







# Downlands students pay tribute to WWI soldier


In October 28 Year 10 students took a day trip to Belgium to explore medicine and surgery used on the Western Front during the First World War.

Students visited the site of a gas attack, dressing station and casualty clearing station. Students were given the opportunity to handle original WWI artefacts including a rifle and medical kit.

#### **England cricket call for George**

Former Hurst College pupil George Garton joined the England cricket squad in Australia last week having been called up for the side's final warm-up match before the Ashes series started.

George, who joined Hurst College in the Prep School and left in 2015, is a product of the Sussex Cricket youth programme, first representing the county at under-10 level. After spending two years in the Academy, he signed his first professional contract as an 18-year-old at the end of 2015.

A left-arm seamer, George made his first team debut for Sussex at the beginning of the 2016 season, and since then has played eight first class, ten one-day and twelve T20 matches for Sussex, taking 46 wickets across all formats. He has recently signed a two-year contract extension, which will see him stay with Sussex Cricket until at least the end of the 2020 season.



Here's a tip for you: if you want to travel incognito do not carry a huge silver cup around with you. This is what David Saitch learned after being awarded the prestigious Roebuck Cup at the Film Society of the Year Awards at Sheffield last month. 'Go on my son, champion' shouted one taxi driver out of his window. Others honked their horns. Conversations were struck on up the train home and even on a London escalator at the sight of this huge trophy.

The evening before, we were in our seats at the Sheffield Showrooms having been awarded a distinction for marketing earlier in the ceremony. I was very pleased and David looked pleased, although underneath I could tell he was chuntering about what more he had to do to win the darn thing.

"The Roebuck Cup is awarded to those remarkable individuals..." continued Deborah Parker, the chief exec of Cinema for All. My mind was wandering and David was texting Manon, asking what more he had to win the darn marketing award. "...names have been engraved upon the Roebuck Cup since 1979 - men and women who have given that extra something to the film society sector..."

At least we get our photo taken with Danny Leigh and Derek Malcolm for our marketing award, I thought. It then occurred to me that I was wearing the same dark top I had been at the last two awards. Oh well, no one will notice.

"...known to many for his attendance at this event, year after year, his continual support of groups all over the country..." Well, it's a man this year, I mused. "... he has been running his own group for many years, bringing great cinema to his community in West Sussex".

In true sitcom fashion David and I exchanged a glance. "…several years ago he set up the UK Film Societies Facebook page to bring you all together…".

"Oh flip", said David, (I may have misheard), as he realised he would have to go on stage and say something. The tributes continued as he gathered his thoughts: Katie Brandwood of Stanley's Film Club said:

"We are indebted to David for enabling us to get back on our feet after losing access to our equipment, along with our long-term venue. In response to a plea for help on the UK Film Societies group in May, David arranged for the spare projector at his own film society, the Hurst Village Cinema, to be given to us on extended loan, going out of his way to handover the projector in a matter of hours."

David strode to the stage and modestly accepted the award. "All I did was create a Facebook page, it took 20 minutes."

Back in Hurst, David reflects: "Blimey, it is sinking in. I had some really lovely email messages from Jaq, Abi and Deborah (Cinema for All) all saying in different ways that it was clear I didn't realise what an impact I had had on the whole movement. Before I came along, all film societies and community cinemas worked in isolation and only got together once a year, and I had transformed it into a totally collaborative movement with people sharing ideas, asking for and receiving help, discussing things and helping each other on virtually a daily basis."

With David and Manon Saitch at the helm, Hurst Village Cinema has been nominated and received awards every year since it started and it now has one of the largest! Something for David and the village to be very proud of.





## Top tips for your tree

Here's some simple tips for keeping your Christmas tree fresh and fragrant all through the festive period from John Main, Oakgates Christmas Tree Farm in Scaynes Hill.

The key to good needle retention and maintaining a healthy looking Christmas tree is freshness. When choosing a tree a good guide is that a heavy tree is still holding moisture whilst a light tree has dried out. Better still choose a tree that is still growing and it's an easier way to judge size and shape.

Before bringing your tree into your home and placing in a stand, cut 1cm off the base of the trunk. This ensures that the tree stem is open and will take up water immediately the tree is secured in its stand. The same should be done if you are displaying the tree outside, but anchor it to a wall approximately half way up the tree with a suitable tie.

Position away from any radiators or open fires.

Trees are very thirsty! They may drink between  $\frac{1}{2}$  and two litres every day, so always use a water holding stand with a capacity of two litres.

With your tree watered, remove the netting and start on the business of decoration.

Check the stand daily and fill with fresh water as needed.

A Christmas tree is a natural product cared for by the grower for six to ten years before coming into your home. It is a plantation tree, grown for your enjoyment and not taken from natural woodland. For every tree sold it is common practice to plant a new sapling in its place. Choosing a tree can be great fun for all the family. Some Christmas tree farms operate a 'choose and cut' scheme (you choose, they cut). Trees can be taken away immediately or labelled for collection on a date nearer to Christmas. They are all different, so enquire first.

At the end of the Christmas season recycle your tree. Most Local Authorities operate a chipping scheme. In Hurstpierpoint there is a collection point at Trinity Road Car Park.



When she is attacked at home by a masked intruder she appears to shrug it off; she doesn't report it to the police and goes about her business as if nothing has happened. When she is contacted by her attacker a game of cat and mouse ensues and it becomes clear that all has not been forgiven in her mind. Not just a revenge noir, it houses Gallic social satire in a wild, provocative, dark and funny film.

Thurday 7th December 7pm – NT Live: Young Marx. Broadcast live from the Bridge Theatre London and directed by Nicholas Hytner it reunites the team behind the Broadway and West End hit One Man, Two Guvnors. It is 1850 and Europe's most feared terrorist is hiding in Dean Street, Soho. Broke, restless and horny, the revolutionary is a frothing combination of intellect brilliance, invective, wit and childlike emotional illiteracy.

Creditors, spies, rival revolutionary factions and prospective seducers of his beautiful wife all circle like vultures. His writing blocked, his marriage dying, his friend Engels (Oliver Chris, Green Wing, The Office), is in despair. There is still no one in London however, who can give you a better night out than Karl Marx (Rory Kinnear, Threepenny Opera, Othello).

Finally on **Sunday 17th December 3pm** we show **Their Finest (PG)**. The year is 1940 and the British Ministry turns to propaganda films to boost morale at home. In charge of the female dialogue is Catrin Cole (Gemma Arterton) and although her husband does not approve of her job, her natural flair soon gets noticed by the cynical, witty lead scriptwriter Buckley (San Claflin). Soon they set about making an epic feature based on the Dunkirk rescue, starring the gloriously vain, former matinee idol Ambrose Hilliard (Bill Nighy). With bombs falling all around them Catrin, Buckley and the colouful cast and crew work furiously to make a film that will warm the hearts of the nation.



If you want to have a career in writing, you could certainly take a feather from Sheila's hat.

Sheila Rance, a published author, initially moved to the village about 40 years ago with her husband, and then had two daughters, both of whom attended St Lawrence Primary School, before going to Downlands School.

Whilst the girls were schooled at St Lawrence, Sheila and a group of parents decided to help sponsor and build the swimming pool there, aided and designed by her husband David, at the time when Mr Harrison was Head, in the late 1970s.

"The original drawings are probably still there," she says.

"There have been many changes since we've been here. Namely, far fewer shops on the High Street, but one of the long standing ones is the greengrocer's shop, which is a family run business. However, some things never change, such as the St Lawrence Fair. It remains a constant in Hurstpierpoint!"says Sheila.

Sheila qualified as a teacher in 1966. Initially, she taught at St Wilfred's in Burgess Hill, but decided to give herself a professional break, to bring up both her daughters.

Then she became one of the Downlands' teachers in a team supporting pupils with dyslexia.

"My interest in Dyslexia and Special Needs followed on from some assignments and research on reading and literacy undertaken as part of my BA with the Open University," continues Sheila. "Serendipity rather than a definite career move. When I was looking for a job, I saw the ad for a peripatetic dyslexia tutor, on a new team set up by West Sussex County Council, to go into secondary schools and it sounded fascinating. I was lucky enough to get the job. And it really was fascinating. General Special Needs, setting up a Literacy Unit and then, much later, becoming a SENCO (Special Educational Needs Coordinator) seemed a natural progression after that."

Sheila has been a member of the staff at Downlands Community School for many years and still goes there once a week to help assess children with literacy difficulties.

"Many of the children diagnosed with special needs have become very successful indeed," she says.

"Several of them have overcome challenges and worked with their dyslexia to go on to take degrees, and many have established themselves in interesting careers. I had one child who discovered that he could read much more fluently when he turned the book upside-down! Amazing though it was, we thought he should also be able to read the right way up, so that he could read signs etc. without having to stand on his head," she adds with a smile!

"We had many successes with children reading using coloured overlays to minimise wobbly dynamic print, which sometimes happens with black text on a white background."

"I'm practically the longest serving member of staff there and the only author," she continues with a twinkle in her eyes, as we continue to talk at Marram Trading on the High Street. "I have served under five headmasters there, Mr Pybus, Mr Perkins, Mr Walter Clarke, Mrs Rose Heatherton - the new building is named after her, and currently Mr Mark Wignal."

Asked about how her love of writing came about, Sheila said: "As a child I used to keep notes and write in red note books supplied at the time by Woolworths. I remember them well. And most of the stories."

Thinking of writing a new novel set in Italy, Sheila decided to try her luck in a competition to win a holiday in Italy in Women's Weekly, a magazine famed for its fiction.

She won the first prize on 28th February 1989, which was a computer - an Atari word processing system - and a fortnight's trip for two in Ravello, Italy.

"I thought I might write something historical linked to Italy, but I haven't done it yet! It's still simmering on the back burner."

Nonetheless, Sheila was obviously delighted with her trip and subsequently wrote two further stories for the same magazine: Heron's Reach and Unicorn Summer.

The competition winner, Heron's Reach, subsequently went on to be published in large print for a classic paperback publishing company.

Thereafter, other short stories and a novella were published during the 90s: including Silent Promises for the My Weekly Story Library, which also went into large print.

When Sheila's girls had grown up, she decided to do an MA at Bath Spa University, when most of us would be thinking about retiring!

"I had left an unfinished project in one of my drawers for years and I needed something to spur me on," she said.

So she decided to do a part-time two year MA. The course aims were to cover writing for young adults and finished with writing up a dissertation of 40,000 words (for which she won The United Artist's Literary Agency Prize for the most promising story).

"Over the two year course, I had to travel back and forth from Brighton to Bath Spa, as well as teaching part-time and tutoring a creative writing course to finance my studies - which was a logistical challenge," she continues.

By 2010 Sheila had not only obtained an MA, written and published the first of her trilogy but also become a grandmother.

All three books Sun Catcher, Storm Chaser and Story Singer have been published by Orion.

Her books were launched at Danny House in the village and subsequently in Bath.

"Storm Chaser was probably the most challenging, because I was editing my first for publication while writing it and needing to wait and check that there would be no major changes which would impact on the new story, but I was also aware that I had a tight deadline to work to and yet wanted to develop the story of one of the boy characters Razek, as well as continuing Maia's adventure," she adds.

Sheila enjoys her involvement with 'Loud Literature', which is showcased at the library once a year during the Hurst Festival.

"I do have other interests besides writing," she continues. "I enjoy dabbling in pottery and wood carving. I walk and now have a vegetable plot. And my children, of course! My elder daughter now runs her own design business and my younger is a freelance journalist and an editor in Bath," she says proudly.

Incredibly, Sheila has other projects 'in the tank' with other writing projects still in the pipeline. For those of us who haven't already read her three published books, I would certainly recommend them, not only for youngsters and young adults, but for more mature readers as well.

They would certainly make good bedtime reading over the Christmas holidays.


Today my style and method have changed somewhat although my love of the human emotion remains the same.

Whatever place you're into

Currently, one in six of the UK population is aged 65 and over, by 2050 one in four will be.

According to the results of a poll carried out for Jo Cox, before her untimely death, almost three-quarters of older people in the UK are lonely and more than half of those haven't talked to anyone about how they felt.

Gransnet (the over-50s social networking site) is one of nine organisations - including Age UK and the Alzeimer's Society - working to address the issue of loneliness in older people.

So why did Gail Millar, Hurstpierpoint resident for 20 years, decide to add her charity 'Befriended' to the list and how did it all start?

Gail had worked for the Torch Centre, in the village, for nearly 19 years and decided that it was time to move on. "The last day corresponded not only to my 50th birthday, but equally to my daughter's wedding held at the Centre," she says smiling.

Over the years that people had stayed at Torch for their holidays, Gail recognised that a common factor was loneliness. "Loneliness is an epidemic in this country," continues Gail. "There are large numbers of isolated people living alone, even right here - in our village."

Gail was invited to start a befriending scheme in Eastbourne which led to her meeting with church leaders in the Mid Sussex area only to realise that the need was great locally. Both Gail and her husband have enjoyed living in the village for many years and decided to stay in the village and set up a new charity here with her long-term friend Helen Watkin.

Though the charity has a Christian ethos, it supports people of any faith or none.

Officially launched in October on International People's Day by the Bishop of Lewes, Richard Jackson,

150 elderly people attended a tea party at St Paul's Catholic College in Burgess Hill.

Typical referrals to Befriended come from, among others, community groups, churches, GPs and family members.

"We have already been approached by the local NHS Proactive Care Team, whose main aim is to provide support to the community," says Gail.

Though our dynamic, local Befriended group is relatively new - it is part of a network across the country.

We have contacted churches in Burgess Hill, Hurstpierpoint and Hassocks to give presentations to ask members of the community over 18, to give up one hour a week, on a volunteer basis to visit an elderly person.


"The aim is not to encourage elderly people to become more dependent, rather to be encouraged to eventually go into the community to meet other people," adds Gail.

"All our volunteers are DBS checked and trained and then matched with one of our elderly people to help them engage again with society," continues Gail. "If anyone in Hurstpierpoint has a spare hour a week to visit a lonely person or knows anyone who would benefit, please do get in touch."

Befriended also aims to hold regular monthly events and the next one will be a Community Christmas lunch on Christmas Day from 1-5pm, at Hurstpierpoint Village Centre, hosted by two local charities – Befriended and HOPE. # Three Wishes by Liane Moriarty

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

Like all of Liane Moriarty's work this has a deceptively simple story, but there are darker seams running through the book: it's very funny but also explores the difficult nature of family life and how the roles you are assigned in childhood can define you and hold you back in adult life.

Lyn, Cat, and Gemma are very different from one another but are indivisibly bound together – they are triplets and share all of their secrets and hopes, or so they believe...

As the book unfolds the main story is interspersed with Sydney residents and their memories of the Kettle sisters, they live their lives on full beam and attract attention whenever they are together as a threesome and are unaware of the effect they have on bystanders.

All three of the sisters are likeable characters and the interplay and shifting allegiances between them power the novel. This book starts with the sisters celebrating their birthday at a popular restaurant and is told by the fascinated onlookers who witness their behaviour as laughter turns to bitter recriminations and a trip to the hospital.

This was Moriarty's debut novel, but the themes she developed in her later books are already present and if you enjoy this, you will probably enjoy all of her other books too.



# One of us is lying by Karen M. McManus

'One of us is Lying' is one of the best murder mystery books I've ever read. It follows the lives of four ordinary teenagers who have been dragged into a world of stares and whispers when they're accused of a murder, committed in detention.



In true Nigella style, I decided to get a touch indulgent with this festive December recipe. A wonderful excuse to crack open a bottle of Prosecco as you cook and the end result will taste all the better with a slight level of merriment! The Prosecco in this dish is added to increase the flavour and produces a syrupy and fragrant sauce. To note, alcohol evaporates after 20-30 seconds of cooking so this dish is suitable for all ages.





#### Method

- Heat a large casserole pan with the olive oil over a medium heat. Put the seasoned flour (including the orange peel) and chicken portions into a clear plastic bag and toss until the chicken is well coated. Remove the chicken portions and brown them in batches by placing them skin side down into the pan. Transfer to a plate.
- Add the pancetta to the pan and cook until crisp. Lower the heat and add the shallots, chilli and rosemary and sauté for about 4 minutes.
- Return the chicken to the pan, pour over the Prosecco and allow to simmer for 20–25 minutes, until a fragrant syrupy sauce begins to form. Season to taste.
- Check that the chicken is cooked by inserting a skewer into the thickest part of the thigh – the juices should run clear.

I served this dish alongside roasted red, yellow and orange peppers and new potatoes – roasted with garlic and garnished with rosemary sprigs. A Merry Christmas to you all!

# Stories of Holy Trinity

On 28th October, in the final session in the Stories of Holy Trinity series, Stewart Hall gave a talk, illustrated with slides, about some of the soldiers whose names can be seen on Hurstpierpoint's War Memorials.

He began by explaining some of the processes involved in researching the lives of individuals who, contrary to many people's expectations, were not all born and brought up in Hurstpierpoint and did not therefore necessarily appear on all the relevant local census returns. Several of the men he spoke about had moved into the village from other areas and a few had already been away from home in the forces, before WWI began. Only by combing through a range of sources, including birth and death certificates, census returns, army and navy records and newspaper reports was Stewart able to build the stories of individual's lives.

The image we often have of WWI is so bound up with the trenches, that it was surprising to learn about soldiers who died in other zones of the conflict or at sea. Stewart had set out to offer some alternatives to expectations and I, for one, found that this broadened my awareness of WWI's wider impact in the world. Some of the figures for deaths of sailors when vessels were sunk were truly shocking.

Throughout his talk Stewart stayed clearly focused on the lives of the men he had researched. What he told us brought home once again, the human cost of World War I. Appropriately, especially in view of the time of year, we were led in a brief reflection and short silence by Trevor Evans from the British Legion before the talk began.

It was clear from what Stewart said, that he is really enthusiastic about his subject and that his research is an ongoing process. It began in 2014 when, along with Claire Richard (who unfortunately due to ill health could not join him on this occasion) Stewart prepared posters to mark the centenary of the start of WWI and displayed them in various places in the High Street. The talk offered an update and a different approach to the information. Though Stories of Holy Trinity is at an end for now, I hope we will be able to hear more about Stewart's research in future talks.
