

The Hurst team took a while to get going as they lost their first match against Hampton School. They bounced back to convincingly beat Lady Eleanor Holles School in the next game, and advanced to the semi-finals as the highest-scoring group runners-up.

A tight semi-final against last year's winners Kingston Grammar went right down to the wire, and the final was against tournament stalwarts RGS Guildford, eventually completing a 720-600 point victory.

Hurst will now progress to the inter-regional play-off against the South West winner, and the winners of this contest will progress to the National Finals in April.

Hurstpierpoint resident Paul Wilkinson has completed all collection of expired Christmas trees and has collected a record total to boot!

He was keen to beat the total from last year, which came in at an impressive £4,050 -and he smashed it, taking £5,500.

The business is the brainchild of Lindsay Thompson and Tony Walsh who have had a stall in My Vintage, Hassocks for the last four years. Now the pair are going it alone, and are inviting like-minded potential stallholders to get in touch. "If you know someone who has a penchant for antiques and vintage items, or local high quality arts and crafts, then we'd love to talk to them," Lindsay commented.

The shop will stock various types of products including upcycled furniture and accessories for every room in the house. But there will also be other items such as organic lavender products and pre-loved clothing for sale too.

If you regularly visit the recreation ground in South Avenue, you will not have failed to notice the building work taking place on the eastern side of the clubhouse, if only because of the huge scaffold 'tent' erected to avoid work being delayed because of bad weather! As a consequence work is ahead of schedule and, by the time you read this, the scaffolding should be down and the external building work close to completion.

The Club has very much appreciated the forbearance of its neighbours in South Avenue and other Hurst residents using the footpath across the recreation ground. The good news is that by early spring, the Club, and its building contractor Closewall Ltd, aim to have things back to normal.

Apart from offering its members better facilities, the Club's aim is for the finished clubhouse and its surrounds to enhance the overall appearance of the recreation ground, following other improvements made in recent years, by the Parish Council to the children's playground, and by the Tennis Club.

The extended Clubhouse will give the Club much larger changing rooms, a bar, better kitchen facilities and, most importantly, for the first time, provide sufficient space in the main clubroom in which to play bowls indoors from October to March.

The Club is expecting its membership to increase again this year, as many Hurst residents tried, and enjoyed, bowls for the first time at the 2017 St Lawrence Day Fair and at the Club's Bowls & Beer Festival last September. If you missed these opportunities to try bowls, they will be available again this year.

However, as the 2018 outdoor bowls season starts in April, it is not too early to contact the Club if you think you might like to try bowls and might be thinking of joining the Club. For Jo O'Connor moving to Hurstpierpoint represented a key milestone in her family's life. But the shift began to happen a little earlier, when she jacked in her 'high flyer' career in order to pursue a lifelong ambition to run her own business.

Five years ago Jo was Chief Executive Officer of an international retail corporation, a role she was proud to have achieved having worked for 30 years in the sector, working her way up from product buyer at Levi Strauss. But, for her, it was time to leave the fast-paced corporate life in London in order to take on a new challenge and find the perfect home for her family.

They moved away from Surrey in 2013, as Jo was looking for a suitable business to run, and moved to Wivelsfield. "I had always dreamt of having my own business," Jo commented, "and the personal freedom that comes with it. The boardroom was no easy place to work and the pressure was enormous and constant. In truth, I had had enough of being bossed around!"

It was only as Jo got into her 50s that she felt she had the confidence to try something totally different. She soon located Battle House of Flowers, based in Battle; a florist with a reputation for good flowers but in need of some help.

Jo was not a florist, so undertook training immediately, but she knew about retail. She rebranded the business, reorganised the shop and set about putting together a fantastic team of florists. Now the business employs ten, including two staff who worked for the previous owner, and sells 50% more flowers

than it did when she bought it. The store also boasts an expanded flower range to include exotic varieties with over 40 different types in stock every day.

"There were a number of key learnings in the early days," explains Jo. "For a start, we deal in a fresh product which has a limited shelf life. So one of the first things we trained the whole team on was wastage quotas – a key factor to profitability!" She also recognised the fact that staff needed to be able to deal with potentially fragile and vulnerable customers – especially in the form of funeral and sympathy flowers – and so she quickly created a consultation area in which to talk privately.

Back at home, Jo and husband Kevin (a retired teacher) were still on the lookout for that perfect location to live. Easy access to college for their youngest children, Lucy and Harry, in an outstanding community with spirit. Hurstpierpoint was an obvious choice, and they eventually found and bought their dream house 'to retire in' during October last year.

The tagline for Battle House of Flowers is 'exceptional flowers at everyday prices' and this principal reflects Jo's own background in fashion/beauty and also her passion for interiors. "Many customers (and recipients) of our flowers say the arrangements have an 'architectural' look about them which they love," she explained. This 'London style' of florist is what she was looking to replicate here in Sussex.

The team create flower arrangements for the usual variety of situations: weddings, funerals, births, arrangements for offices and business bouquets, general gifts and, of course, the key flower events of



Valentine's Day this month, and Mother's Day on Sunday 11th March.

Whilst arrangements are created in the workroom in Battle, they can be delivered to anywhere in the UK next day for just £6.50, after Jo instigated a close relationship with a national courier network. "We send our flowers in a specially designed box in a transport gel, which will keep the flowers fresh for up to 48 hours. How they arrive at their recipient is really important to us, so packaging and presentation is vital – it's well tested to ensure it works every time!"

However, Jo's team also deliver locally to Hurstpierpoint and the surrounding area in one of the shop vans.

Jo's husband Kevin works as a driver in the business two days a week. "Being a driver is really hard," Jo explains. "The address can be wrong, they may have to negotiate dogs and/or neighbours and timing can be everything for some deliveries. But seeing the faces of those receiving the beautiful flowers makes it all worth it!"

Jo's cut flower tips

A key task of any florist is to condition their flowers before they go on sale. This involves using freshly sterilised containers, correct cutting, leaf stripping, feeding and storing appropriately. Whether you buy your flowers from a local florist or a local supermarket, there are five simple steps for prolonging the life of your blooms.

- Start with a clean vase (bleach it!) filled with fresh tap water- they don't need Evian!
- Add a sprinkling of flower food from the little packet provided with the bouquet. A word on the flower food - it contains sugar (nutrients), an acidifier (to maintain the water's PH level and help the stems soak up water) and bleach (to reduce bacteria in the water). Flowers live longer and look brighter when the food is used.
- Cut the stems on a 45 degree angle to ensure the flower is drinking. The stem will seal up seconds after cutting so make sure you cut and plunge!
- Check the water level daily and change/top up daily. The more flowers in the vase, the greater the water need!
- Choose where to put your flowers wisely.
 The best place is a cool environment, away
 from direct sunlight, heater vents and entry
 doors. NB: you can also put your flowers in
 the fridge over night to prolong their life.



Busy month coming up with three films and a live NT broadcast. We start on **Thursday 8th February 8pm** with **A Man Called Ove (15)**. It's a fairly tried and tested formula; the cantankerous old man whose life is transformed and mellowed by the arrival of a new family next door, but this Scandinavian film manages to tell it afresh. Both touching and funny, it strikes a unique tone.

Thursday 22nd February 7pm we present NT Live – Cat on a Hot Tin Roof, starring Sienna Miller, Jack O'Connell and Colm Meany. A bold reimagining of Tennessee Williams' masterpiece set in the scorching heat of Mississippi. Secrets, lies and sexual tension are all in the mix in this classic of modern theatre.

Friday 23rd February 8pm we show The Handmaiden (18). Sarah Waters' novel Fingersmith gets an exotic makeover in this masterly Korean adaptation, set in the 1930s, with the film weaving a complex tale of deception and betrayal. A con man installs a young thief as handmaiden to his niece with the goal of relieving her of her considerable fortune. Needless to say all is not that simple, and with myriad plot twists and shock revelations along the way the film thrills and seduces in equal measure.

Finally we end on **Sunday 25th February 3pm** with **Lion (12A)**. The incredible true story of five year old Saroo who gets lost on a train which travels across India away from his family. He learns to survive in a new city before ultimately being adopted by an Australian family. As a young adult he then begins the process of tracing his roots to try and find his family. The film avoids the usual pitfalls of this sort of film and produces a remarkably moving account of a man's unwavering determination to find his roots.

Protecting Hurst's hedgehogs

It's not often that I find the time to go to an evening event organised by the Hurstpierpoint & District Horticultural Society at the Village Centre, but I was determined to do so this time to support Ann Winney, from Columbines, who was going to give a talk about hedgehogs.

The Club Room was crammed full of members - about 60 strong. Patrick Howarth, committee member, said: "I was delighted to see so many members at the talk."

Classified now as an endangered species, it is estimated that the number of hedgehogs has dwindled to a mere 1.5 million from 30 million in the 1950s. Ann was so alarmed by the plight of hedgehogs that (a few months ago) she decided to set up 'Hurst Hedgehog Haven' on Facebook to help Hurst residents to make the small changes necessary in their gardens to help sustain hedgehogs in their natural habitat. In a very entertaining account of her encounters with hedgehogs, Ann suggested that we could create a wild space at the bottom of our gardens to encourage them to dwell there. Creating appropriate holes through mutual fencing enables hedgehogs to roam freely from garden to garden at night.

With the help of Wildlife Rescue & Ambulance Service (WRAS), the British Hedgehog Society and the British Hedgehog Preservation Society, the following ten following tips were given during the evening to help us achieve this aim:

- To check our gardens for uncovered drains and holes hedgehogs could fall down, and make sure they are covered.
- To ensure chemicals, paint, oil, antifreeze is safely stored away where hedgehogs can't get covered in or be poisoned by them.
- If a hedgehog were to fall into your pond could it get out easily? If not try putting some weld mesh or a ramp in, or ensuring there is a gently sloping edge they can walk out of.
- To safely put away children's football goals, garden netting or other similar netting which a hedgehog could become entangled in. Garden netting to protect plants should be lifted off the ground or boarded around the base.
- To clear up litter or rubbish to avoid hedgehogs getting caught or injured.
- Before using strimmers, garden forks or other garden equipment, check the area you are working on for hidden hedgehogs to avoid causing them injury.
- Avoid blocking up gaps in fences. Hedgehogs need to roam at least 12 gardens per night, so ensure they can get in and out safely. They only need a hole the size of a CD to get through.
- Try to avoid using slug pellets, try alternatives like copper tape on plant pots, soot, ash from your fire or crushed eggshells to deter slugs.



- If you have a dog, let it out on a lead into your garden to let hedgehogs have a chance to run away, or fence off areas so your dog can't get to any visiting hedgehogs.
- Before lighting a bonfire, check it for hedgehogs rebuild it or use broom handles to lift it up and check underneath. Only light on one side to ensure any animals inside can get out.

If, by chance, you find a struggling hedgehog or hoglet in your patch of garden, do not give it milk to drink but a bowl of water and preferably dried dog or cat food. You can easily make a feeding station using a not too big plastic storage box and making a hole in it for easy access. If you need any help you can reach the British Hedgehog Preservation Society on their rescue line on 07815 078234, or call Ann.

Ann is organising another workshop on 21st April at the Guide Hut and has invited Trevor Week from WRAS to give the next talk.

February is the month in which we remember the humble pancake with its simple, store cupboard ingredients. The basic pancake idea is incredibly versatile and open to plenty of creativity. Originally intended within Christian teachings as a way of using up 'luxury food items' before a period of fasting. It is interesting today that the concept of 'luxury items' has morphed into such recipes as 'Buttery Vanilla Crepes Stuffed with Nutella and Marshmallows'! The recipe below is at the other end of the spectrum offering an example of how wholesome pancakes can be. You may not get away with this pancake on Shrove Tuesday as the kids hand you the Nutella, but it's a great mid-week dinner on any February evening.

A filling alternative to a plain pancake and designed to work as a meal in itself, it's delicious served alongside a simple green salad of rocket, cucumber and cherry tomatoes.



Method

Remove the skin from the roasted squash. Pick and finely chop the rosemary leaves, discarding the stalks, and finely grate the Parmesan.

In a large bowl, mash the squash with a fork, then whisk in the egg, milk and flour. Add the chilli, rosemary and Parmesan.

Heat a little oil in a small frying pan and, once hot, add half a ladle of mixture per pancake into the pan. Cook for 1 to 2 mins on each side, until golden and crisp.

Keep warm in a low oven until ready, then serve with and extra grating of Parmesan and green salad.

and largely as a result of




this, quite a number of my efforts are to be found in the houses of local residents.

Abandoning painting, I started sculpting again, one morning a week, at Skelton's, and have produced carvings ever since. Subjects were initially people and dogs, but gradually more and more abstracts emerged. Stone of irregular shape is picked up from quarries etc., and if there is any beauty in there, tools and hard work bring it out - I hope!



Vinegar Girl by Anne Tyler

BOOK REVIEW

This novel is part of the Hogarth Shakespeare project which aims to reimagine Shakespeare, creating works that stand alone and bring the original stories to life for contemporary audiences. Anne Tyler is an unusual choice to take part: she has admitted to not really enjoying Shakespeare – and has a particular aversion to 'The Taming of the Shrew', on which 'Vinegar Girl' is based.

Tyler takes a fresh approach to the material: her Kate is a nursery assistant who is loved by the children in her care, although she is rather less popular with their parents. She lives with her widowed father (Dr Battista) and younger sister (Bunny) and runs the household according to her father's extremely eccentric rules. He is a fond, but absent parent – very wrapped up in his scientific research, expecting Kate to keep things running smoothly at home (which is becoming more difficult as Bunny is starting to rebel).

Dr Battista appears to be on the verge of a scientific breakthrough, but his hopes for an academic triumph are endangered by the immigration status of his brilliant young assistant, Pyotr.... Surely he can rely on Kate to help out?

This is a short book, and I read it in one sitting as I was enjoying it so much. It's a very funny, unusual love story and although I knew how it should end I was still gripped by the twists and turns of the plot.

First Responders Branch for Hurst, Hassocks and Ditchling

Have you ever wondered about what volunteering as a First Responder for the Hurst, Hassocks and Ditchling Branch is about?

Nickie Smale says: "The South Mid Sussex Community First Responders are members of the public who volunteer to help their community by responding to Medical Emergencies. South East Coast Ambulance Service (SECAmb) train us in order that we can respond to emergencies received by the 999 system in our own community before the arrival of an emergency ambulance," she continues. "We are not a replacement for the Ambulance Service, but we are a vital link in the chain of survival and are part of a team that provides life support to those in need."

Knowing how to use a defibrillator is not necessarily for the faint-hearted, but is a useful skill for the committed to have.

"In certain cases the Team's intervention can literally mean the difference between life and death," she remarks, and then adds: "In cases of cardiac arrest, a patient's heart stops beating effectively. Without defibrillation and CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) their chances of survival decrease as every minute goes by. Community Responders are trained to use

Automatic Defibrillators and can therefore provide vital intervention in such cases."

When a Community Responder is on duty they are mobilized by the Emergency Operations Centre following a 999 call. Not all calls are deemed suitable for a Community Responder to attend, and below are listed the types of call they routinely attend:

- · Cardiac Arrests
- · Unconscious patients
- · Patients suffering from Chest Pains
- · Patients with Breathing difficulties
- Epileptic Seizures
- · Diabetic problems
- Cerebral Vascular Accidents (Strokes)
- Medical Collapses Abdominal pains etc
- Minor Trauma Fractures, bleeding etc
- Care link alarms
- Falls

They also install/maintain and offer awareness training for the defibrillators in their local areas, in partnership with The District Lions.

The First Responders branch for Hurst, Hassocks and Ditchling meets every first Thursday of the month at 7.30pm at the Hurst Methodist Church Hall.

Life-saving knowledge

Where's your nearest defibrillator?

With 2018 now well underway, many of us will have made (and broken!) a range of New Year resolutions.

However, here's one way you can still make a really positive start to the New Year – by making one very simple resolution which could potentially save a life.

We'd like to encourage everyone living and working in the village to familiarise themselves with the sites of the lifesaving defibrillator machines and learn how to use them.

An estimated 60,000 people each year in the UK have an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest and, sadly, less than 10% of those people will survive. Yet if a bystander is able to start CPR they could double a person's chances of survival.

Hurstpierpoint has two machines that we know of – one at the Fairfield Rec and one situated in the Bowls Club on South Avenue Rec. Sayers Common has a defib mounted on the outside wall of the Community Shop (by the door to the hall). And we know there is a unit at the Gym of Wickwoods Country Club in Albourne.

All of the machines are portable and contain full

instructions, but why not give yourself a head start with an online tutorial?

The Resuscitation Council (UK) have produced plenty of information to help us all learn more about what to do in these dramatic and highly pressured times, should we find ourselves involved.

You can watch videos and play interactive games to increase your understanding. You can even download an app - see www.resus.org.uk/apps/lifesaver for more information.

At Hurst Life we will commit to reprinting this map and information on a repeated basis, in order to familiarise the whole village regarding access to this lifesaving equipment - which can be used by anyone.

If anyone knows of any other publically available defibs in the area, do please email us (editor@hurstlife. co.uk) and we'll update the map for next time.

Please give it a go. With our emergency services so overworked, we as communities can get better at helping ourselves, and it really does make a difference.





In August, I went for two weeks to a very poor country called Andasibe in Madagascar with Project Abroad. There are about 12,000 inhabitants, but lots of them are illiterate, sick and very poor. So, my mission was to teach children and participate in their development.

The first week, I gave courses to children from 8 to 17 years old.

The first day was very difficult because I didn't know the children, I hadn't the necessary equipment and the children were not at all studious! In my classroom I hadn't anything to write with on the board, and the children hadn't anything to write the lesson with. Fortunately I brought



a lot of school materials from France, and I was able to help all my class.

I taught French, English and Mathematics, which are the main subjects in their country. It was great because I like to share my knowledge, but my main difficulty was to advance all the children. Indeed, some of them knew how to do an addition, to introduce themselves in English, but the smallest of them knew scarcely any counting! But unfortunately, in these countries, there are very few suitable premises in which to study, and especially very few adults able to teach without diplomas.

Also, the classroom was very dark and was not as pleasant as the classroom that one can find in France. So, I decided to fix it: at the end of the day, I left a free

time for the children so that, they could draw to cheer this room. They were very talented!

The second week I worked with younger children, between the ages of three to eight. The situation was better because we were in a structure called 'the care' which was built by other volunteers last year. As the children were smaller, we were doing much more playful activities such as puzzles, painting and games outside. In their homes, children don't have



toys except for pebbles or pieces of plastics. So, when we gave them the opportunity to play with real games brought from France, they were very excited! And the best part of it is that children are very grateful for all that can be brought for them, and they pass it on to us by many love and many hugs. The most important in this mission is to give them all the love they need.

Some of them have a dozen siblings, whose parents cannot care. As a result, I can bring them many smiles, hugs and affection; that's what they need the most.

This experience was very rewarding and engraved memories that I would never forget. What I am most proud of is giving children so much happiness. Seeing them smiling and progressing through my help is very honourable.

I hope to remake the experience again in a few years, hoping to see these children again, because I have become very attached to them and I already miss this country so much.
