

The four ladies (Chris Thomas, Jenny Goodman, Kathy Green and Brenda Davies), who all live in Hurst, had to beat the best teams in Sussex in order to represent Sussex in the National Championships this summer at Leamington. There they were up against the best from 37 other counties and, in a very arduous week of competition, they beat Warwickshire, Cumbria, Bedfordshire and Devon before overcoming Hertfordshire in the final. As national champions they have therefore qualified to represent England.

Two years ago, they also reached the final of the National Open competition but, on that occasion, were runners up. They were therefore delighted to go one better this year and be able to go on to play for England.

All four ladies have been Hurstpierpoint Bowling Club's champions at singles in recent years. Their success at Club, County and National level has encouraged many of the Club's newer lady members to enter the County competitions, with a steady growth in success.

The Club's Bowls and Beer Festival at the beginning of last month attracted 20 mixed teams of novice bowlers



from sports clubs, organisations and groups of friends. Their enthusiasm for the game and the way that they improved over the course of the afternoon was good to see. The winning team was three ladies from the cricket club – Sarah Ems, Tanya Tunley and Julie Rand. Other sports that brought their competitive spirit and skills to the bowling green were golf and rugby. The New Inn, after its success in the Club's recent Proam tournament, was also represented along with an RNLI team. One player, in a family team, was a young girl, proving to the many spectators that bowls can be enjoyed at any age!



#### Wine Festival in Hurst next month


South Downs Cellars is delighted to announce that on Saturday 11th November, Hurstpierpoint's first Wine Festival will be held in the Scout HQ on Brown Twins Road, Hurstpierpoint. The event will bring together a selection of some of Sussex's best wine producers including Wiston Estate, being poured by the winemaker, Dermot Sugrue himself, as well as dozens of wines from around the world including wines from Portugal, Spain, France, Italy, Australia, New Zealand and more. For those requiring a palate cleanser, there will also be a selection of Sussex gins and craft beers available to purchase, as well as food and live music. The Festival will follow the typical format, with a £5 entry fee (which will get you your tasting glass). Tokens will then need to be purchased for £1 each, and exchanged for drinks of your choice. Depending on the value of the drink chosen, the number of tokens required per glass will vary.

This is just one of many events being organised by South Downs Cellars this Autumn. Other events include a Burgundy Masterclass being held at Ockenden Manor in Cuckfield on Thursday 5th October at 8pm, with wines presented by Richard Lashbrook MW, a man who has made his passion for wine, and most especially Burgundy, his life. Tickets cost £50 per person and include a tutored tasting of eight fine burgundies, accompanied by a selection of canapes laid on by Ockenden Manor.

Another triumph for Hurst CC came away from the cricket field when we entered a couple of teams into a tournament arranged by our good friends at Hurstpierpoint Bowls Club. Despite having never picked up a wood the Hurst Hoorahs triumphed, with a Crusaders side, nursing epic hangovers from the promotion celebrations, managing a creditable third place. Thanks to all at the bowls club for a brilliant day.

Next year the Hurst 3rd XI will enter the league structure playing competitive cricket but this season finished with a couple of friendlies at Wivelsfield and Southwick respectively. Congratulations to Emily Green and Isabella Sawyer, who made their senior debuts at Wivelsfield, and to skipper Richard Ball who achieved a scarcely believable triple wicket maiden during the game at Southwick.

Elsewhere the 300 year celebrations continued with a day at the home of Sussex cricket, the County Ground,

Hove. Proceedings kicked off with a junior softball competition featuring Hurst Under 9s and 10s together with teams invited from Rottingdean, Henfield, Ditchling and Ifield. Over 90 kids had a brilliant time. Throughout the day various Hurst teams competed, including a Reggies XI vs Sarah's XI and a Sharks Staff versus Hurst XI game. There was lots going on off the field too with burgers and hot dogs flying off the BBQ and quite a crowd of friends and parents looking on. It was a great thrill for Hurst players to play on a ground that has staged so many historic games and even seeing their names on a scoreboard that usually features the likes of Luke Wright and Chris Jordan. Last word to Arthur Tunley Lo, first team player and Hurst College student, who declared it one of the best days of his life. A huge vote of thanks should go to Matt Parsons for organising such a fantastic day of celebration for our club.





# Pupils go down to the woods

If you go down to the woods today... you will probably find one of new Year 7 tutor groups from Downlands School – the nearest secondary school to the village – discovering the fun and excitement of the woods in the corner of the school grounds.

Nestled at the foot of the South Downs, the school grounds are extensive and a quiet corner of the woods is easy to find. Together with Forest Schools expert Mr Stokes, each Year 7 tutor group has, over the last week or so, spent a day in the woods getting to know each other and taking part in awesome activities from building a fire, making woodland creatures out of clay, toasting marshmallows over the fire to gathering firewood.

But it wasn't just the younger students taking part the Year 11 Prefects were helping Mr Stokes, along with the form tutors and teaching assistants.

The art of effective communication is a complex mix of words and tone, speed of speech, eye contact, body language, smiles, depth and rate of breathing, rapport and so much more. For just now, let's keep it simple and only consider some of the words we choose to use; we could be so much more effective in communicating if we understood what we do with certain words in our heads.

To illustrate my point...let's consider some sports coaches I've been working with recently; as a starting point, I sat in and watched (and more importantly listened to) their sessions. They used a lot of what they thought was positive and encouraging language: 'oh don't worry...I know it's hard', 'don't put your head down', 'don't forget to straighten your legs', 'keep trying...don't give up'... you see the coaches were really good at reinforcing the unwanted negative, behaviours.

Imagine you have a long to-do list at work and it's stressing you out. If a well-meaning colleague says 'oh don't worry about it, relax!'... what's your immediate reaction, without realising it? You start to think about the to-do list. Maybe you make a picture of it in your head, look at all of the things on the list, maybe it looks huge, you can't see what needs to be done, you don't have time, it's a big list and now you're really worrying!

What happens is this: in order to process the negative (the 'don't' part of the sentence) the brain first has to 'rehearse' the rest; so if the coach says 'ok...don't miss it'...the brain first has to picture or rehearse, what a 'miss' looks like, sounds like and what it feels like to miss and then it has to say to itself 'ok I don't want to do that'. Sadly, what has happened in a nano-second, is that the brain has rehearsed 'missing' (or worrying). This results in a neural pathway being made in the brain and, simply put, the stronger the neural pathway and the more automatic the response becomes, we worry and we miss, really easily! And the more times we rehearse something (even in our heads) the better we get at it (ever watched the pilot of a bobsleigh team rehearsing the turns before the run itself?). This is great if we're rehearsing something positive but not so good if we're


instructed to rehearse a negative such as 'don't miss' or 'don't worry'.

Working with the coaches, we devised lots of new ways of giving the same instruction but using positive and specific language instead, so that the brain just rehearsed the positive behaviour and made strong neural connections to the preferred outcome. The coaches used phrases like: 'remember... straighten your legs', 'stand tall, head up high', 'spot the catch'; while 'don't' worry' became 'ok, take a breath, now relax'. Focusing on the word 'try' for a moment... say 'I tried' to yourself, now say 'I did'. How do they feel, how do they feel different? Generally, there's a sense of failure with 'I tried'. Recognising this, we basically removed the word 'try' from the coaching vocabulary... we started using phrases like 'when you do it next time', 'let's just do it', 'ok, better... now do it like this...'. Understanding what we've talked about...imagine the impact of replacing the phrase 'don't worry...keep trying' (your brain processes this as 'worry and keep failing') with 'ok, take a breath... now, let's do it this way'. What a transformation!

The impact of just framing language in the positive and replacing the word 'try' was huge! I used many different techniques with the coaching staff, mixing and blending strategies, giving them tactics to allow them to maximise their effectiveness and refine their coaching 'style' and the results were impressive...even the coaches were far more confident.

Effective communication and affecting positive changes in behaviour are unwritten fundamentals in parenting, education, successful selling, people management, business meetings, team effectiveness... the list is endless. If nothing else, use the phrase 'have a cup of tea and relax' as it's immensely more powerful than 'don't worry, try and relax'.

We talk a lot about the weather in this country but recent events in the United States and the Caribbean make you realise that we have a pretty benign climate in Sussex, and we definitely don't have hurricanes here. It was therefore a bit of a surprise to the residents of Hurstpierpoint (and much of South East England) to wake up on the morning of 16th October 1987 to scenes of widespread devastation. It wasn't a hurricane, as weather forecaster Michael Fish had assured us the night before, but something pretty dramatic had certainly happened during the night. What had occurred was that a rapidly deepening depression had formed in the Bay of Biscay and then swept up the English Channel during the early hours of the morning. A wind speed of 100 knots (115 mph) was recorded at Shoreham.

My wife and I had moved into our house in Albourne Road just a few months previously and were pleased to find that our tough old 19th century property had withstood the phenomenal winds pretty well. On opening the front door, however, things were definitely not right and Albourne Road was not as it had been the day before. The morning was eerily quiet - no traffic! A quick glance up or down the road soon revealed why. All that could be seen to both east and west were horizontal trees - just a few of the 15 million that fell across the country that night. The road was strewn with bricks that had once been walls, and electricity poles were snapped like matchsticks. Somewhere in the tree canopy (now at ground level) were two cars that we had foolishly parked the previous evening in the lay-by near Pakyns Manor - including our much loved 1966 Morris Minor Convertible. Surprisingly, on penetrating the vegetation we found that both cars were completely unscathed! Not everyone got off so lightly however. One of our neighbours had more than a dozen holes in his roof caused by falling branches from a large tree behind

his property and he admitted that in the middle of the night he thought his end had come. Very sadly, there were indeed a number of fatalities in other parts of the country.

The aftermath of the Great Storm was a power cut that lasted for two weeks in our outlying part of the village. This was long before the days of UK Power Networks and those regular texts that update you with progress towards getting the power back. Engineers were drafted in from distant parts of the UK to deal with the unprecedented situation, and we recall the frustration of watching their vehicles driving past our cold and dark home without stopping (there was always a more urgent job elsewhere it seemed). One positive aspect of the situation was that it was a great way to get to know your neighbours better, and almost everyone showed amazing kindness in helping each other out.

But as we approach the 30th anniversary of this event let's keep things in perspective. It was of course a tragedy that people died in the Great Storm. However, our local problems were as nothing compared to what has happened recently to so many people in Texas, Florida and the islands of the eastern Caribbean. That said, I'd rather it didn't happen here again!







At last, a new season upon us and with projector wiped and speakers tuned we present three very different films for October:

#### Wednesday 11th October 8pm Lady Macbeth

We open with Lady Macbeth, based on a Russian novella, not Shakespeare. Katherine is trapped in an arranged marriage in the North East at the turn of the last century, essentially kept prisoner by her vile father-in-law and dysfunctional son. Bored beyond belief she takes action, but flaunting convention cannot go unpunished. This dark and powerful psychological drama is both riveting and chilling and boasts a standout performance from Florence Pugh.

#### Friday 27th October 8pm Free Fire

A rare combination in a film; a gripping thriller which is also very funny. It's the early 70s and a group of IRA operatives meet a South African gunrunner in a Boston warehouse planning to take a cache of M16 rifles back to Ireland. The deal goes spectacularly wrong, and Brighton filmmaker Ben Wheatley treats us to one of the most epic shootouts in recent memory. Everyone has a gun but no one is in control. The story of double-crossing is as old as the hills but Free Fire tells it in a refreshing new way whilst parodying the insanity of gun violence. A good old-fashioned hoot!

#### Sunday 29th October 8pm Hidden Figures

Three unsung heroes of the 1960s space race are given their moment in the sun here. Their story is particularly inspiring because they were African American women who, as well as calculating the angles of re-entry, had to jump through hoops at NASA when racial segregation was still a fact of life. Every day, Math's whizz Katherine G Johnson must cross the grounds at Langley Research centre to use the 'colored ladies room', in a literal running gag, although it not inherently a laughing matter. This film presses all the right buttons for a blast of enlightening, upbeat entertainment.



Peter Ross, who is Hurst based, has an interesting career history which enabled him to become involved with the Quicksilver 500 project from 1998 to 1999 as a project manager. This was a British wheel driven land speed record project. Running alongside this he became part of the Thrust SSC project from July 1995 to April 1998 as an engineering manager. Thrust SSC celebrates its 20th anniversary this 15th October in the Nevada desert.

Peter Ross grew up in Sussex. He has three children from a previous marriage, Ben, Abby and Ellen. The family used to be based in Hurstpierpoint. Peter subsequently remarried, but he is no longer in that relationship. Engineer trained, he got involved in and was responsible for the team recruitment and organisation of the Quicksilver 500 project from April 1998 to April 1999, which then led him to take part in the Supersonic Land Speed record Project, Thrust SSC 20 years ago. As an engineering Manager he was responsible for the initial build programming, acquiring sponsorship and recruitment and team placement. The Thrust supersonic car is a British jet-propelled car developed by Richard Noble, Glynne Bowsher, Ron Ayers and Jeremy Bliss. The car is 16.5 metres long and 3.7 metres wide and weighed nearly 10 tons, with a total thrust of 223 kN, equivalent to 763 miles or 1227.986km/h. It became the fastest car in the world and the first car to officially break the sound barrier. Thus the Thrust SSC became subsequently known as the Bloodhound Project.

The car was driven by Royal Air Force fighter pilot Wing Commander Andy Green in the Black Rock Desert in the state of Nevada on 15th October 1997. The team's aim was to enable the car to become the first land vehicle to officially break the sound barrier.

"It was no mean feat to achieve," remembers Richard Noble, who was part of the initial team with Andy Green and Ron Ayers, to name but a few. "We virtually had to fight Britain to get the interest and this project off the ground," he remembers.

"The Thrust SSC is now displayed at the Coventry Transport Museum, as part of the Museum's redevelopment project," explains Beccy, who is Peter's carer and friend. "He visited it there with the team some years ago and was even invited to go to the Houses of Parliament!"

Five years ago Peter's life changed dramatically when he was hit by a severe stroke, which 'hit him out of the blue'. Unconscious for a long time, he had to be rehomed into rented accommodation, which had to be furnished and adapted for his needs. The stroke has left Peter paralysed on his left hand side and his speech has been greatly impaired. "Once a week, Peter goes to Newick to a Headway centre for people with brain damage," explains Beccy. Though their paths crossed because of Independent Life Styles, the agency that Beccy works for, which favours care from the home, they realised, on meeting, that their children had been to the same school.

Beccy has quite obviously spent some quality time in helping Peter settle into his small home, making it as comfortable as possible for him.

The idea of taking Peter to celebrate the 20th anniversary of Thrust SSC emanated from the group of friends who were involved in the project so many years ago and still keep in touch. They scraped the money together, with friends, to go there. Beccy will be going with them. They will be taking the plane to Nevada and then driving to the desert. An adventure to which Peter is clearly looking forward to, and he has decided to wear the T-Shirt that he wore all those years ago for the photo shoots.





Peter showed me the models he has of the car and, even to a novice like me, they are really a beautiful sight. There is truly pride in his eyes, as I view them with him.

Peter enjoys cooking curries in his spare time. "The meaty ones," he adds, and he also enjoys going up and down the Cuckfield Road on his motorised scooter.

Some Hurst residents might even see him there, as I have before we met.

We wish him well in his celebratory trip with his team and Beccy and look forward to more pictures and feedback when he returns.

### Slade House by David Mitchell

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

On the last Saturday in October you may be invited to Slade House – it's hard to find your way, but you will be made very welcome when you arrive and you will never leave, no matter how hard you try.....

This short novel started out as a short story on Twitter and grew from there, inspired by the HG Wells tale 'The Door in the Wall'. This is a satisfying stand-alone read, but for long-time fans there are lots of references to characters from previous books by David Mitchell, who is my favourite contemporary author.

The book starts prosaically enough – a thirteen year old boy called Nathan Bishop is reluctantly accompanying his mother to a party, but when they arrive at Slade House it seems Yehudi Menuhin has turned up unexpectedly and would love to play a duet with Mrs Bishop, while Nathan is sent to play with a boy his own age who suggests a game called 'fox and hounds'. Nathan and his mother are never seen again. Starting on Saturday 27th October 1979, the disappearance of the Bishops is just the start of a string of mysterious happenings at Slade House: there are five sections that take place at nine year intervals, ending on Saturday 31st October 2015, so this is a suitably spooky read for Halloween.

Pick up a copy on your next visit to Hurst Library, there will be copies on display throughout October.

### Tennis open day a great success

This highly nutritious starchy vegetable is at the root of my Longevity Cookery Workshop and talks. Being an excellent source of some of the chief immune boosting nutrients, the sweet potato must surely take some of the credit for the great life spans of certain 'Blue Zones' where populations boast not only a high number of centenarians but an enhanced degree of health well into old age. There are many ways to incorporate this brightly coloured potato into our weekly repertoire of recipes. I have chosen this one as it's fun for the kids, perfect for messy play, easily digestible for those needing to boost their daily fibre and truly delicious. As the preparation process is a great creative opportunity, I'll be using this during my next workshop for the blind and partially sighted at the Torch Retreat to draw on the senses of taste, touch and smell.



#### Method

- 1. In a food processor blend all the ingredients (apart from the toppings) together until very well combined.
- Gently form into 12 balls, if too sticky use a little flour on your hands. Chill for 15 mins in the fridge. Then using a large plate with your toppings sprinkled over, roll carefully so as not to squish the shape. This is where the creative process can be fun as interesting patterns can be made.
- \* The amount of ground almond needed may vary depending on the level of moisture in the potatoes.

Store in fridge
