Postie turned shepherd in Hurst

Hurst postwoman Kelly Tullett found herself at the centre of a news story last month after an unexpected encounter with some local sheep. The story appeared in several local newspapers, as well as on two radio stations. Kelly is delighted that such a happy story has got so much attention. "I've had lots of reactions about it on Facebook and online. Lots of residents on my round have recognised me too and it's put a smile of lots of people's faces. I found it funny myself for being in that situation."

The incident occurred as she was on her rounds in the village and she spotted a stricken sheep in a field. Kelly had actually studied animal care in college and is a huge animal lover so rushed over to help. "The sheep looked like she had been there all night, and it took me five minutes to roll her over and get her to her feet. She was very wobbly, so I stayed with her for another five minutes until she got her balance."

Although the sheep trotted off, Kelly had not counted on the other sheep confronting her. "One of the sheep really charged at me, and when I first saw it I was scared. I was panicking, but quickly I saw the funny side and was laughing." Grabbing her mail bags she took flight. It was a few hundred metres before she reached safety and dispensed a few words about gratitude to her chasers.

She is just happy that things turned out well for the sheep and the story has put a smile on some faces. "It felt good to help the sheep. She didn't chase me, so I suppose that was her way of saying thank you."







It's spring, let's cycle!

Cycling Without Age (CWA) Hurst & Hassocks is set to add a second trishaw to its fleet later this month, thanks to the generosity of the Burgess Hill District Lions. The group, headed up by Bridget Hamilton, will take delivery of the unit when it is shipped direct from Copenhagen.

"We are so grateful to the Lions," Bridget explained, "as a second bike means we'll be able to do more to help combat loneliness in our villages, getting more elderly people out in the fresh air and having fun. It also means that we can have one trishaw based in Hassocks and the other in Hurstpierpoint, which, logistically, is easier for our pilots, the volunteers doing the cycling."

The next event takes place on 18th May at Holy Trinity Church, where the CWA team will be giving a talk and offering free rides.

New dates for Rope production



Church excited to see Community **Hub built in Willow Way**

The Point – a church which originally started in Hurstpierpoint but now meets at St Paul's Catholic College in Burgess Hill – has been involved in events and activities in the Willow Way community since 2004.

Following the difficulties of the Court Bushes Ex-Serviceman's Club back in 2017, it was looking doubtful as to what would happen with the building.

Vicar Will Kemp explained: "Thankfully, Mid Sussex District Council stepped in. Both MSDC and the Hurstpierpoint Parish Council have been extremely generous in involving us (and other interested stakeholders) in many of the planning meetings for the new building.

The completely refurbished building is due to have a formal grand opening on Saturday 1st June - but, in the meantime, The Point along with other Hurstpierpoint churches has made regular booking for the large function room, in order to relaunch The Melting Pot Cafe - which will take place every Wednesday and Friday between 9am and 4pm.

"Our hope is to re-open the Food Bank from the building and for other local services such as Clarion Housing to run housing surgeries and training events too," Will continued.

Mike Thatcher meets Hurst resident Richard Sullivan who plays an important roll ensuring the Brighton Marathon runs smoothly...

The Brighton Marathon starts for Richard in November when the team of organisers gets together to plan for April's race, discussing what worked and what needs improving. He has a lot to bring the table when it comes to knowing what is required on the day. He ran the first three marathons, so he knows what the runners want; he was a spectator for four years and then joined the volunteering team. Quickly making an impression with his organisational skills, he now runs the crucial opening section of the race with a team of volunteers under him.

"When I now run the half marathon I expect people to be out there marshaling for me. So now that I have decided to run no more marathons it makes sense for me to get out there and help," Richard explains.

With the bike race starting at 7am, followed by the 10k run at 9am and then finally the marathon half an hour later, there is no time to relax and barriers have to be adjusted between each group. "A few late starters in the 10k race almost did the marathon route as we'd already started reconfiguring the barriers. Luckily, there was a gap for them to get through!"

This year was particularly cold for his 5am start as he briefed the volunteers and put out the barriers and hay bales once the roads were closed. One of the main challenges every year is keeping people off the routes and fielding the 'can't I just nip through, there are no runners yet' type requests. As Preston Park train station is closed there is a stream of runners walking up to the start from town on roads which have to be kept clear.

The crowds were out in big numbers this year. "The big marathon start didn't seem to take as long as last year, and we were soon dismantling barriers and clearing away as the runners made their way around the city. I managed to clock up 12km of walking whilst just looking after one corner! It was great fun as ever, though, and we have a good team in Zone 1. The Brighton public also turned out in greater numbers than previous years and were very good-natured. It's usually quite quiet around the start, spectator-wise, but there were loads of people out there this year."

Being in charge of the first section is intense for a short period of time but he is also very grateful that it gives him a chance to see some of the race. Having run this marathon himself he knows how valuable encouragement is from any source, so once his barriers are packed away he heads off to shout the runners on.

Richard is glad that he is becoming part of the fabric of the race, in fact his corner was christened Sully's corner by the rest of the team, and would encourage anyone to volunteer. "I know many people who volunteered and were so inspired that they took up running and now do marathons themselves. It's very rewarding and we are always looking for volunteers. I'm already looking forward to doing it all again next year."

How did they do?

Time to catch up with our featured runners from last month's edition and see how they got on completing the Brighton Marathon...

Bart Bailey

Bart was yet again hampered by an injury in the lead-up to the race but was determined to compete. "It was a great day in Brighton with amazing support from the big crowds who braved some freezing winds along the seafront to cheer us all on. My time was 4h 17m which, while slower than my target, I am really pleased with considering the amount of training lost to injuries over the last few



weeks. Most importantly I raised over £2,500 (and still rising) for Dementia UK, which is a fantastic result! Roll on next year!"

"It was a great day, although I struggled to walk the next day!

"The Sunday was fine but cold and it was a steady run. I found the miles between 16 and 22 hard work, but the time went surprisingly quickly, helped by the crowds and family and friends supporting. However, running and training for the Marathon has been an overwhelmingly positive




experience - not only was I thrilled to come in just under the five hour mark at 4h 55m but I have also managed to raise £3,500 for Breast Cancer Now. I said that it would be my first and last, and I haven't changed my mind! I love running but, from now on, I will stick to 10k races and perhaps the occasional half-marathon."

It was an incredible and unforgettable experience."



Michaela finished in 4h 31m, and Cathy and Sarah ran and finished together in a time of 4h 43m.

Huge congratulations to these and all Hurst runners on their hugely impressive achievement, both in the running and funds raised.





VILLAGE PEOPLE

There is a Mitchell and Webb sketch where Neil Armstrong is to be interviewed about an album he's releasing and his agent warns the journalist against mentioning the moon landings. I did have a concern when I met Lisa that by not talking about her facial disfigurement, which has so shaped her life, I would, in fact, be drawing attention to it in some way. I needn't have worried. As a media ambassador for an organisation called Changing Faces for over 20 years she welcomed the chance to talk about them and how they have helped her come to terms with her appearance.

When Lisa was six years old her face 'decided to drop' and became paralysed. Inevitably she does not remember her school days with any fondness: "I couldn't wait to get out of school and I never told my parents I was being bullied, they had enough to cope with." She also recalls being let down by adults, which was

equally hard to take. During the Year 5 photo shoot she overheard the photographer ask 'will that girl's face always be like that?' and on other occasion, after yet another operation and two weeks off school, the deputy head asked if she'd been to the dentist.

She underwent 18 surgeries during her time at secondary school, which at the time were groundbreaking, and the surgeons were delighted with the results. Her mother had to sign consent forms to allow new procedures, which was especially tough as a parent. "She hated it. When I got to 18 she was relieved, as she didn't have to sign anything anymore. But throughout it all she was always there, sitting beside me when I woke up."



After school she went into nannying, fully admitting that it was a place where you could largely hide from the real world, but soon she realised that something had to give and a decision had to be made. One of her few school friends had moved abroad, so she took the plunge. "I thought I've just got to do it. I bought my ticket, packed my bag, told everyone I was leaving and just headed off to Australia. It was the best thing I could ever have done."

Since then she has been to well over 40 countries and if ever the hackneyed phrase 'finding yourself' could ever be used it is in her case. "I was happy for the first time in my life and got that feeling every single time I went travelling. My confidence soared and I found that I was actually a very happy, friendly and chatty person who people wanted to be near. As a child this had been squeezed out of me from years and years of bullying."

She has lived in Hurstpierpoint for ten years now but she still travels at every opportunity, now taking her daughter Evie with her, and admits that there is still an element of escaping normal life. "When I travel I don't worry about my face and when people look at it it doesn't seem to bother me as much as it does at home. When in Africa, Asia or Central America I look different anyway because of my hair and skin tone, so they look at me because I am a Westerner."

I first met Lisa about seven years ago when she was holding forth at the kitchenette bar in the Village Centre at one of Singing Sue's classes, young children at our feet. Everyone there seemed to know her and, perhaps understandably, she made a quick impression on me. In my limited experience people in similar position to her deal with it in one of three ways. The first is with the 'what are you looking at' return stare. The second is the 'look at the floor, don't look at me' approach. I have no intention of making a judgment because, heavens knows, I can't imagine what it must be like to be stared at everyday of your life.

But Lisa took the third, and perhaps rarest, option which was to act naturally and stand there making normal conversation. Very soon I relaxed and, although I was curious about what had happened to her, I felt that by her behaving is if everything was normal, which of course it was, she retained ownership and it was in her power to bring it up or not. "A lot of people don't ask and will talk to me as if nothing is wrong because I project that and it might come up in conversation another time. I prefer people to ask, if they want to, I don't mind".

This confidence can be attributed in large part to one remarkable man, James Partridge. James was burnt in a car accident aged 18 and noticed afterwards that whilst he was the same person people were treating him differently. So he founded Changing Faces in order to help others in the same plight. Lisa's mum happened to hear about it on breakfast television and got in touch. It changed her life. "It was

the first time I had met anyone who had anything remotely wrong with their face. In workshops they would teach you how to walk into a room, learn how to read things positively and not negatively. They taught me to think people are looking at me because I'm amazing!"

Her admiration for James shone through. "He would listen to you and say 'I understand', and you would think, 'Actually you do, don't you, because you look different too'. I can't remember what my life was like before my face went funny. I don't know any different. But because James knew different, he was ready to make a stand." So when he retired recently, on the 25th Anniversary of Changing Faces, he asked Lisa to do a speech in front of 200 people at the top of the Guerkin. She was terrified but wanted to make



sure that she did him proud and mark their 20-year friendship appropriately.

It is almost impossible for her to assess how her life and personality would be different, as it is for any of us, had things panned out differently. "If something doesn't go right, then very occasionally a voice in the back of my head says it's because you don't fit in but that's probably not the case." She does however clearly recall meeting someone else in the same boat as her early on. "Years ago I met a cousin of a friend who had the same thing as I did. She never had any operations and had never been bullied at her all girls school. Her face did not affect her at all. I do remember thinking 'I wish I could be a bit more like you'. She didn't care and it made me think: if I hadn't been bullied, how would things have turned out."

She has now found an ideal job working at Woodlands Meed school since 2012, which she loves. "My face never comes into it, I don't even think about it when I'm at work. It's a good job to have and it does make you thankful for what you have." She continues to travel, to work as a media ambassador for Changing Faces (www.changingfaces.org.uk), empowering others to use their faces and not hide them and trying to make sure her daughter grows up being proud of her mum. And the future?

"I'm going to be the mad cat lady living in a caravan down in Cornwall."

A&E for hogs

HOGGIE HELP

Our gardens can be the perfect haven for our prickly friends, but it can also be fraught with dangers such as strimmers, forks, netting, drains and dogs. So it's important to know what to do if you find an injured or poorly hog.

As I mentioned in a previous column, hogs are nocturnal so should not be out during the day unless they are mothers on a mission. So if you find a hoggie with an injury, looking wobbly or just little, wear gloves and pick him up and have a look. If there's an obvious injury he may need a trip to a vet. Or sometimes they will have internal parasites, such as lung worm, that if left can be fatal so it's important to seek help ASAP. Put them in a box with an old towel and a hot water bottle filled with warm water. Do not wait and see. Offer water but no food.



Although it's fascinating for the kids to see a live hog they need be in a calm quiet place. It's normal for hogs to have two or three ticks, but often when they are unwell they may have a lot more. Don't worry if they have fleas, this is normal too. They are host specific so will not live on you or your pets. Sadly hogs never come with any medical notes and will do anything not to be found by us, so by the time I see them they can be very unwell and a fair amount of detective work might be needed. Please give us a call (07787 515296) if you are not sure. So keep your eyes peeled!

Magnificent Magnolias

GARDENING CALENDAR

By Juliet Sargeant, Garden & Landscape Designs Well, wasn't that fabulous? The best year for magnolias in ages – so the experts tell us. And, judging by the local display, it seems that Hurstpierpoint is a favoured spot for these acid-loving plants.

In their native homelands many magnolias are woodland plants that like to shelter under the branches of larger trees. So, varieties such as stellata, wilsonii and sieboldii will thrive in a little shade. Others will tolerate shade but may not flower so well.

I love to plant magnolia glades with a mixture of different pinks, whites and purples in increasingly audacious flower forms. Planted in well-spaced groups, within grass and under-planted with bulbs, they are a very low-maintenance option. Impressive, vibrant cultivars to look out for include the M. lilliflora 'Nigra'.


Some say that magnolias are boring when they are not in flower, but their flowers are so spectacular that, for them, I am willing to cast aside my designer's mantra that a shrub should have at least two seasons of interest.

So, if you want to plant a magnolia, the first thing to do is test the acidity of your soil. You can buy a kit from a garden centre for about £7 and follow the easy instructions. If the pH is acid to neutral then the world of magnolias is your oyster, but if it is neutral to alkaline, all is not lost – try types like M. stellata 'Jane Platt' or M. stellate 'Royal Star'.

Choose the planting position carefully, so the petals will not be 'frosted' to a soggy brown colour, and prepare the soil well by digging in acid compost. They have very delicate roots and hate disturbance, so never buy them bare-rooted. Plant gently, taking care not to compact or damage the roots (don't loosen the root-ball as you would with other plants). Each year they will relish a feed with acid-fertiliser and a good mulch with more ericaceous soil.

And finally, there is the evergreen Magnolia grandiflora. The massive, glossy leaves of these plants of M. 'Little Gem' or M. laevifolia 'Gail's Favourite' can be snapped off by the weight of heavy snow, so a sheltered spot suits them best.

So, with magnolias the bulk of the work is at the beginning. Once settled, there is very little to do except look forward to a magnificent annual display.

1 tbsp olive oil

1 tsp lemon juice (or white wine vinegar)

1 tsp chopped or dried mint (or dill)

1/2 tsp salt

Pepper to taste

Method

Sprinkle grated cucumber with salt. Let sit in a colander to drain for 10 minutes, then squeeze out excess water with your hands.

Combine yogurt, cucumber, lemon juice, garlic, oil, dill/mint and salt in a bowl. Mix well.

You can either serve immediately or chill in refrigerator for one hour before serving.

Understanding anxiety and panic attacks

We all feel anxious sometimes and these feelings are often normal reactions to challenging events, which can be useful warning signs that perhaps we need to slow down, be careful or take a different path.

However, for some people, anxiety builds up to such an extent that they begin to experience panic attacks – episodes of intense feelings of fear, often accompanied by physical symptoms ranging from sweating, dizziness and nausea to palpitations, hyperventilating and chest pains.

Put simply a panic attack is an exaggeration of the body's normal 'fight or flight' reaction, activating the natural response to a dangerous situation, telling us to either run from or turn and defend ourselves from danger. When that danger is perceived rather than real, we can be left with all of the unpleasant, physical and psychological symptoms.

Not only are these symptoms very frightening, they can also affect the daily lives of sufferers – avoiding certain situations, people or places, often mistaking the very real, physical symptoms of panic for other medical conditions, causing them even more worry and anxiety.

It is important to get as much support and information as you can to understand what is going on for you. Your GP can advise you on treatment options and there are many websites available offering help and advice. Counselling can help you to address the underlying causes of your anxiety.

Design & Conservation Awards in Hurst

In line with its conservation brief, Hurstpierpoint Society awards Certificates of Commendation each year to acknowledge good craftsmanship and design throughout the village. The commendations apply to small projects, including conservation, restoration and repair, and larger projects such as new build and extensions.

Last month the Society held its 11th awards event at Hurstpierpoint Village Centre.



The most exciting awards went to Richard Burrows, the owner of Danny House, and Philip Jackson, Britain's foremost sculptor with a worldwide reputation for public commissions that include such work as Mahatma Gandhi in Parliament Square and Bobby Moore at Wembley.

Jackson's magnificent bronze sculpture of Lloyd George Dancing the Hornpipe at Danny, unveiled in September last year, commemorates the centenary of the end of World War One and the part played by Danny House. The elegant and well-proportioned statue, along with the brick plinth and plaque, acknowledge the historical and architectural importance of the Grade 1 listed Danny house and its parkland.

RECYCLE THIS...

WSCC Recycling Ambassador Colin McFarlin sheds some light on what can and can't be recycled in our domestic blue bins. If you have a question for him, email: editor@hurstlife.co.uk



Thank you for all your individual enquiries about your recycling. By the time you read this I will have replied individually to all your emails to the editor on recycling. Keep the questions coming...

I really enjoy the challenge of the questions you send me. This month I will share with you two of the questions I received.

What can I do with old towels, bed linen, clothes, etc? You will be pleased to know there are a number of options open to you.

You can contact the Cats Protection at Chelwood Gate 01825 741 330 as they are often looking for old towels and bedding they can use for their stray cats.

You can take them to a charity shop. As you know charity shops accept good quality items they can resell, but did you know that charity shops also accept 'rags'. This is the term used to describe old worn clothes that cannot be sold in the shops. These are collected and sold to the rag industry where they are shredded, cleaned and used as filling for, amongst other things, car seats. Next time you are sitting in a car you are almost certainly sitting on someone's old clothes!

You can take them all to the Household Waste Recycling Site in Burgess Hill or East Grinstead, where you will find a specific bay for your items. These are also sold to the rag industry, but the money goes to WSCC for essential services.

Do you remember rag and bone men? Well, it is the same trade, but without the horse and cart!

You can take them to the many clothes banks you will see around Haywards Heath. You can find them at Sainsburys in the car park immediately to the right as you drive in, or outside many local shops.

The important thing is NOT put them into your kerbside recycling bin or your kerbside rubbish bin as they cannot be recycled through that mechanical process.

How can I recycle the plastic holder my razor blades are packed in (see photo)?

This type of plastic cannot be recycled in your kerbside recycling bin but do put into your black top rubbish bin and all the plastics and paper are extracted and



turned into RDF - Refuse derived Fuel that is then sold to industry. This way they do not end up in landfill.

Keep Recycling.



Lifeboat by Charlotte Rogan

BOOK REVIEW

A courtroom drama crossed with a maritime adventure, 'Lifeboat' is the testimony of Grace Winter, survivor of the sinking of the transatlantic liner Empress Alexandra in the summer of 1914.

There aren't many supplies on dangerously overcrowded Lifeboat 14 and it is only two days before the first remarks are made suggesting that volunteers 'go for a swim'. There is one crew member in the boat, an able seaman named Hardie, who initially took charge. Soon his authority is challenged by some of the passengers led by Mrs Grant, a woman who is not afraid to make difficult decisions.

After three weeks adrift the remaining survivors are rescued, but this leads to further complications for Grace – 22 years old and just weeks into her marriage to a rich banker, she finds herself widowed and on trial for her life.

Lifeboat dramas are usually dominated by male characters, so this story is unusual for the genre - there are a number of strong female characters among the castaways. The reader learns the story as told by Grace, the action switching from the courtroom to the events in the boat itself, as layer by layer the truth is revealed.


