

## Starting school in September?

The application process for school admissions in West Sussex is well underway and, if you haven't already applied, here is some key information:

If your child's date of birth is between 1st September 2014 and 31st August 2015 it is now time to apply for their school place. You must provide an email address to apply online. You need to apply online by visiting www.westsussex.gov.uk/ admissions or by calling 03330 142903.

Tuesday 15th January 2019: National closing date for starting school applications. You must submit your completed application by this date. Failure to do so will affect the priority attached to your application.

Tuesday 16th April 2019: Online applicants are notified by email, and others by second class post, which school their child is offered.

In the information given out by WSCC it stresses: 'If your application is received after the closing date of Tuesday 15th January 2019 your chance of securing a place at one of your preference schools could be seriously affected.'.

Christmas Eve.



# Mike Thatcher meets the long-time resident of Hurst and leading polo photographer

"Prince Philip is very impatient, not like the Queen. You've got three seconds. If you haven't got the picture, bad luck." As the official photographer for the Guards Polo Club, in the grounds of Windsor Castle, Tony Ramirez's day job puts him in a privileged position. "The Queen is very good because she is so used to it. You might have to say 'Ma'am can you look at me please', but not very often."

Tony is the country's leading photographer in the sport of polo. "I don't know about that," he chuckles modestly. "I consider myself one of the top few." His modesty was one of the main things which struck me about him as I met him in his cosy and compact office tucked away off Western Rd. When you look through his vast and hugely impressive collection of photos on his website it is almost impossible to find his name. "I prefer to promote the brand, Images of Polo. My name is on the website, if you look at the bottom." You have to look very closely.

Tony and his wife Olga have lived in Hurstpierpoint for over 35 years. He was born in Spain and educated in Brazil before moving to Sussex. Initially they rented in Haywards Heath before finding the perfect property in Hurst in 1983. "We just fell in love with the village and a tiny cottage in the High Street. I had been an insurance broker for a long time and photography had always been a hobby. I got involved with a polo magazine in Spain and then I decided to go full-time. I sold the insurance business and that was it."

After five years on the High Street, near the Players Theatre, they moved to Western Road where they remain to this day. How has Hurst changed since he has been here? "Years ago we seemed to know everybody, or at least it felt like it. It seems to have become more of a 'commuter village' but that's not unique to Hurst; it's bound to happen when you are close to a train station and only an hour from London. We wouldn't move from here, it's such a nice village."

His work has also changed since the early days of developing his films in a dark room. "Technically today the quality is better, the cameras can think for themselves. Digital images create more time in the office but there was no hesitation to move to digital cameras. The cameras are quicker, the shutter speeds are much faster and when you are taking pictures of horses going 30-40 mph, you need a fast camera."

Does he have any advice for the mums and dads of Hurst when taking an action shot of 'little Johnny' for Hurst Colts on a Saturday? "Stand behind the goal whenever possible. The advantage is that you will always get a picture of the boy or girl coming to you and striving to score, which tells its own story. You get the feeling of what he or she is trying to do within the picture. It's also better if you have the sun behind you, or at 90 degrees if that's not possible." The array of photographs and awards which adorn his office is a testament to the fact that this advice comes from an expert and leader in his field. I sensed pride coming to the surface when talking about his membership of the British Institute of Professional Photography (BIPP) where he was inducted as a Licentiateship in 2007 and then an Associate in 2009. "You gain that by doing a set of pictures and going in front of a panel, and that was a big thing for me. It was tough and time consuming. You become very selective, it has got to be technically right but also memorable." The BIPP is an august organisation which covers all disciplines of photography and is highly respected within the industry. "The next level would be the Fellowship and



I've been meaning to apply but its just finding the time."

The proudest moment of his career came when HM the Queen was presented with a book of his photos at a private presentation at the Guards Club, with just three people present. The Queen's book is leather bound, and I was granted a peek at the only other copy; a remarkable portfolio of the royal family away from official duties and relaxed. Tony remembers the presentation day very clearly and a photo of the event hangs on the wall to the right of his desk. "When she out of the public eye she's quite relaxed. She's amazing for her age."

The bulk of his work is naturally during the summer where he would follow a day's work with long evenings downloading and editing the shoot. The winter is when he gets the time to do the presentation, coffee-table style books for the different teams and, apart from the odd event abroad, he remains office bound in the winter. "It's hard work but enjoyable, most of the time. You get to meet interesting people and go to interesting places, St Moritz and Azerbaijan for example."

I asked him whether, like a film director who can't watch a film without digesting all the camera angles, he can see a photo in the newspaper without casting a critical, professional eye. He was quite scathing about some of the photos used in the racing pages and he is a position to judge, having worked for the Telegraph Online for three years. "Some of them are appalling. These days anyone can take a photo on a phone, as the quality is quite good, and magazines just use whatever anyone sends them as they are free." The experience needed and, more importantly, the equipment needed to be a top photographer of polo means that this threat is unlikely to affect his sport. "A lot of people try, thinking it's easy, but it's not."

When they first moved to their current house Miss Hannington used to live next door; her great uncle was the Rector and the family was well-known locally. As far as they know the previous occupant had lived in it since it was built, so they are only the second people to live in it since 1930. The nature of his work has prevented him from getting as involved in village life as he would have wanted. "Unfortunately time is an issue; my job is not nine-to-five and my work is mostly at the weekends."

As winter approaches he will be off to Argentina to cover the Argentine Polo Open followed by the annual trip to St Moritz, where he is the official photographer for the polo played there on the frozen lake. The challenges this brings are unique as, instead of being surrounded by green, the predominant colour is white. But when he gets it right the results are spectacular and as satisfying as anything he does at home. I wondered if he felt he had reached a professional peak with his craft and, whilst he admitted he had learned nothing technical in the last few years, he would not stop growing as a photographer. "There's always room for improvement, nobody can say they're not learning or improving. You always want to do better and try to get a better picture than the last one."

There are some final encouraging words for someone like myself, who, despite taking hundreds of photos, have nothing of real worth to show. Even the best in the business have bad days: "Some days you know you haven't done well. It's a very fast game and the field is 300 metres long and there will be games when it all seems to be down the other end and you don't get the pictures. Or the game is not good. Or the game is good but for some reason the pictures you take are just not quite right." But I sense those days are few and far between and once again Tony's modesty is coming into play. It's always a privilege to meet someone at the top of their profession and it's a pleasant surprise when they turn out to live in Hurstpierpoint.



# Lesley Ridley

#### **OBITUARY**

Lesley Ridley, a well-known face around the village and mother of five, passed away last month after a short illness. The phrase 'larger than life' is often used but never more accurately than when describing Lesley. A big booming voice and, it's true to say, occasionally untidy look, was matched by an ability to talk to and care for anyone, no matter who they were.

The big turnout at her memorial and the huge quantities of food provided by the community are testament to the regard Lesley was held in. Her husband Andv has been overwhelmed by the support since her passing, "I just want to thank everyone, they've been amazing. The support we've had - the constant visitors, the supply of food being delivered has been fantastic. I can't thank the people of Hurstpierpoint enough for their support." A resident of Hurst for 18 years, she leaves behind Andy and four boys.

A packed Holy Trinity church heard the Rev Debbie Beer take up her story in a moving tribute:

Lesley spent the first part of her life in Tonbridge, loving swimming and drama. Finding that a Girl's Brigade friend went to church, she just decided she would go to church too. At college she trained as a nursery nurse and went on to work as a nanny for the Astor family at Hever Castle. Later on she met Andy. He was the bakery delivery driver and Lesley, as manager of the local branch, made him a coffee and they talked. They met at the right time for each other. They went out for four weeks and then moved in together. Andy says simply: "She was my best friend, my girl and I was her boy. Then and always."

One particularly cold and wet winter they managed to take a holiday in the Canary Islands. Back home again in that winter, at Andy's urging they went back to the Canaries and got jobs running a restaurant; Andy the chef and Lesley out front. Her personality was a big factor in their success in working up the business. She went the extra mile for their customers and for the stray

dog, who became a fixture outside. They came back to England after eight months because she was unwell and she was successfully treated. This was the first of several serious health challenges in her life.

The advent of children involved moving from Burgess Hill to Willow Way 18 years ago; then to Blackthorns,

and later on to Pierpoint Close. Becoming part of the toddler and play groups, becoming part of the village community, working in the Post Office and in other jobs; she was at the heart of the community. Lesley loved people. It didn't matter who you were - rich or poor. Helping, giving friendship, giving love. Knowing everyone and everyone knowing her. So many people say: 'She was my friend'.

Lesley said that she didn't want to marry until she could have her own children, not other people's, as page boys at her wedding. So Toby, Josh and Zach were very much part of Lesley and

Andy's wedding day in August 2005 – a wonderful day of celebration and fun, complete with bouncy castle.

But less than two years later came a most terrible day, with the death of baby Felix at nearly two months old, which brought deep and lasting pain, a deep, lasting wound to Lesley, and to the whole family. But in the times that followed, among all the pain and challenges, there was still so much love, a lot of happiness. The birth of Noah, the joy of seeing her sons grow into boys and young men to be proud of. Lesley was, quite rightly, such a proud mum. A mum who ran the family, who got the family through the toughest times. Who lived her faith that God's love and true human love are stronger than anything. Andy said: "We've always had the basics. We've had what money can't buy – love and time." Lesley gave so much love, so many hugs. "I was not a hugging person when I met Lesley," says Andy. "But I am now."

## **Hurst Meadows now ours!**

Many congratulations to all those who made the Remembrance Day parade and memorial service such a moving and poignant occasion, especially to the young lady who played the bugle so well.

The last month has seen completion of the transfers of ownership of the Wilderness and Tilleys Copse areas of ancient woodland from Boyis Homes to the Parish Council so that we can now say that Hurst Meadows is fully in community ownership. The full area extends from College Lane to Marchants Close, and we can now undertake the remaining preparatory work needed to make the area suitable for public use. Public consultation will begin shortly on how



we will access the new area from Marchants Close. More information about how the Council intends to manage the 50 acre area going forward is available on our website. The Council is very grateful in this for the time and effort from the residents and interest group representatives on the Hurst Meadows Advisory Board. The Advisory Board is intending to mark the completion of transfer with a New Year's day walkabout. Members of the Board and Councillors will be doing conducted walks around the meadows from 10am on New Year's Day to show off the extent of the amenity now available to our community. It will be too early in the year to see the planned new heritage orchard containing 40 varieties of Sussex apples, including two native to Hurstpierpoint, but planting of this will begin in February next year.

During the next few weeks we will be undertaking some repairs, including the steps at St Georges Green, the wall bordering the cemetery and the pothole at the top of the cemetery access road. We will also be starting to install the new 'village gateway' signage in Sayers Common and Hurstpierpoint.

Our preparations for winter weather are being put in place and I would ask you please to read and keep a copy of our latest newsletter for the details.

Finally, on behalf of Parish Councillors and Parish staff, may I wish all of our residents a very Happy Christmas and New Year.



# Voter ID pilots in 2019

Mid Sussex is set to take part in the next round of the 2019 Voter ID pilots along with 10 other local authorities across England.

The pilots will take place at the 2019 local elections, providing further insight to the Government into how best to secure the voting process.

To verify that voters are who they say they are, here in Mid Sussex voters will be asked to present their polling cards as a means of identification.

Anyone who does not have their poll card with them on polling day will be asked to present another form of photo ID, including a UK or EU photo-card driving licence or a valid British, European or Commonwealth passport.

Mid Sussex Returning Officer Tom Clark said: "We want to give everyone the maximum amount of notice that Mid Sussex is going to be one of the government pilot areas for voter ID. The government sees this as a crucial step in ensuring the integrity of voting processes across the country and we are happy to be involved."

Two of my grandparents painted and my father is a keen landscape photographer so art was always an interest growing up and at school. Thank you for all your individual enquiries about your recycling. By the time you read this I will have replied individually to all your emails to the editor on recycling. Keep the questions coming...

With Christmas just around the corner, here are some tips to improve your recycling into the New Year.

# Did you know Christmas is the busiest time for our recycling team, so we would appreciate your help.

- Any items that have a plug, use batteries, need charging or have a picture of a crossed out wheelie bin on, as shown here, are known as Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment (WEEE). Take these and broken Christmas lights to your local Household Waste Recycling Site ('the tip') the Small Electricals Recycling point
- When buying your Christmas wrapping paper, avoid metallic/plastic film or glitter – do the scrunch test – if it stays scrunched it can be recycled. Remove large bows and as much sellotape as possible
- Check your Christmas bin collection dates and Christmas recycling tips
   www.midsussex.gov.uk/waste-recycling
- Take real Christmas trees to your local council Christmas tree recycling point www.midsussex.gov.uk/treerecycling
- Tops off all bottles and containers please, and put in your rubbish bin. Remember 'Clean, Dry and Loose' in your recycling bin
- Remove non-recyclable packaging from boxes, such as polystyrene/plastic wrap and film, and place in your rubbish bin
- Large cardboard boxes fold flat if too large for recycling bin then please tear into smaller pieces (cereal box size) and place in recycling bin or take oversized cardboard to the Household Waste Recycling Site ('the tip') – do not leave to the side of the recycling bin as will get wet, and wet cardboard cannot be recycled and will not be collected
- Christmas cards can be recycled in your blue bin, or with your favourite charity
- Please do not place batteries in your general rubbish bin or your recycling bin at home – these can spark and cause fires – please recycle them at shops that sell batteries. They all have battery recycling points, usually near the checkout
- · Black plastic food trays can be recycled

# An errant tenant

## LISTEN TO THE LAWYER

**Question:** I am a landlord of a residential property having granted an Assured Shorthold Tenancy agreement (AST) to a tenant. The tenant has failed to pay the rent and I want to evict him. How do I do this?

**Answer:** There are two routes available to a landlord wishing to recover possession of a residential property. Which one to use is dependent on whether the term of the AST has expired. Both procedures are outlined in the Housing Act 1988.

Firstly, irrespective of whether the tenant has breached the terms of the AST, a landlord is entitled to demand possession of the property when the term has expired provided that he gives the tenant at least two month's written notice in advance (called a Section 21 Notice). If the tenant still refuses to leave, the landlord can issue possession proceedings in the county court to obtain a court order. Obtaining possession via this path is known as the non-fault based route.

If, however, the tenant is in breach of the terms of the AST the landlord may, at any time during or after expiry of the term, seek possession by issuing the tenant with a different notice (known as a Section 8 Notice) demanding that the tenant leave within 14 days or face court proceedings. The Notice must highlight the breaches being relied on and those breaches must fall within one of the categories identified in the Housing Act. The relevant category in your case being 'nonpayment of rent'. Others include 'breach of some other term of the AST' and that the 'tenant has been convicted of a serious offence whilst at the property'. The ground must be included in the Section 8 Notice and in the subsequent court proceedings should they become necessary. This route to recovering possession is often referred to as the fault-based procedure.

If the rent is payable monthly, at least two months' rent must be outstanding before you are able to issue a Section 8 Notice relying on non-payment of rent. If the tenant then ignores the Notice, continues to refuse to pay rent and proceedings are issued against the tenant, then the court will make an order granting the landlord possession of the property.

Possession claims can be complicated, particularly if they are contested by the tenant. It is crucial that you have complied with the various statutory obligations that are imposed on landlords before you even consider serving Notice on the tenant. For example, the landlord must protect the tenant's deposit in a government approved scheme and have provided the tenant with various documentation at the start of the tenancy. Moreover, there are a number of practical issues that must be addressed before you can take legal action to evict your tenant, such as ensuring the property has a valid EPC and that it is fitted with smoke alarms.

#### Method

Heat half the oil in a small frying pan over a medium heat. Add the onion and a pinch of salt and cook for five minutes or until softened. Add the garlic and spices and cook for a further two minutes. Remove from the heat, tip into a bowl and leave to cool.

Meanwhile, for the salsa, combine the tomatoes, cucumber, spring onions, avocado, lime and coriander in a bowl. Mix in half the chilli, taste and stir in more chilli if required. Add a drizzle of olive oil and season to taste with pepper, then set aside.

Once the onion mixture has cooled, add the turkey and coriander and mix thoroughly. Using wet hands, shape the mixture into 16 golf ball sized balls and then transfer to a baking tray and cover with cling film.

Refrigerate for 15-30 minutes; this will help the meatballs to firm and will stop them from falling apart during cooking.

Preheat the oven to 200C/400F/Gas 6. Heat the remaining oil in a large, non-stick frying pan and fry the meatballs for 2-3 minutes, turning occasionally, until golden-brown on all sides. You may need to do this in batches to avoid overcrowding the pan.

Transfer the meatballs to a clean baking tray and cook in the oven for 10-12 minutes or until cooked through. Leave to rest for a few minutes before serving with the salsa, lime wedges and lettuce leaves.

# The Hurstpierpoint Society: what is it?

The Society started in 1962 with the intention of protecting the environment and community spirit of the village. It is a charity, dependent for its work on subscriptions, on donations and on the efforts of volunteers. Since 1962 Hurstpierpoint has grown considerably. The population of the whole parish is about 7,000; there are over 1,400 members of the Society. For those people who have recently moved into the new housing developments we thought it might be useful to highlight what the Society does and why it is important. The Remembrance Sunday procession down the High Street last month demonstrated the community feeling here, with hundreds of residents of all ages involved. This is a great place to live, so let us look after it.

The Society distributes a newsletter to members bi-annually. This shows what we have been doing in that period.

For example we have recently worked closely with Mid Sussex District Council to bring about an appraisal of the village's Conservation Areas, meaning that now any development or building work within the areas must be sympathetic to the historical context and special features of the village.

Each month we have a committee which examines all planning applications made within the parish. We have been involved in various situations in Hurst, including trees that have been planted in streets which lacked


greenery, the Village Garden was remodelled and finger posts and Victorian street signs have been preserved, with the route of the Roman road on the edge of the village marked.

The Society has made financial donations for Christmas lights in the High Street, for benches, for kissing gates on footpaths, and for the covering of St Lawrence School swimming pool. This year a donation has been made to the refurbishment appeal for the Players Theatre.

Some years ago the Society purchased a stretch of land called Ladies Walk, part of the former extensive gardens of St George's House, in order to prevent obtrusive development so close to the village. This now borders the Hurst Meadows acquired by the Parish Council, with the support of the Society, securing open land for the benefit of us all.

Any resident of Hurstpierpoint is able to join. The subscription per household is £5 per year or £40 for life. We always welcome members who would like to participate on the committee. Gretchen Rubin has developed a framework that seems to fit most people: when it comes to responding to expectations there appear to be four main personality types, Upholders, Questioners, Obligers and Rebels and knowing which type you (and those around you) are can help you to make or break habits and achieve your goals.

Rubin herself is an Upholder. She finds it easy to meet both inner and outer expectations, loves following rules and timetables and couldn't understand why others struggled to do the same.

Questioners resist 'rules for rules sake' but do ok meeting their inner expectations. I recognised myself as an Obliger; they tend to find it easier to live up to their obligations to others rather than to do things just for themselves. Rebels resist all expectations and asking them to do something will usually backfire.




