub on to the B2117.

Continue past the golf course, up the hill and turn left on to the B2118 to Albourne. At the crossroads, turn right on to Albourne Road and continue through Hustpierpoint back to Hassocks where you can congratulate yourself on 38 miles. Well done!

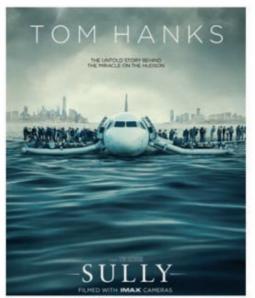
