As many will have seen, the new Village Gateways have been installed at the entry to the two villages of Hurstpierpoint and Sayers Common and in general have been positively received. Most people have commented that they do give a stronger sense of place, which was our intention in putting them in place.

Although New Year's Day will be some weeks past when this page is

published, I would like to thank everyone who made the effort to join the 'Hurst Meadows Guided Walkabouts' on that day. Some eighty people in total took part in the two walks and, from the lively discussions that took place, thoroughly enjoyed the guided tours of the three meadows which make up the fifty acres that now belong in perpetuity to the community. My thanks to Cllr. Claire Majsai and Advisory Board member Helen Brangwyn for organising the event, which will be repeated at Easter when the new orchard has been planted.



At its recent January meeting the Parish Council approved its budget for the year 2019-2020. In looking to next year we have taken account of our proposed management of the new Court Bushes Community Hub which will open in the spring. The new community building will be a flexible space that can be used in different ways by local community groups. A large hall area will be available for social functions or as a venue for activities like exercise classes and it is hoped that a nursery provider will use the space to provide local childcare. While MSDC has made most of the investment in refurbishing the building, it is proposed that the Parish Council will be responsible for the day to day financial operation of the Hub. MSDC will consider our management proposal in March, but meanwhile we believe that it is right for us to make provision to fund the early days of this hugely worthwhile project. In order to make sure we can do this while continuing to balance our budget, we have increased our Band D council tax by 5% which equates to an additional £3.42 per household per year. This budget and the financial results for the year 2018-2019 will be presented as usual at the Annual Parish Meeting in May.

Finally, in May there are local elections, including the chance to elect a new Parish Council. Anyone wishing to stand for election should contact the MSDC election office for further details. The deadline for candidates to submit nomination forms is 3rd April.

Although the St Lawrence Fair seems a long way off, preparation is already underway, and perhaps none more so than for anyone who is thinking of entering the Fun Run this year. It has become an integral part of Fair Day and I met with race organiser Benny Coxhill along with two of last year's winners Laura O'Grady Serrut and Freddie Shalloe.

First conceived by Andrew Priddell, it used to be a much longer route, up to ten miles and going up Wolstonbury twice. Benny then got involved: "I used to see it go past my house in Bedlam Street and think I would like to do that, so I started training but that was the year they stopped running it! A group of us revived it about 20 years ago."

Benny took over the running of the event from lan Bush ten years ago. "We usually get about 100 people in total, 60 or 70 for the long course and 20 or 30 for the short course, but it would be nice to have a few more. We have had all sorts of runners over the years. Some serious runners; people have come from Scotland and even the Netherlands, so you get all sorts of people."

The long course goes over the top of Wolstenbury Hill and is just over five miles long. The shorter course cuts towards Danny House and over the fields and is close to a mile and half long. There's a short stretch of road on New Way Lane, and the race organisers are grateful to Danny House as they need permission to run on the drive. It can be a moment to frighten or inspire the runners according to Benny: "You can see the great hill behind the house and think I've got to go up there!"

Last year's winner Laura, who got involved when the 'We Run Hassocks' group helped organise the run a few years ago, thinks the Fun Run has its own unique flavour:

"It is low key, relaxed and has a different feel; a genuine 'fun run'. And it comes with great views! It's a lovely race all round." She explained that many of the runners are used to running longer distances on the roads and use this cross-country run to supplement their training.


Young Freddie, a Year 6 pupil at St Lawrence School, is hoping to retain his short course trophy this year. "I would like to win, even though it's a fun run. It's quite a short run for me but I also prefer cross-country running rather than on the roads, so that gives me an advantage I think."

The nature of Fair Day means that the start time of 2.45pm is not always met exactly. "Whether it's a lost child or trailers getting stuck in the arena, we ask the runners to prepare to be flexible about the start," explained Benny. As always they are looking for sponsors to meet the cost of the race numbers, medals and for prizes. They are grateful to Burgess Hill Runners for the loan of equipment such as poles, arrows, marquee, start cordon, bibs and starting horn, as well as with the marshalling.

As much as anything, the race couldn't be run without volunteers. Benny is particularly grateful for one group's help: "The Army Cadets are really good. They are from Hurst but also recruit from other branches. They are great, and they do whatever is asked of them."

If helping out at a water station appeals to you then please let Benny know. It's a great job for dog walkers who don't mind waiting somewhere on the route for an hour. As Laura said: "It gets really hot during the race, so we are really grateful for the water stations and volunteers."



# Treating the menopause naturally

During these years a variety of symptoms may be experienced; the most common of these are hot flushes, night sweats and vaginal dryness, but insomnia, anxiety, depression. fatigue, aches and pains, headache, palpitations, genital and urinary problems are also common. For a percentage of these women their 'normal' way of life and work becomes increasingly difficult. Conventional treatment is usually hormone replacement therapy (HRT), which is considered to be effective in treating the symptoms, and may be prescribed by GPs for years. Some women find HRT effective, but others experience many distressing effects; some are advised against taking it or are unwilling to take it. Continuing distress caused by their symptoms prompts many women to seek help from acupuncture.

Traditional acupuncture is a healthcare system based on ancient principles which go back nearly two thousand years. It has a very positive model of good health and function and looks at pain and illness as signs that the body is out of balance. The overall aim of acupuncture treatment, then, is to restore the body's equilibrium.

What makes this system so uniquely suited to modern life is that physical, emotional and mental well-being are seen as interdependent and reflect what many people perceive as the connection between the different aspects of their lives.

Traditional acupuncturists believe that the underlying principle of treatment is that illness and pain occur when the body's qi, or vital energy, cannot flow freely. There can be many reasons for this; emotional and physical stress, poor nutrition, infection or injury are among the most common. By inserting ultra-fine sterile needles into specific acupuncture points, a traditional acupuncturist seeks to re-establish the free flow of qi to restore balance and trigger the body's natural healing response.

Women seeking acupuncture for relief of symptoms associated with the menopause may present in a configuration that is unique to them. One of the strengths of acupuncture is in the tailoring of treatment to that unique individual. The results of studies suggest that acupuncture can be effective in reducing symptoms of hot flushes and can also be very helpful in treating symptoms of anxiety and depression associated with the menopause. Acupuncture therapy has a similar effect on hormones circulating in the blood as hormone replacement therapy.

## Feeding time

#### **HOGGIE HELP**

We hope spring is just around the corner and this means that the hoggies should be emerging from hibernation and will be hungry, so time to make or clean out your feeding station. Make sure there is always a shallow bowl of water. Hogs love meaty cat or dog food and cat biscuits, and there are also some very good hog specific foods available.

Please don't give your hogs bread and milk. They are lactose intolerant and the bread can swell in

their tummy, and please avoid meal worms, as these can cause metabolic bone disease. It's a bit like feeding your children only Mars bars!

You can easily make a feeding station from a storage box with a 13cm square hole cut at one end. Put a brick on top and make a tunnel in with a few more bricks. This will keep cats and foxes out. If you have a rat problem you may need to sort that out first.

If you are not sure who you are feeding, hogs are messy eaters. You could also put a sheet of paper in the bottom of your station and check the footprints.

#### A month in the life of a District Councillor

Mid Sussex District Councillors for the area, Colin Trumble, Anthony Watts Williams and John Wilkinson, have shared a diary of some of the main events of the previous two months. The idea is to give a flavour of what they do – it doesn't include all the meetings, telephone calls or communications they have with individual residents about planning, benefits, housing or other matters. But listed here are some of the issues raised which have a wider concern and interest. Each Councillor is mentioned by first name.

#### **3rd December**

Colin was at The Hurstpierpoint Parish Traffic & Parking meeting and, once again, raised the issue of experimental traffic lights at either end of the High Street. The problem is, of course, the lanes that enter the High Street between the pinch points where the lights would be sited, although a West Sussex County Council (WSCC) traffic engineer said this may be solvable. However, it was agreed that the loading bay would be for loading only, extra space was identified for parking and parking bays would be marked on the road.

#### 4th December

Anthony and John attended the Planning Chairmen and Vice Chairmen meeting. This looks at key issues and trends in Planning. Anthony is Vice Chairman of Planning Committee B and John is Vice Chairman of District Planning. MSDC has three planning committees; the District Planning committee, which looks at the larger more strategic applications and Planning Committees A and B, which look at the smaller, and more local, planning applications. Planning Committees are semi-judicial hearings weighing and deciding planning applications on planning law only.

#### 6th December

Anthony, John and Colin went to a MSDC briefing on Mayfield (who want to build up to 10,000 houses between Henfield and Sayers Common). It seems Mayfield are entering into a preferential planning agreement with Horsham District Council. However, MSDC's position on Mayfield (and that of our MPs) is unchanged - there is no need for and we are opposed to the Mayfield housing.

#### 8th December

John, Colin and Anthony ran a stall at the Christmas High Street event. We were roasting chestnuts and answering residents' questions from early afternoon into the evening - a great fun day. All the money raised went to the event's nominated charity.

#### 11th December

Colin chaired a Steering Group meeting on the Court Bushes Community Centre, just off Willow Way. This has been going through substantial and expensive refurbishment and should be ready for community use from Easter time. Anthony and John attended a MSDC Design Panel meeting on the planned Reeds Lane development at Sayers Common.

#### 12th December

Colin, Anthony and John attended a meeting of Full Council. These monthly meetings give final scrutiny and agreement to Council policy.

#### 13th December

Colin attended the monthly meeting of Hurstpierpoint and Sayers Common Parish Council. There are five parishes in the Ward; Hurstpierpoint & Sayers Common, Pyecombe, Newtimber, Poynings and Fulking. We make sure that one of the Ward Councillors attends each Parish meeting to hear the Parish's issues and update on MSDC matters.

#### 14th December

John and Colin attended a 'Hard Hat Tour' of the Court Bushes Community Centre, along with many residents and community organisations. It was an opportunity to see the rebuilding of the centre in progress. A freezing cold but most interesting morning. It will be a great community facility.

#### 18th December

A very busy day. In the morning John and Colin attended a MSDC working group finalising the Council's budget for 2019/20. Also in the morning, Anthony attended a regular meeting of South Downs National Park (SDNP) members. Anthony is MSDC's representative on SDNP. In the evening Colin, Anthony and John were members of a scrutiny committee looking at how MSDC should respond to Gatwick Airport's proposed expansion. This could involve permanent use of the standby runway or building a new second runway. We asked for much more information before we could make a reasoned response. In the afternoon John and Anthony were on the District Planning committee. In the days running up to the committee meeting, John and Anthony visited all the application sites to help them in the decision making process at committee.

#### 8th January

As Vice Chairman of MSDC, Colin and his wife Judy visited Sussex Housing and Care's Oakwood Flats in Haywards Heath. This is a fantastic care home and residential facility for older people. We met and spoke with many of the residents and staff and had a detailed discussion on local care issues with Sussex Housing's senior management. It's probably not widely known but MSDC do a lot of work on health and the Community but, unquestionably, more needs to be done on adult care.

#### 19th January

John, Anthony and Colin were at the quarterly Councillors' surgery, held at The New Inn in Hurst. It's a great opportunity for residents to come and meet us, discuss and ask questions. This time most of the issues were around the High Street. MSDC don't have responsibility for traffic and roads - that's the Parish and WSCC (West Sussex County Council). The three of us have since talked again with Joy Dennis, our WSCC Councillor, about the High Street and asked for action to be taken. Joy will again raise the High Street at the next Parish Traffic and Parking committee.

#### 22nd January

Anthony, Colin and John were at a meeting of the Burgess Hill Strategic Group, looking at progress on the Northern Arc. This is a development of some 3,500 houses arching around the north of Burgess Hill. MSDC has secured the involvement of Homes England to drive this forward, ensuring the delivery of the necessary infrastructure (roads, schools, community and health facilities) and social housing.

#### **30th January**

John, Anthony and Colin attended a meeting of Full Council.

And that's not all! All of us are on different Scrutiny Committees - there were meetings of each of these in January. Scrutiny Committees look in detail at different areas of the Council's work, ensuring plans and budgets are sound and achievable, the work is carried out on time and meets those planned objectives and budgets. It's a process of holding the Council's policy makers and executive to account.

Throughout December and January all of us worked with individual residents on a range of things like planning and benefits. At the moment, there are a number of planning issues we are dealing with not only in Hurstpierpoint but also in Sayers Common and Fulking. Additionally, we have been working and continue to work with the local communities and MSDC on developing and improving playground and community facilities, for instance in Hurstpierpoint, Pyecombe and Poynings.



The ever-smiling owner of the village chip shop, Dave Sharp, talks to Mike Thatcher.

I always found it hard to pinpoint Dave Sharp's accent, and being the sheltered southerner that I am I guessed broadly at London. "No, no. Peterborough, and you're not the first to guess wrong." In fact he lived there for the first 19 years of his life until he took up a place at Brighton University to study International Accountancy and Finance. Those three years taught him he didn't want to be an accountant.

"I think if computer sciences had been more advanced back then, then I would have done that. I've ended up as a programmer, that's what I really do. I started off programming hotel software, telephone systems through a guy I knew and ended up, through sheer demand, going online and doing websites." For the last 12 years he's worked for an American web agency and has been coding for them. Week-in, week-out he does 20 hours a week for them. "I don't want to give it up because it's a very useful skill as a back up if anything happens."

More often than not, when you enter his cookshop and he's tapping away he will be working on a website. As he was when I went to meet him, this time for a website selling stamps. He has always had a strong work ethic and always had part-time jobs even when studying. "I worked on the Pier in my first year at university, to

earn beer tokens, and gradually got promoted. When I graduated I stayed on the Pier another three years. Sideshows and the rides; long hours but a good party life, which suited me at that age!"

It was on the Pier that he met Nikki, his wife of 20 years, who was the PA to the general manager. Despite living in Brighton for ten years, he had never heard of Hurstpierpoint when the time came to move on from city living. "We were being shown round a house in Poynings, behind the Royal Oak, and I couldn't stand up in any of the rooms. The lady showing us around said she'd got this lovely little cottage in Hurstpierpoint. We saw it that day and have been here ever since."

Itching to start a business together they were inspired by friends in the Cotswolds. "We were often going up and staying weekends with friends there, and every little village in the Cotswolds had a cookshop. We were amazed that even people who were going on holiday were still buying things from cookshops." They started it as an online business and, because of his background, he built a website, loaded all the products and pictures up and let it run. This was late 2005 and early the following year premises, beside the clock shop became available and they set up a shop.

Three years later they found out that the corner shop was available and they moved in over a weekend. "We shut over there on a Saturday afternoon and opened here on the Monday. We had over a dozen friends with sack barrows and they moved the stock across." Seven years later they opened up a branch in Burgess Hill. "Nikki quit working for the Pension Regulator in Brighton after 15 years and she covered a full-time staff member who left. We thought it would be good to have a bigger shop in a town. And there were two of us, so we thought one could run one and one could run the other."

Then, as the retail outlook began to look bleaker, he decided to change tack. "I think it's very hard to stay afloat in a small High Street. Which is why we diversified again. A chip shop was only on my radar because I'd done it before." Cue a classic double take from me. Done it before? "Oh yes. From aged 15 I was a fish fryer in Peterborough for a guy who had done it for 30 years, and for three years he taught me everything he knew."

A takeaway licence is notoriously difficult to receive and the last one in the village was applied for in 2009. A lot of boxes had to be ticked, and that included installing the most advanced technology and lower opening hours. For three months before opening, on most Sundays they had a group of family and friends around and they'd test oils, ingredients, batters, mushy peas, curry sauces; everything they were to sell in fact. They never lacked for company on a Sunday.

On 6th April 2017 the chip shop opened to the public. Did he see the queue I wondered? "Taking a photo of the queue was literally the last thing on my mind on that night. It was unbelievable. Crazy! For the first two weeks there was a feel that everyone wanted to give it a try. It was great, but terrifying for me. I guess if I'd opened the doors and no one came that would be equally terrifying. The staff were learning on the fly. I was learning on the fly. You can test it at home all you like but you can't test it to scale."

The staff were there 8am most mornings and not leaving till midnight. It was a huge change to his life. "I'd been doing almost 9-5ish in the shop and then all of a sudden you're working day and night. Now that everything is fine-tuned and running I get home about 10pm."

Now an equal number of regulars complement the 'if and when' crowd. He does have to prepare more food if a payday falls on a Friday, as it creates a noticeable spike in sales. Plans for online ordering, grilled fish and, most importantly, the search for an assistant fryer are all in the pipeline.

He now feels much more part of Hurstpierpoint life than when they first moved here. "Then we both still worked in Brighton, which meant we didn't spend much



time in the village. We were guilty of being one of those couples who are out of the village from 7am-7pm and didn't use the shops because we weren't here." He was on the Parish Council for a year and half, which he found rewarding but hard to get things done, and retains an admiration for their efforts.

On the rare occasions he squeezes in some downtime he can be found on the allotment with a flask of tea or at the New Inn with a glass of red wine.

He was at pains throughout our chat to flag up support from two sources – Nikki and the village. "Nikki's a big part of what we've done - she organises everything and makes things work. In the beginning we both did everything together. I know I couldn't have started the chip shop without her."

It's also of great comfort to him that he largely feels the village is behind him: "The support is amazing and we get fantastic feedback. Invariably any swipes on social media are met with a barrage of support, which is great.

"One of the things I said to myself when I started this business is that you can't please everyone all the time." This is truer with a chip shop than almost any other line of business, as, what makes a good chip or which batter is best is so subjective. But if sheer hard work and service with a smile are the key to winning over customers, then I'm sure Dave is well on his way to pleasing most people most of the time.

Four films squeezed in this month, before the refurbishment of the Players starts in the spring. We start on **Friday 8th March at 8pm** with **The Rider (15)**. Occasionally a film comes along that captures an honest slice of American life with performances so authentic that you forget you're watching a movie. This is just such a film. The competition days of a rising star of the rodeo circuit are over following a riding accident, and he finds himself wondering what he has to live for. A complete surprise and a masterpiece in every way, The Rider is an incredibly compassionate, beautiful, humane piece of work from the talented Chloe Zhao and is not to be missed.

Next on **Thursday 14th March at 8pm** we show **Western (15)**. A group of German construction workers start a tough job at a remote building site in the Bulgarian countryside. The foreign land awakens the men's sense of adventure, but they are also confronted with their own prejudice and mistrust due to the language barrier and cultural differences. The stage is quickly set for a showdown when two men begin to compete for recognition and favour from the local villagers. This is one of the best and most overlooked films of 2018.

Then on **Friday 22nd March at 8pm** is **Good Time** (15). Here's an edge of the seat, utterly gripping thriller – a Good Time indeed.

After a botched bank robbery lands his younger brother in prison, Constantine Nikas (Robert Pattinson) embarks on a twisted odyssey through New York City's underworld in an increasingly desperate – and dangerous – attempt to get his brother out of jail. Over the course of one adrenalized night, Constantine finds himself on a mad descent into mayhem as he races against the clock to save his brother and himself, knowing their lives hang in the balance.

Finally on **Sunday 24th March at 3pm** we screen **The Wife (12A)**. Joan and Joe Castleman (Glenn Close and Jonathan Pryce) have been married for nearly 40 years. Where Joe is casual, Joan is elegant. Where Joe is vain, Joan is self-effacing. Joe is about to be awarded the Nobel Prize for his acclaimed and prolific body of work. The Wife interweaves the story of the couple's youthful passion and ambition with a portrait of a marriage over 30 years later – a lifetime's shared compromises, secrets, betrayals, and mutual love.

I was reading lately that around one in six children believe a blueberry muffin counts as part of their five a day. There is lots of confusion around the five a day concept as portion size needs to be considered with each individual fruit. There's a great NHS document which can be used for this purpose (https://bit.ly/2DEjAJZ). But let's be clear on one thing; not all blueberry muffins are created equal and, although we'd rather our kids be eating fresh fruit than cake, baking is a great way to inspire kids to get excited about making things from scratch, especially when you are baking with fruit or vegetables. Whilst putting these delicious muffins together it's fairly likely that some of the blueberries will get eaten. When serving them up it's a delicious idea to sprinkle a few fresh berries over the top of the baked muffin. So, you could be part way to your five a day goal by the time the muffins are ready. To be enjoyed in moderation of course!



#### Method

Preheat the oven to 190C. Line a 12-cup muffin tin with paper liners. Spray the pan and the liners with non-stick cooking spray.

In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder and salt.

In the bowl of an electric mixer, beat the butter and granulated sugar for about 2 minutes. Add the eggs one at a time, scraping down the sides of the bowl and beating well after each addition. Beat in the vanilla extract and almond extract. (The batter may look a little grainy -that's okay.)

Gradually add the flour mixture, alternating with the milk, beating on low speed to combine. The batter will

be very thick. Add the blueberries to the batter and fold gently with a spatula until evenly distributed. Do not overmix.

Scoop the batter into the prepared muffin tin (an icecream scoop with a wire scraper works well here); they will be very full. Sprinkle the demerara sugar evenly on top of the muffins.

Bake for about 30 minutes until lightly golden. Let the muffins cool in the pan for about 10 minutes. Run a knife around the edge of each muffin to free it from the pan if necessary (the blueberries can stick), then transfer the muffins to a rack to cool completely.

An estimated 60,000 people each year in the UK have an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest and, sadly, less than 10% of those people will survive. Yet if a bystander is able to start CPR they could double a person's chances of survival.

Hurstpierpoint has four machines: One on the outside wall at the Fairfield Rec on Cuckfield Road, another is situated at the Bowls Club on South Avenue Rec, a third is inside the Medical Centre on Trinity Road and the final defib machine is mounted on the wall in the alleyway between Morley's and Olive on the High Street. In Sayers Common there is one on the outside wall of the Community Shop (by the door to the hall). While in Albourne there is one inside the Primary School, in the gym of Wickwoods Country Club (up Shaves Wood Lane) and one mounted on the outside wall of Albourne Village Hall, to the right of the entrance doors. Not all of these

will be available 24/7 but the outside ones listed (right) should be.

All of the machines are portable and contain full instructions, but why not give yourself a head start with an online tutorial?


The Resuscitation Council (UK) has produced plenty of information to help us all learn more about what to do in these dramatic and highly pressured times, should we find ourselves involved.

If you have any information about changes to these defibrillators, then do please let us know, so we can update this mag for next time.






# This Must Be The Place by Maggie O'Farrell

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

The central relationship in This Must Be The Place is that between Daniel Sullivan and Claudette Wells. Claudette is a former movie star who left her career for a life of solitude in Ireland; she guards her privacy fiercely and is a volatile woman who demands absolute loyalty from her family. Daniel's journey to Ireland was an escape from the pain of a failed marriage in America. His devotion to his new family seems absolute, but his complicated past leads him on a journey away from them, and whether he can navigate his way back becomes hard to predict.

Maggie O'Farrell is the author of seven novels and this is her latest: it spans decades and continents but is at heart a domestic tale, told in a way that is a departure from her usual style. There are multiple narrators, some of whom appear only briefly, and the reading group I discussed this with was divided about some of the experimental elements (particularly the auction catalogue, complete with photos). I felt the experiment paid off and will be going back to read more of her work as the characterisations were strong enough to hold the story together and held my interest all the way through.

Decide for yourself by picking up a copy on your next visit to Hurst Library, there will be copies on display throughout March.



#### Halt a probate application

#### LISTEN TO THE LAWYER

**Question:** I am a beneficiary under a Will and I am concerned about the Will's validity. What can I do to stop the deceased's estate being administered?

Answer: If a family member or a beneficiary has concerns regarding the validity of a deceased's Will, it may be appropriate for a 'caveat' to be entered at the Probate Registry on their behalf. The caveat is a notice that prevents anyone being able to obtain a grant of probate of the deceased's estate, which, in turn, means that the estate cannot be administered while the caveat is in place. A caveat remains in force for a period of six months. This gives the concerned party time to investigate the issue and discuss it with the executors whilst protecting their position to bring a claim against the estate if they have grounds to. If it is necessary, a caveat can also be renewed every six months to prolong the period of protection.

To register the caveat, you must complete a form and send it to the local Probate Registry. This must include full details about the deceased person, as recorded in their death certificate, and their last permanent address. There is a fee of £20 payable when applying for a caveat. The executors of the estate will be alerted to the existence of the caveat when they apply for probate. They will be given a copy and may then choose to discuss the matter with you to resolve the concern. However, if they do not consider there is any justification for the caveat they may issue a 'warning' against you, again by filing a form at the Probate Registry. You will then be required to set out full details of why you are opposing the probate application, this is called entering an 'appearance'. Failing to respond to the warning within the prescribed time frame is likely to result in the caveat being removed. If the appearance is accepted by the Probate Registry your caveat will then remain in force indefinitely until the disputed matters are

Whether a caveat continues to be appropriate will depend on the circumstances and it should be kept under review. Independent legal advice should be taken because if an appearance is entered then the person applying for the caveat could face costs penalties from the court if the court feels it was inappropriate that it was applied for. Likewise, legal advice should also be taken by the executors when faced with a caveat as they could face costs sanctions if the court believes they have behaved unreasonably by warning off the caveat too soon, or at all.



#### Spring at the farm

Each morning and afternoon, as we drive to and from Hurstpierpoint on our school run, we observe the changes in the seasons, in the hedgerows and fields and, of course, the daylight hours. We always get excited as the days lengthen and we look ahead to spring.

There is a lot to do in preparation for the busy weeks ahead on the farm, and this is always emphasised when we have our sheep flock scanned to see how many lambs each ewe is having. This year we have 64 expecting triplets and six sets of quadruplets, the remaining 265 expecting twins and 62 singles. It is a good result and it certainly confirms we are going to be busy! We will start lambing around the middle of March. Between now and then the lambs grow at a significant rate, and we have to be very gentle if we need to move the pregnant mums around. Although it never seems to affect them too much when it comes to feeding time!

Normally we would have started calving by now but, after the hard winter and spring last year and two lots of snow, we decided to move it to April-time. William, our bull, is in one of our fields next to the road at the moment, so you may see him as you drive to and from Brighton.

We always like to remember all the other amazing wildlife we share the farm with. Each summer we plant a special wild bird seed plot full of sunflowers, fodder radish and millet, to name a few. During the flowering period in the summer it is alive with bees and butterflies, and as it dies back the seeds feed the birds, such as linnets and goldfinch, over the winter. We have seen flocks of up to 200 linnets! Corn buntings have made a return too, which is a key species we are trying to encourage back on to the farm.

We love sharing what we are doing here at Saddlescombe with our local community, so please come and join us on one of our lambing open days: 30th, 31st March and 6th, 7th April. Saddlescombe Farm is just ten minutes away from the village. Hurstpierpoint artists Kate Harries and Kate McMinnies are also joining us for the first weekend, plus we will be selling our delicious lamb burgers and the Wildflour Café will be open for other refreshments.


