As the new season kicked off in September over 250 under 16s from the village and surrounding areas have taken to local pitches to train for the season ahead. As well as starting full of hope for the new season, many players have also been heading out onto the field in fresh new kit courtesy of a number of local businesses.

As a club run by volunteers we rely on local support in many ways, as our dedicated coaches and committee work tirelessly to ensure that players have a safe and enjoyable place to play football. We are really excited to partner with several new businesses that have chosen to invest in our village football teams.

Firstly, our under 7s will be starting their season in kit provided by Archipelo Coaching. CEO Gary Cole who lives in the village and has a son in the team says that he was keen to sponsor the team: "Because I'm a strong believer in the strength of a local community and this is a small way in which I can support that." Archipelo provide professional coaching to businesses and Gary say that he hopes that their sponsorship helps players to be mentally strong and explore their untapped potential through football.

The under 8s have a big season ahead of them as they join the Horsham and District league for the first time. Hurst resident Lizzie Hadlow commented: "Tilly attends the STARS group which is for the more complex disabled children, many of whom are wheelchair users. She attends regularly during the holidays and at weekends and is always guaranteed the most amazing time! Kangaroos not only give our family much needed respite and time to devote to our other two children but also provides Tilly with extraordinary experiences - speed boat rides, abseiling, dry skiing, trips to Chessington!

"This summer she was taken to Euro Disney. It was the most incredible time and the smiles on her face in the photos meeting Mickey, on the rides and seeing the fireworks said it all! We couldn't be more grateful to Kangaroos for their support to our family and for the loving care given to Tilly by all the carers and volunteers."

The children, all members of Kangaroos, range in age from nine to 18. All of them have a learning disability and



several of them have additional complex medical needs. The children were accompanied on the trip by a team of Kangaroos highly trained care staff. For many of the children it was their first trip outside the UK and their longest trip away from home without their parents or carers.

Kangaroos was established in 1994 to provide support and fun activities for young people with a learning disability, many of whom have very limited opportunities to enjoy a social life and make friends. The charity decided to celebrate its 25th Anniversary by enabling all of its 200+ members to go on a very special trip that they would remember for the rest of their lives.

"Over the years many of our young people have said they would like to go to Disneyland, but we never thought it would happen," said Jenni Herrett, the founder of Kangaroos who still works to raise funds for the charity. We will have a further round up of the Festival events in next month's edition.







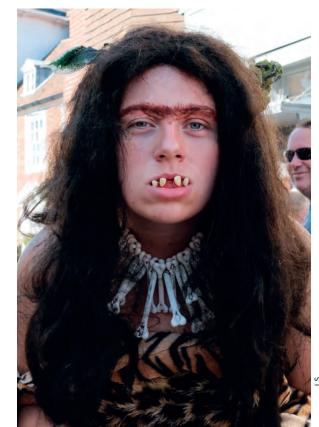

We started the season aiming for promotion for the 1st XI and actually we went one better, finishing as champions, ending the season with a crushing victory at Horsted Keynes. The batters struggled initially being reduced to 111/7 but some big hitting at the end of the innings took us firstly over the 125 mark. This guaranteed enough bonus points where we couldn't be caught and saw us finally posting a score of 208/8 which the opposition never threatened. The best team always wins after a long season and we were well led by Matt Parsons and Simon Tunley. There always seemed to be someone to step up with a performance when wickets were falling, or a catch needed to be taken.

As noted last month, the effort of getting to the top of the league was just too much for the second XI. Having made the summit we struggled to put together a sequence of wins and we ended the season in mid table which was a shame because we had felt promotion was not out of the question. Skipper Tony Andrews and a backbone of senior players kept the show on the road with some great individual performances and despite the decidedly average end to the season we can look forward to next year with confidence.

The 3rd XI had a really good season, introducing lots of new players to the game and the club and putting in some really good performances, claiming some excellent victories and finishing creditably in mid table. Next season should be interesting, we have a crop of youngsters ready for senior cricket and they need to play, probably at 1st or 2nd XI level which should mean a rump of players available for 3rd team cricket, week in week out. That should make us very competitive.

Next year will also be interesting for the Women's XI. We've only ever had one captain and Karen Miles has decided to give up the role to focus on her batting, leaving some big shoes to fill. Women's cricket is developing fast in Sussex and with Alan Perrin developing the next generation of female cricketers we can look forward to some exciting games next year.

Last month I wrote that our under 14s were preparing to take on Middleton in the semi-final and I'm delighted to report that our lads did it. We posted 177/3 with Will Bowley 85 not out and Henry Olliff also batting well. As we move into the autumn months I would like to use this page to talk about some of the community engagement projects that the Parish Council and particularly our Community Affairs committee are engaged in.

Many will have seen from our newsletter that the Memory Moments Café is now up and running at the Court Bushes Hub on every first Thursday of the month. We are working with the organisers to see if a twice monthly opening is feasible. Everyone is welcome especially people with memory problems with their relatives and friends.

We are also working with representatives of the local midwifery service to try and set up clinics at the Court Bushes Hub that would save women the current journey to the nearest clinics in Burgess Hill.

The council has decided that its website is in need of an overhaul partly because of new legislation due next year and partly because we feel that it is not as easy to use or informative as it could be. Priorities will be to develop closer links with other local organisations and to coordinate the website with other social media. Over the next few months we will be putting together a design specification and we would welcome interest from local web designers. Please contact the Parish Office if you feel you can contribute ideas at this stage.

Residents and businesses locally increasingly depend on the ability to communicate effectively online and by mobile phone. I hardly need tell anyone locally how poor mobile communication and broadband speeds are in our villages. We are not the only rural area to have been largely ignored by the service providers but I have made it one of our priorities for this year to work with WSCC to pressure providers into improving the infrastructure and the service for us.

The summer months have seen a number of changes in the Parish Office team working on your behalf. Our long serving Parish Clerk Stephen Hoyles retired at the end of July after 11 years' service and a host of

notable achievements, among them acquiring and establishing the Hurst Meadows 50 acre parkland and completing a Neighbourhood Plan for Hurstpierpoint and Sayers Common. He is replaced on an interim basis by Andy Beams who brings a wealth of previous local



government experience and will be with us for 6-8 months. Lorna Cooksey has also joined the office team as Assistant Clerk and will look after matters relating to the Council's engagement with the community. She joins the team of Helen Valler who focuses on planning and environment, Paul Mayne who looks after our finances and Nick Sinclair who manages our estates and facilities, supported by Richard Lechmere (cemetery) and Hamish Raby (maintenance).

St Lawrence Fair AGM this month

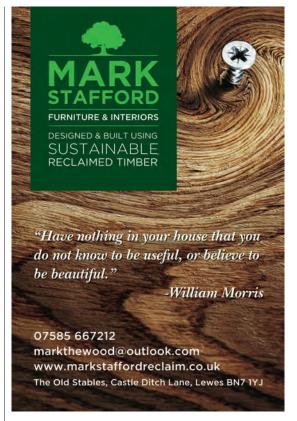

Hurstpierpoint's annual Family Bonfire & Fireworks display is taking place once again at Danny Park, off New Way Lane.

This year's event - on Sunday 3rd November - is organised by Andrew Hair from Hurstpierpoint Gymnastics Club with assistance from Oldland Mill Trust and Friends of Hassocks Infant School.

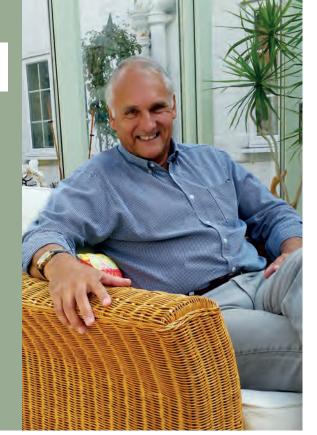

VILLAGE PEOPLE

Mike Thatcher spoke to the recently retired Parish Clerk about housing, being shot at and tsunamis.

I was apprehensive to meet Stephen. He was every bit the administrator in the run up to our getting together – times and dates were double checked, photos sent in advance - and I confess I wondered if his life story might reflect this efficiency and be somewhat dry. A terrible stereotype, I admit, and I was delighted to be proved wrong.

Born and bred in Sussex he attended Hove Grammar and continued his studies in Brighton. He briefly rented a cottage in Hurst in 1972 before a 30-year stint in Burgess Hill was bookended by a move back to the village in 2003. The role as Clerk, the senior officer at the Parish Council, was 'meant to be a part time job for a couple of years' but it essentially turned into a full time role for 11 years.

"One of my proudest moments was being able to help the council achieve its Neighbourhood Plan and we were within the first 25 in the country to do so," Stephen explained. "We couldn't say no to development, as that is not an option open to you. If you say no, the higher authorities just override you and do what they want to do. The 15 councilors themselves understood the issues and were realistic. They said we can't preserve the villages in aspic forever, we recognise that new developments will come so let's try and compromise realistically."

Being one of the first in the country to go with the Neighbourhood Plan they were able to set a robust agenda and this resulted in a number of community benefits, the most significant of these being Hurst Meadows. "That is 50 acres of parkland which is now owned by the council, covenanted against future development and it's there forever which is a great legacy. Through my 11 years at the Parish Council that is the thing I am most proud of." Other benefits of money from the new builds included upgrading the play area at South Avenue Rec and putting in the gateways at the entrances to the village.

I ventured that I was not aware the Neighbourhood Plan was responsible for Hurst Meadows. "That's a shame and getting our message out there is always a challenge for the Parish Council, as they are at the bottom of the food chain in terms of local authorities. We had a website, we had public meetings, newsletters, notice boards but we understand that a lot of people lead busy lives and perhaps don't get to notice these things."

Having studied civil engineering at Brighton, a young Stephen joined a consultant-engineering firm in London and was sent to a number of places oversees. This included Abu Dhabi with his wife Lyn and young child, to plan and install water supply systems. The Middle East in the 1970s was very different place to now and in the area they went to there were only two other Western families. The water supply was delivered by tankers. "You went out into the street and hailed down a water tanker, much as you would a taxi, and it had to be boiled and sterilised before you could drink it." A bout of malaria left him seriously ill but his appetite for the work was undiminished and as a young engineer he was happy to be sent where he was needed.

Saudi Arabia, being less Western-looking than the UAE, often proved more of a challenge. On one occasion, with two colleagues, he was doing a survey of small towns in an obscure area along the Red Sea Coast with just a tent, a 4x4 and a map for company. "In one place the local police arrested us and took us off to prison because they didn't know what we were doing. We had some letters in Arabic to explain but the police couldn't read. Eventually they found someone who could read the letter and realised we were there for good reasons and the whole thing turned around. Within an hour or so we were being invited into the local Sheik's house and were

drinking tea with him."

became shorter but not without incident. Arriving late in Dhaka one night he climbed into a tuk-tuk, clutching his bag tightly and set off into the night. After a while they approached a throng of people shouting. "I said to the driver 'Keep going, keep going!' and so he went for it. Shots were fired but we managed to get through. I asked the driver what it was and he said, 'There is a curfew sir, and that was a roadblock. But you told me to keep going!"

He reached a point when he decided he needed a career change and left the world of civil engineering behind. He joined a couple of friends and ran a bus company in London for a period. It was the Original London Sightseeing Tour with 50 open top buses running and it continues to run to this day.

After their own children had grown up and gone to university Stephen and Lyn decided that they would foster children 'while we still had the energy'. They opted for, and were trained to take, teenagers, not always the most popular age group to foster. On a number of occasions they found themselves with teens from overseas. "Often their parents or village elders decided that the best future for them would be to go to the UK to get an education. So they paid the traffickers to go on a lorry, would be dumped at the roadside and the police would pick them up. As unaccompanied minors, with no English or paperwork, they would be passed to Social Services and this is where we came in." Stephen and Lyn cared for around 12-15 over the years, although not all were trafficked; some still live in the UK and they are still in touch with a handful.

Combining his desire to help children, with his background in business and engineering led Stephen to various oversees projects, including converting buildings into childrens' homes in Romania and leading a team of gap year students to build a school in Tanzania. But it was when the world woke up to the news of the Boxing Day



 $tsunami \, that \, Stephen \, found \, himself \, in \, the \, right \, place \, at \, the \, right \, time.$

A friend of his had links in southern Thailand and asked if he could help after a school building very close to the beach had just been completely flattened. The Thais had the skills to rebuild the school so it was agreed to just raise the funds here in the UK. At the time he was chair of Oakmeads College in Burgess Hill, and in that capacity he got a round robin email from the then director of Education for the County Council saying the council would really like to do something in response to the tsunami.

"It finished by saying, 'Does anyone have any ideas how we can help and it would be really nice if it had an educational context.' That was an amazing moment and I just happened to be the catalyst to bring the two together. After that, all the schools in West Sussex, along with the police who also got involved, had the goal of building a school in Thailand and we raised a quarter of a million pounds." A year later Stephen had the privilege of flying out with his friend, the Deputy Police Commissioner and a representative from the County Council to see the completed school; a concrete frame on three stories, built on stilts with an open area at the bottom. Loudhailers were installed in the village as an early warning system and the school is now that safe place for the villagers to go to.

It struck me that there was a great deal of competition in Stephen's life for things he could be most proud of, with various projects all around the world benefiting from his contribution. But it is seeing changes and improvements on his doorstep that in the end holds sway. "In my life I've done a range of jobs in a range of circumstances and although this is just a Parish Council in a little locality it has been one of the most enjoyable and satisfying jobs I've done."

I've never been a big fan of sandwiches; all bread and no substance. So, this Do It Yourself Noodle Pot floats my boat entirely. It is also full of 'bitter greens'. These are an array of plant compounds which stimulate digestion therefore fabulous for anyone with digestive issues. These greens include rocket, watercress, endive and radicchio some of which are regularly stocked at Gibson's and can be found in their wholly natural state; unwrapped in plastic. This easy lunch has the benefit of avoiding the requirement of plastic wrapping in general; Tupperware boxes and clingfilm are replaced by a brilliantly re-useable jar. So, rest assured that your lunch is both plant-based, healthy and more eco-friendly than a shop bought sandwich.



Method

It's important to use a large heatproof jar with a well-fitting lid if you are taking this to work/school. Put the noodles in the bottom of the jar, then add all the other ingredients except the lime. Pour over enough boiling water to just cover the ingredients – about 300ml. Cover with a lid, leave to soak for 10 mins, then stir in the lime zest, juice and some seasoning and a sprinkle of sesame seeds.

The ingredients travel well (add the hot water 10 minutes prior to eating) but this is equally as tasty eaten immediately. Be sure to stir well before eating, combining the ingredients right from the bottom of the jar. Play around with the addition of different season vegetables as there are so many taste combinations. For extra protein a boiled egg sliced on top is delicious and boosts that feeling of fullness.





Autumn is just around the corner

HOGGIE HELP

Yes, the leaves are starting to drop but we are still having some lovely sunny days and it's a time when hedgehogs are eating for England to pile on the pounds ready for the big snooze.

But before that happens it's also a time when, with our warmer autumn hogs, often have a second litter but they can get caught out by early frosts and the little ones do not have enough weight on them to make it through the winter.

Hedgehogs need to be at least 550g to survive hibernation. They can often be seen out during the day trying to find food, so if you see a little hog in your garden the size of a mango or less, they may need help. Put the hog in a warm box with some newspaper and drinking water and give us a call.



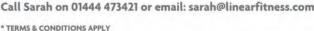
Do not wait and see, a few hours can make all the difference. It's also a good time to clean out your hog house and put in fresh hay. If you have a nesting hog in the house don't disturb it. To check the comings and goings of the house put a small stick at the doorway and check if it's moved. I also put some extra hay and dry leaves somewhere for the hogs to build up their nests. Back pain and children

The 5th - 11th October is national BackCare Awareness Week, which this year focuses on back pain experienced by children.

Like adults, children can suffer from back pain as a result of a variety of lifestyle activities. And, like adults, there are number of things that parents and carers can do to prevent issues arising.

If your child does complain of back pain, it is important to seek advice from qualified professional, such as an osteopath. An osteopath will help to establish the cause of the problem and will provide advice on treatment, or refer you for further examinations if required.

Good school bags

Children are often required to carry bags full of books, PE kits, musical instruments and other equipment to and from school. Parents should try to limit the weight of school bags as much as possible and invest in a good quality back pack that the child should wear across both shoulders, ideally with a strap across the chest to keep the load close the their body. Packing the bag with the heaviest items (such as laptops and heavy books) closest to child's body, will also make carrying more comfortable and less likely to strain the muscles of the back.

Limit screen time

Looking down to use smart phones, tablets and laptops for an extended period can pull the back and neck into an unnatural posture, resulting in pain. Placing limits on the time spent using devices and encouraging regular breaks may help to avoid problems. If your child has to use a laptop for homework, consider purchasing a support that elevates the screen to a height that allows him or her to sit up straight to look at it.

Regular exercise

A sedentary lifestyle is known to contribute to the risk of developing back pain, as well as contributing to obesity. Regular physical activity helps to keep the core muscles that support the spine strong and maintain flexibility, which will help to avoid back pain. Encourage lots of active play, walking, running, swimming, cycling etc to keep your child fit and healthy.

The right bed and pillow

Good quality sleep is vital for both physical and mental development. Make sure that your child has a good sized comfortable bed with a firm mattress and a pillow that supports their head without lifting it too high.

Osteopathic Treatment for your child's back pain Your child's back pain may benefit from osteopathic treatment. Using gentle manual therapy an osteopath will help to resolve any stresses and strains that are affecting their body and relieve their pain. They can also provide lifestyle advice that may help to prevent the problem from coming back.

Too dry or too wet

GARDENING CALENDAR

We are told that drought-tolerant plants are the solution to climate change, but it's not as simple as that. What happens when it rains? The hot, dry soils of summer, become drenched in winter. That is a problem for places such as Hurstpierpoint, where many of the gardens have clay soil. Clay bakes hard in summer and then locks in the winter rainwater, so many plants will rot. Lavender is an exemplar drought tolerant plant, needing very little water and relishing high temperatures, but on cold, wet clay soils, its leaves and roots can become 'mildewy'.

But, there are some plants that can tolerate both moist and dry conditions. The following plants are pretty indestructible:

Sedums have fleshy leaves which store water for the summer, but they also live happily in clay soils. They don't need much maintenance, are beloved of butterflies and can cope with a little shade, as well as full sun.

Buddlejas have a bad name, due to their rampant behaviour, but now there are several dwarf varieties. Take a look at Buddleja 'Buzz' by Thompson & Morgan, which get to only about 1.2m high.

Miscanthus is a grass that tolerates sun, drought and clay. Steer clear of the very large varieties unless you have plenty of space; they are very difficult to dig out if you change your mind. But smaller varieties like Kleine Silberspinne are elegant and low maintenance.

To give all these plants a helping hand and to make your soil easier to dig, add as much organic matter as you can. Plus coarse grit, which breaks up the soil particles and helps to prevent it baking hard. Clay seems difficult, but it is a very nutritious soil type and with the right plant choices your garden can thrive in both summer droughts and winter rains.

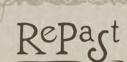

The Greatcoat by Helen Dunmore

BOOK REVIEW

This novel by the late Helen Dunmore is classified as 'horror' in our library catalogue, but Dunmore's work often has dark undertones and this should appeal to her usual readers.

Set in Yorkshire in the austerity of the post-war years, this haunting tale is the story of a young woman adjusting to married life. Uncomfortable with her status as a doctor's wife, Isabel Carey feels out of her depth and her husband doesn't seem to understand how adrift she has become.

Alone all day, with an unfriendly landlady upstairs, Isabel retreats into sleep using as a blanket an old RAF greatcoat that she finds hidden away in their rented flat. The owner of the coat is Alec, who was once based at the local airfield. He taps at Isabel's window in search of what he left behind and the pair become close, but there is a complication: Alec is dead.

Helen Dunmore writes cold places so well (see also 'A Spell of Winter' and 'The Siege') and the period details are a timely reminder of how the war that began eighty years ago cast shadows over the lives of ordinary people long after it ended.

I have lived in the Sussex area for most of my life, and am now based in the beautiful village of Hurstpierpoint.

Thank you for all your enquiries about your recycling. By the time you read this I will have replied individually to all your emails. Do keep the questions coming...

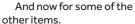
Plastic recycling is the most frequent question in my post bag and topic of questions when I am out giving a talk.

So, what plastic can I recycle?

If it has come from your bathroom or kitchen and if it is a bottle then YES. Clean, dry and loose please with the tops removed. The tops are too small for our mechanised sorting. Place tops in the rubbish bin or give to charity.

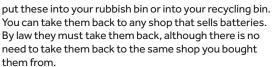


Is it a tub or a tray then YES. Again, clean, dry and loose and with tops separate. To be big enough for sorting, top needs to be jam jar lid size or greater. We want all colours, as you can see. We can recycle black plastic in West Sussex, we have the technology!



We can recycle take away coffee cups and lids in West Sussex. We can recycle 'Tetra Packs', even with windows and can recycle window envelopes.

Finally I would like to mention batteries - do NOT

Every three minutes someone in the UK develops dementia. It is fast becoming the country's biggest healthcare challenge, fuelling the launch of a high-profile media campaign calling for the Government to put an end to the dementia social care crisis. Hurst Life takes a closer look at the condition and what is being done locally to support people with dementia.

Dementia is a disease in its own right. This myth was quickly dispelled by a passionate and proactive group of individuals who make up the Alzheimer's Society Mid Sussex Dementia Forum. I joined them at their meeting at the Age UK Centre in Haywards Heath where I discovered that dementia is, in fact, the name for a group of symptoms. These commonly include: problems with memory, thinking, problem-solving, language and perception. It is caused by different diseases which damage the brain by causing nerve cells to die. Alzheimer's disease is the most common form of dementia - accounting for approximately 60% of people with the disease. However, it is not the only one. Other types of dementia include vascular dementia, mixed dementia, dementia with Lewy bodies and frontotemporal dementia (including Pick's disease). Everyone experiences dementia in their own way. The specific symptoms will depend on the parts of the brain that are damaged and the disease that is causing the dementia. Other factors include the relationships people have with friends and family, the treatment and support they get and their surroundings.

Dementia currently affects more than 850,000 people in the UK, with an estimated 14,100 people living with the condition in West Sussex. Although it is most common in older people, dementia is not a natural part of ageing. It is a separate and distinct set of illnesses that can affect people of any age. More than 40,000 people

under 65 in the UK are living with early onset dementia. It is a progressive condition meaning that symptoms become more severe over time. There is currently no cure but treatments can slow the progression of the symptoms in some people. Tim Wilkins from Alzheimer's Society, who facilitates the Mid Sussex Dementia Forum, is quick to highlight a growing network of individuals who are working together across West Sussex to raise awareness and push for reform to improve the lives of people affected by dementia. He said: "People are diagnosed with dementia through the NHS Memory Assessment Service. Once they are diagnosed, support and information is available from a number of organisations, including Alzheimer's Society."

The Mid Sussex Dementia Forum is one of five Alzheimer's Society Focus on Dementia groups in West Sussex. It supports and works alongside other organisations, like The Haywards Heath Dementia Action Alliance (HHDAA), encouraging local businesses, schools and other organisations to become more dementia-friendly. "Our members are a brilliant group of people from a range of backgrounds," said Tim. "They are doing their best to live well with dementia. Their thoughts, ideas and experiences are much in demand to inform research, change attitudes and improve services for people affected by dementia. They are passionate about creating a more dementia-friendly community for all."



Peter and Jennifer Diack

Sussex resident Peter Diack, 78, became a member of the Mid Sussex Dementia Forum following a diagnosis of dementia with Lewy bodies in October 2017. He said: "My symptoms started off mildly at first. I found it difficult to recall events that took place only weeks earlier and had to start writing details down in a diary. I started to forget people's names - these would be good friends I'd known for years. I knew them by sight but suddenly it was becoming more difficult to recall their names. People were kind and told me that everybody has memory loss but I felt embarrassed and irritated that I was not able to remember. As the symptoms progressed I found it difficult to follow instructions clearly and would have to ask people to repeat themselves. This came with a general feeling of disorientation. I was coherent before but find it hard to be naturally coherent now. I've lost a level of control. I would be at a total loss without my wife Jennifer by my side. Dementia is a difficult word - it frightens people out of their minds, especially in the early stages. In the past a common reaction, following a diagnosis, would have been to hide away and disappear from the world. Too many people fall into that trap of thinking, but I want to reassure them that a dementia diagnosis is not the end of the world. It is not the end of life. It's important to be positive and to stay active. The Mid Sussex group has been my salvation in many ways. I feel at ease, included and able to relate to the people there. I feel that I have a purpose and can use my experience to contribute my thoughts and ideas to help push an important campaign to help people live well with dementia. This has been deeply significant for me."

As the UK population ages the number of people with dementia will climb rapidly. It is estimated that by 2025 more than one million people in the UK will have dementia. Campaigners argue that the only way to beat the condition is through research. In 2015 Join Dementia Research was launched as a national service which allows people to register their interest in participating in dementia research and be matched to suitable studies. Vital studies into early diagnosis, prevention and new treatments are making progress – but more volunteers are needed. Anyone over the age of 18, with or without dementia, can register their interest as a volunteer. Need to know...

Alzheimer's disease: Abnormal structures called 'plaques' and 'tangles' build up inside the brain. These disrupt how nerve cells work and communicate with each other and eventually cause them to die. There is also a shortage of some important chemicals in the brain, which means that messages don't travel around as well as they should.

Vascular dementia: is the second most common type of dementia, where a lack of oxygen to the brain causes nerve cells to die. This can be caused by a stroke, a series of mini strokes or a disease of the small blood yessels in the brain.

Mixed dementia: where someone has more than one type of dementia and a mix of symptoms. Alzheimer's disease and vascular dementia is the most common type.

Dementia with Lewy bodies: named after the German doctor who first identified them. Lewy bodies are tiny deposits of a protein that appear in the nerve cells in the brain. These cause a loss of connections between nerve cells, which then die.

Frontotemporal dementia (FTD): is a rare form of dementia, where clumps of abnormal protein from in the front and side parts of the brain cause the death of nerve cells. It is sometimes called Pick's disease or frontal lobe dementia.

Be afraid, be very afraid

If you're looking for a balanced article about house
spiders being misunderstood animals that actually help
to keep our homes free of flies, then you're dealing
with the wrong man. My name's Michael and I'm
arachnophobic. I know, I know. It's completely irrational.
They are totally harmless. So why, when I find all other
animals wonderful, do these eight-legged arthropods
make me so terrified that even typing their name sends
an involuntary shiver down my spine?

Is my fear, as evolutionary psychologists believe, an inbuilt self-preservation instinct inherited from the cavemen? Is it a response conditioned by a spider-fearing society? Or is it just because spiders have those creepy, long, hairy legs? All I know is, after researching this article, I'll be sleeping with the lights on 'til Christmas. I understand that some animals out there actually do have big teeth and need to be feared and respected but they can be cleverly avoided by not going snorkelling at night in the upper Amazon basin. There is no avoiding spiders. They will find you in the one place you thought was safe. Your home.

There are many spider species which have the audacity to swan into our homes uninvited but the real monsters belong to the genus Tegenaria – the house spiders. These spiders love dark, cool places so when humans invented 'indoors' they happily followed us inside. There's an easy way to identify the Tegenaria spiders. If you're hyperventilating, swearing and sobbing while stood on a chair then you've found one.

There are five Tegenaria species but the big daddy of the bunch is Tegenaria parietina, also known as The Cardinal Spider (named after Cardinal Wolsey, who apparently lived in fear of one of the eight-legged horrors of Hampton Court creeping up his cassock). Its leg span can reach a whopping five inches.

Tegenaria are most active in the autumn. The mature males scuttle scarily along the skirting board looking for a bigger, even more frightening female. After mating, he dies and then she eats him. A simple relationship but

suitably horrific. She'll then saunter around your house, giving you a minor heart attack as she passes by, before finding somewhere dark and cool to hole up until she lays her eggs in the spring. So, to all the spider-lovers out there who come to our rescue with a glass and a bit of card, I salute you. To the rest of us, I have no words of consolation. Oh, and while you were reading this, I think I saw a really big one crawling behind your sofa.

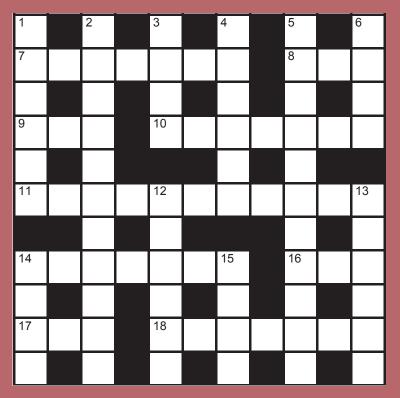
