# Is there a doctor in the house?

Hurst resident Kevin Carey has been awarded an honorary doctorate from the University of York in recognition of his service to disabled people throughout the world for more than forty years and for pioneering work to improve the life chances of blind children in particular. The award also recognises his work in the university's Department of Computer Science, his lectures to students studying for their masters' degrees and his research.

After attending both Cambridge and Harvard Universities, he worked as a BBC journalist and then joined Sightsavers International (formerly the Royal Commonwealth Society for the Blind), becoming Overseas Director before leaving to set up

his own IT consultancy. He has always been passionate about improving the life chances of visually impaired children in poor countries, commenting that: "After all, I was a blind child myself."

He has advised the UK Government and the EU Commission, sat on the Content Board of Ofcom and has achieved numerous awards in recognition of his



lifetime of service. He is currently chair of the World Braille Council.

Kevin's braille computer, absolutely essential for his working and cultural life, is supplied by the Government's Access to Work programme and costs around £4.000. This makes it out of the reach of children and students in poor countries, something that Kevin has always considered unacceptable. In 2011 he promised to find a way to cut the cost of braille computers by 90%. He was, of course, told he was mad and that it couldn't be done. Undeterred, Kevin put together a global consortium of organisations working with blind people worldwide and raised the \$1.5m needed for the research. In

2018 the first little Orbit 20 braille computer came out of the factory in India at the cost of about \$400! A year or so later, almost 2,000 blind children in East Africa have an Orbit computer, which allows them to read braille, type, access the internet, play games and have equal status with their sighted classmates. Something Kevin is both pleased and proud about!

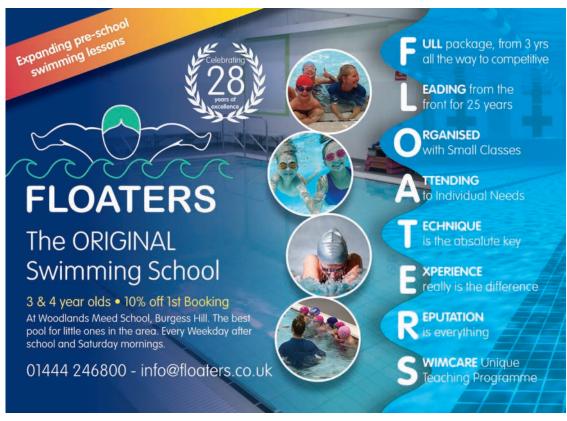

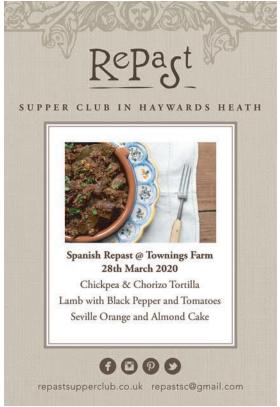
# Robert Harris Fair Talk to follow AGM

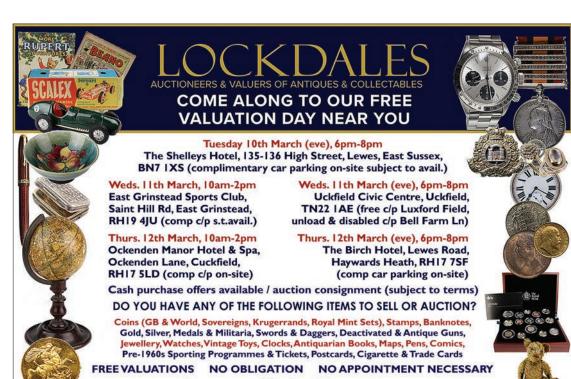

When I arrived in Sayers Common in 1989 to improve my English language, I was far from thinking that I would come across places in England with the same name as my surname. Very early on in my stay, I noticed the village of Hurstpierpoint on one of my walks. I was very surprised and really interested in finding any connection with my family.

I decided to visit Lewes library, which I was told was one of the best places to find information about the area. I spent a whole day amongst old books and registers only to find that there is so much information to look at that it would take a very long time to ascertain whether Hurstpierpoint has any link with my family. There were various spellings of the name such as: Pierpont, Pierrepont, Pier Point, Pereppount, Perepond, Perpount. To this date I have no idea if these names all have the same root rather than various spelling due to the authors' inconsistent spelling.

When I visited the little village church,
Holy Trinity, with my parents who came to
visit me during the year I spent in Sayers Common, we
saw the two effigies of what is thought to be Sir Simon
de Pierpoint in 13th century chain armour and 14th
century plate armour. We were so fascinated that we
asked the lady who was present in the church at the time
and she led us to a gentleman who lived opposite the

church. This gentleman, whose name escapes me after 30 years, welcomed us with open arms and we had a long chat with him over a cup of tea. It was so interesting listening to him that we left his company with a strong desire to find out more about Hurstpierpoint.

As many will know, Hurstpierpoint derives its name from the Anglo-Saxon 'hyrst' – a wood, hill or clearing and 'Pierpoint' from an old Norman family who came from a place of that name in Picardy with William the Conqueror in 1066. Throughout the centuries there have been several variants on the Hurstpierpoint name e.g. Herst (11th century); Herstperpunt (14th century); Perpondesherst (15th century).

There are actually three villages
'Pierrepont' in Picardy, Northern France
and at least one village Pierpont in the
South of Belgium.

There were formerly three parks in and around Hurstpierpoint: Great Park, Little Park and Danny Park, only the last of which

exists now. The ancient manor of Hurstpierpoint was held in 1086 by Robert de Pierpoint, who obtained a licence from William de Warenne, and it stayed in the family until approximately 1359. Of the manor, sadly there are no traces left. The old manor house was burnt down.



The Pierpoint name is used in many aspects of the village such as: Pierpoint Close, The Pierpoint pub which was situated on Western Road (this pub was previously known as The Chinese Garden), Pierpoint Lodge, Pierpoint Terrace, Hurstpierpoint College and also some properties with that name around Hurstpierpoint and its surroundings.

On further investigation on the internet, there is a Pierpoint family branch also spelt Pierrepont who were landowners in Nottinghamshire and came originally from Pierrepont, near Grandcourt in Picardy, and settled at Hurstpierpoint in Sussex soon after the Conquest.

Furthermore Holme-Pierrepont, one ancient seat and burial place of the family, stands three miles south-east from Nottingham and 98 miles north from London. The arms adopted by the Nottinghamshire Pierpoints constituted a silver or white background, with a number of red cinquefoils (five leaf decorations) dotted over it, and a black lion rampant (upright on two feet, facing away).

And in the 1086 Domesday Survey, Robert was recorded as an undertenant of William de Warenne, along with (presumably) his brother Godfrey, in lands in Sussex and Suffolk (Lordships of Henestede and Wretham). He may have had another brother, Reynald.

Some members of the family even settled in Americal We are now in 2020 and the Pierpont family is still around. I have been living in Hassocks since 2014 and I believe that there are other people with that name or with a similar spelling of the name living in the area. I would be interested in finding possible family connections with the very first Sir Simon de Pierpoint and any other person with that name. If you have the same desire or you are a keen historian with knowledge of the area, please do get in touch via the editor of Hurst Life.

## David creates charity jazz night at Danny

A Hurstpierpoint heart patient has helped to organise a fundraising concert for the British Heart Foundation.

Last February David Roberts believed he was very

fit with no prospect of a heart problem until, suddenly, he had severe heart palpitations and soon found himself with heart medication and a sophisticated ICD pacemaker implanted in his chest.

He explains: "I have since learnt that funding from the British Heart Foundation went into the development of the first pacemakers as well as the early development of clotbusting drugs and statins. Today the British Heart Foundation is funding more than half of all research into heart and circulatory disease in this country, investing around £100 million

each year. There is still much to be understood about the heart and circulatory diseases like strokes and vascular dementia, their causes, prevention and treatment."

As a result of his experience and research David asked his singer wife Julie if she would perform for a fundraiser concert. She obliged and will be joined by pianistarranger-composer, Michael Hinton from Ditchling, when they perform in the Great Hall of Danny House.

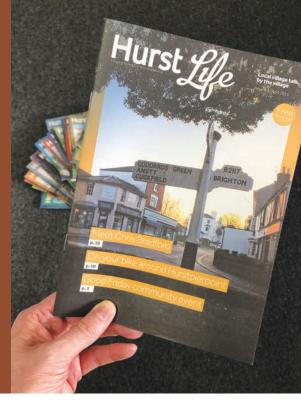
In some ways it feels like ages since we launched Hurst Life five years ago, but then I also ask myself 'where did that time go?'.

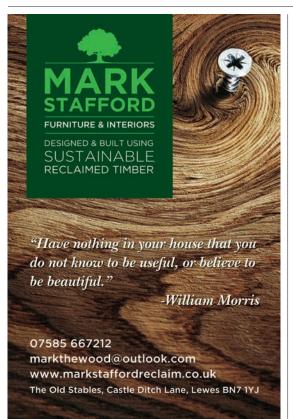

I sat next to two vets giving a paper on the stresses of keeping hogs in care. Like most mammals they have quite different personalities. The last two hogs in my care were totally different. Primrose a shy, quiet girl, but Arthur a gregarious friendly boy. #### **HURST VILLAGE CINEMA**

Having said that we had all our equipment in place with new screen, amplifier and ceiling speakers, we have since added a new centre speaker to make all dialogue crystal clear. We also addressed feedback that the subtitles were slightly low with the new seating arrangements, and they have now been raised.

So we are all set for three very different films for you in March, starting on Thursday 12th at 8pm with Maborosi (12A). Here is a rare chance to see the 1995 debut film by the Japanese giant of World Cinema, Hirokazu Kore-eda (Our Little Sister, Shoplifters, Afterlife, Still Walking). The film never had a UK cinema release when it first came out and we are delighted to have the chance to screen it. This exquisitely beautiful film follows the spiritual odyssey of Yumiko, a young Japanese woman recovering from her husband's inexplicable suicide. Several years pass, and Yumiko takes the train from Osaka to Noto, a fishing village on the Sea of Japan, to marry a widower in a match arranged by a friend.

Complete change of mood for Fisherman's Friends (12A) on Sunday 15th March at 3pm. A fast-living, cynical London music executive (Danny Mays) heads to a remote Cornish village on a stag weekend where he's pranked by his boss (Noel Clarke) into trying to sign a group of shanty singing fishermen (led by James Purefoy). He becomes the ultimate 'fish out of water' as he struggles to gain the respect or enthusiasm of the unlikely boy band and their families (including Tuppence Middleton) who value friendship and community over fame and fortune.

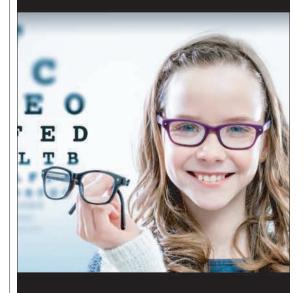
Finally, the extraordinary **Bait** on **Friday 27th March** at **8pm**. This abrasive seaside parable is a quietly thrilling piece of film-making. Cornish writer-director Mark Jenkin has conjured up something truly arresting: a debut film rooted in local traditions, with a dark humour and an atmosphere that's as brooding as its Atlantic backdrop.

Its central character is scowling Cornish fisherman Martin. He's a fundamentally good-hearted man who nurses a bundle of unexpressed grudges over the flood of new money into his fishing village. His equally gruff brother uses their dad's old trawler to take tourists on pleasure cruises, while the family's quayside home has been sold to the kind of well-heeled urbanites Martin so resents. To add insult to injury, they've installed a porthole.

'Bait' is a story of gentrification and class friction that builds and builds, But it has deeper currents too, as Jenkin explores the day-to-day slog of maintaining a generations-old way of life and the near-spiritual pain of being prised, like a barnacle off a rock, from your place in life by forces beyond your control. As visually distinctive as it is narratively satisfying, Bait is a thrillingly original and uniquely enriching drama.

Six friends from Hurstpierpoint are heading across The Channel to compete in the Paris Marathon at the beginning of April, mainly for fun but also to raise money for good causes. All mothers of children at St Lawrence, Mike Thatcher caught up with Katie Sharp, Michaela Oakley, Catherine Ferrer, Clare Harms, Sarah Shephard and Clare Bell to find out more.

#### How are you training for the event?

MO: My training consists of three runs each week, including one longer run. It takes a lot of motivation to get up on the cold, dark and wet winter mornings and this has been my biggest challenge in training, but the runs around our village on a gorgeous sunny day with views of the Danny Estate, Jack and Jill windmills and the Downs make it all worthwhile.

CF: I am training for the marathon by following a plan written for me by Hassocks runner Malcolm Roweth; his support and expertise have really progressed my running. I am approaching this marathon with a lot more confidence in my running ability and knowing that I am training appropriately.

#### How long have you been running?

SS: I started the 'Couch to 5K' podcasts in May 2017 and completed my first 5k in July. It became a bit addictive!

MO: I got into running around two years ago. I started six months after having my third child to regain fitness but found it really helped me mentally too. I completed my first half marathon in 2018 and first marathon in 2019.

#### Do you run alone?

CF: I sometimes run alone but I have a lovely group of friends that I do the long training runs with. I can't talk on the tempo runs so we either do those in silence (or the sound of me struggling for breath and/or muttering profanities) or on our own.

CH: Quite often yes - I love the solitude. I enjoy running with friends too though! SS: We run together whenever we can. It's not always possible, unfortunately, as we're all juggling work, childcare, etc. I always prefer to run with others on the longer ones, but when I'm on my own I stick headphones in and listen to music and podcasts.

#### Why do you run?

CB: When my second daughter was four months old, I realised I was struggling to adjust to life, and I was diagnosed with postnatal depression a month later. The diagnosis was a wake-up call for me; I hadn't realised how unwell I had become. It was this that prompted me to take up running in a bid to try and improve my mental health before considering whether I needed medication. Thankfully running gave me the headspace I needed, so for me it was absolutely the right path.

SS: I started the 'Couch to 5k' because I felt really unfit; I hadn't lost the weight I put on when I had children. Once my youngest was four, I realised this was no longer 'baby weight' but simply greed! Running 5k seemed impossible when I started, but I loved that running gave me headspace and a rush of endorphins I'd never experienced before. In a year I lost over two stone, and I now feel healthier physically and mentally than I ever have before. I've also made some fantastic friends.

CF: I was a dance teacher for years before having children and found that my job kept me healthy and active, after having three children in 2½ years (twins second time around) I gave up teaching dance and lost my fitness. I lost myself a little in those earlier years surrounded by the demands of a young family and lost confidence in my own identity or where I belonged. Running has given me back my fitness and confidence, a little something that is just for me. It's also given me friendships that aren't just focused on whether my kids like yours. In my experience a running friend becomes a very close friend.

CH: I run for so many reasons, but mainly because I love it! It's my 'me time' and good for my soul. It also comes with obvious health and fitness benefits, and it's a very convenient form of exercise - all you need is some well-fitting running shoes.

#### What has been your biggest challenge?

SS: In the beginning I only ran alone - it took me a while before I felt I was 'good enough' to run with anybody else. Running with others felt like a huge step for me, and I'm so glad I took it. Also, last summer I developed hip bursitis, which was really painful. I kept ignoring it, hoping it would go away, but eventually had to concede defeat. Not running felt really tough - it made me realise how much I now rely on it for my sanity and wellbeing.

CF: It was training for Brighton Marathon last year. My dad ran a marathon before he died and I wanted to follow in his footsteps, running for such an emotional cause.

CH Definitely overcoming an injury to my Achilles' tendon in 2018. It stopped me running for six months, which affected me a lot. I then spent another six months very gradually building my running fitness back up. It taught me a lot about self-belief and I am now a completely different runner! Fitter, stronger and faster - as well as much more focused on looking after myself with warming-up, stretching, nutrition and strength training.

CB: The biggest challenge I have faced training for this race has come from picking up an injury to my knee in December. I have had to run on a treadmill for the past two months to reduce the impact, which has set me back hugely and reduced my time expectations for the big day!

#### What tips and advice would you like to give other runners?

SS: Don't ignore it when something hurts! Also, even a bad run is good for you (a mantra I repeat in my head when a run feels tough).

MO: On long distance runs don't overthink how far you want to go; your body is capable of running further than your mind lets you believe!

CF: Just get out there, it is the most mind clearing and calming activity I have ever done. A run can shift my mood for the better for the rest of the day. I would say it's like free therapy but marathon training does mean lots of new shoes, and not the beautiful strappy type!

CH: Enjoy it! Look after yourself - get some decent properly fitted trainers, warm up well before every run and take the time to properly stretch afterwards.

We wish them all best and the last word goes to Clare Harms, which may ring a bell with many readers: "I hated running at school (hiding from the teachers on cross-countrys!), and I only started running after signing up for my first 5k for a laugh with a friend! I couldn't even get to the end of the road without getting a stitch, but after I trained and ran that first 5k the sense of achievement got me hooked!"

Cake also brings people together as it is generally eaten in company, shared over a long chat and a cup of tea, so it is high time for a recipe to fit the bill. Baking is good for the soul and avoids the buying of processed foods, which are full of additives. My general rule when buying food is to check the ingredient list. Is there anything I don't recognise or anything I would not add to my own home cooking? If so then it goes back on the shelf.

In this recipe the wonderfully earthy flavours of beetroot are added to the dark bitterness of high cocoa content chocolate and sweetened with sugar, so clearly it will taste incredible and needs to be eaten in guilt-free moderation. Enjoy.



#### Method

Grease a shallow baking tin, approximately 20 x 25cm, and line the base with baking parchment.

Put the butter and chocolate in a heatproof bowl. Set the oven at 180°C/Gas Mark 4 and put the bowl in it for a few minutes until the chocolate and butter start to melt.

Stir, then pop back into the oven for a few more minutes until entirely melted.

Whisk the eggs and sugar together in a large bowl until combined, then beat in the melted chocolate and butter until smooth.

Combine the salt with the flour, sift them over the chocolate mixture, then gently fold in with a large metal

spoon. Fold in the grated beetroot and hazelnuts – be careful not to over-mix or it will make the brownies tough.

Pour the mixture into the prepared tin and smooth the top with a spatula. Bake for 20-25 minutes. To check that the brownies are done, a knife or skewer inserted in the centre should come out with only a few moist crumbs clinging to it.

If they are overcooked they will be dry so keep an eye on the time. Remove the tin from the oven and leave on a wire rack to cool before cutting into moderate squares.

## My Sister the Serial Killer by Oyinkan Braithwaite

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

Set in Lagos, this is a darkly comic story of sibling rivalry and multiple murders.

Korede is very protective of, but infuriated by, her younger sister Ayoola. Ayoola is beautiful, lazy and attracts men to her effortlessly, while Korede is a hardworking nurse, who compares her looks unfavourably with her sister's. Both sisters have man problems: Korede has a long-standing crush on one of the doctors at the hospital and Ayoola's boyfriends keep ending up dead.

When Ayoola comes to Korede's workplace she catches the eye of Korede's crush Korede is desperate to keep them from getting together. Is she scared of losing the man she desires to her sister – or scared of what may happen to him if Ayoola is, indeed, a serial killer?

Korede finds her life becoming ever more complicated and confides her worries to her favourite patient, a wonderful listener who never judges her and who keeps her secrets – that he's in a coma is a small drawback, but it helps her to get things off her chest...

This is a novel that defies classification. The closest I can get is to suggest that you imagine how the Coen brothers would adapt Chimanda Ngozi Adichie's 'Purple Hibiscus'...

# A world within your headset

Although there have been some critically acclaimed successes on VR platforms, there is still a hesitancy when it comes to fully committing to VR. Valve, the developers of the aforementioned Index, recently shocked the gaming community by announcing that the continuation of their beloved Half Life series will be a VR exclusive.

With Half Life 1 and 2 both holding a 96% review on Metacritic the popularity of the series cannot be questioned, but by only releasing on one specific platform (a platform that most cannot physically buy at present) are they potentially alienating a large amount of their previous customer base?

Despite some other exciting releases planned for 2020 my personal belief is whilst the price point remains this high it will still be a large barrier of entry for most; reserved for one off occasions with friends etc rather than an industry defining revolution.

Video games offer a form of escapism to me (along with many others no doubt) and are often used as a way to relax. Although my fiancée would likely encourage me to don a headset and free up the TV for some more reality shows, she certainly wouldn't encourage me to spend thousands of pounds to do it.

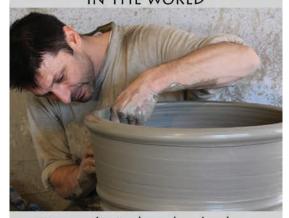

## Experiment with spring Irises

#### **GARDENING CALENDAR**

I am always on the look out for new planting ideas, especially when I see plants defying what the books say they should do.

Iris reticulata looks a delicate little thing, especially when grown as a prized specimen, nurtured alone in a decorative pot and placed in its favourite position in full sun. So I was surprised to see it recently, growing happily at the base of a tree. It was in sun, but it was also in grass. I imagine the iris was relishing the dry soil in amongst the tree roots and, at the same time, those conditions would be keeping the grass from swamping the little iris plants. The downside of trying this experiment might be that iris reticulata is not a great 'increaser'; having spread a little, the clumps tend to stop flowering and need dividing and adding to in order to maintain the display.

The more traditional way to grow them is in a rockery or at the front of a border, where the fresh blues, purples, whites and creams can be enjoyed fully, in the wintery months of January, February and March.

They are prone to slug predation, so mulching with grit is a good idea. I use them in gravel gardens, along with other drought-tolerant plants, such as thymes, oregano, lamb's ears and scabious.

Dry bulbs can be planted from Sept. to Nov. about 10-12cm apart and at a depth of about 8cm. But you will also find potted plants available now. If you have heavy clay soil, add some grit into the soil, to help with the drainage.

After flowering don't chop the leaves off, but allow them to replenish the bulbs with nutrients and help them along with a high potash feed.

In that way your spring irises will continue to delight you with spots of bright pastel colours in the earliest months of the year.

#### Hurstpierpoint's Safe Place Initiative; Dementia Friendly Community.

The Parish Council is working hard to ensure that our community is inclusive and safe for all and that people suffering with dementia feel understood and able to carry on with their daily routines.

We are therefore setting up a 'Safe Place' scheme in Hurstpierpoint. This scheme will allow anyone with dementia to know that there are designated 'safe places' they can go to collect their thoughts, have a chat or just a cup of tea with someone who will listen.

We have six High Street shops, the Health Centre and the Parish Office already signed up to the scheme. These organisations will be given free training about dementia including how to deal with different situations and how to support someone who is confused or lost. 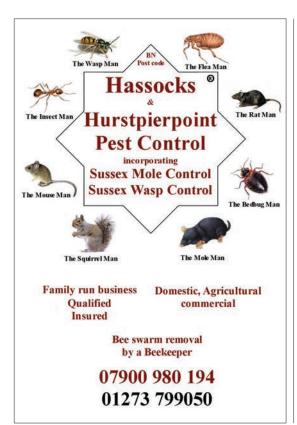

## Life-saving knowledge

## Where's your nearest defibrillator?

At Hurst Life we'd like to encourage everyone living and working in the village to familiarise themselves with the sites of the life-saving defibrillator machines and learn how to use them.

An estimated 60,000 people each year in the UK have an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest and, sadly, less than 10% of those people will survive. Yet if a bystander is able to start CPR they could double a person's chances of survival.

As far as we know, Hurstpierpoint has four machines: One on the outside wall at the Fairfield Rec on Cuckfield Road, another is situated at the Bowls Club on South Avenue Rec, a third is inside the Medical Centre on Trinity Road and the final defib machine is mounted on the wall in the alleyway between Morley's and Olive on the High Street. In Sayers Common there is one on the outside wall of the Community Shop (by the door to the hall). While in Albourne there is one inside the Primary School, in the gym of Wickwoods Country Club (up Shaves Wood Lane) and one mounted on the outside wall of Albourne Village Hall, to the right of the entrance doors. Not all of

these will be available 24/7 but the outside ones listed (right) should be.

All of the machines are portable and contain full instructions, but why not give yourself a head start with an online tutorial?

The Resuscitation Council (UK) has produced plenty of information to help us all learn more about what to do in these dramatic and highly pressured times, should we find ourselves involved.

You can watch videos and play interactive games to increase your understanding. You can even download an app - see www.resus.org.uk/apps/lifesaver for more information.

Please give it a go. With our emergency services so overworked, we as communities can get better at helping ourselves, and it really does make a difference.

If you have any information about changes to these defibrillators, then do please let us know, so we can update this mag for next time.

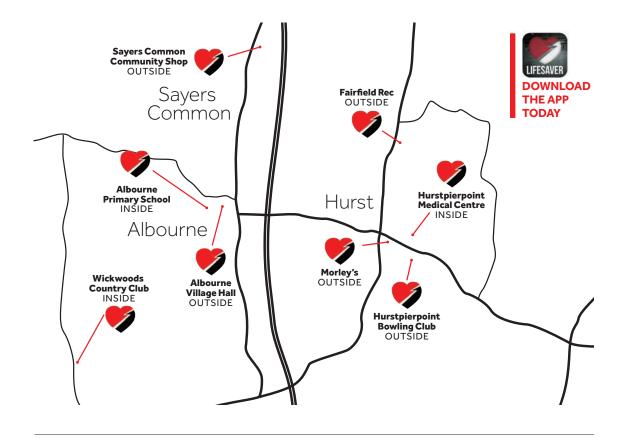

The Trust, which manages the Millennium Garden, will close down at the end of this month and the future maintenance of the garden will be controlled by the Parish Council as part of the larger area of Hurst Meadows. David Brown, Trust Chairman, explains more...

Over the past 20 years the Trust has achieved its objective of creating a peaceful and beautiful natural haven in the centre of the village, much loved by walkers and nature lovers of all ages. But, we are now convinced that the security of the garden will best be ensured by integrating its upkeep into the publicly funded and managed Hurst Meadows.

The idea for the garden first arose in 1996 with the closure of St George's Home for the Elderly, owned by West Sussex County Council. Rumours abounded about the future of both the house and its substantial garden. A village campaign, spearheaded by Susanna Kemp, quickly raised over £6,000 and eventually the newly formed Trust was granted a 60 year lease to manage an area of 1.7 acres, to be known as the St George's Millennium Garden.

To create a 'normal' garden with flower beds, shrubs etc was clearly not affordable nor practical, so a management plan was agreed and has remained basically unchanged since. It is a wildlife garden with minimal intervention and with a focus on encouraging as much native flora as possible. Some areas have proved a challenge because of the heavy clay soil, but the small meadow at the Medical Centre end, which was largely an old concrete yard, has proven to be a great area for a succession of cowslips, red campion and oxeye daisies.

An unusual aspect of the central part of the garden is the presence of a number of Bramley apple trees. We think that they must have been planted in 1940 or so when the Government ordered landowners to convert some of their land to food production. These trees continue to produce fine cooking apples.

We received bad news in early 2016 with a report that the iconic Monterey Pine near St George's Church had become dangerous, and so we had no choice but to have it felled - a massive task (and expense!) apart from the genuine grief at losing this 120 year old tree. However, some sculptures, created by a local tree sculptor, have enabled the tree to live on in the shape of three wise owls and various other animal figures. I am also pleased to say that a seedling from the tree is now growing well in a quiet part of the garden.



It has been a real pleasure in recent years to have children from St Lawrence Primary School coming to the garden to learn and play as part of the Forest Schools Project. Long may that continue.

With no public funding, except for occasional grants for special projects, we have been grateful for the support of our 90 or so members, and donations from local residents. And, above all, I should like to thank the volunteers who have responded to calls for help with the various tasks necessary to maintain a level of control over this beautiful place. I am confident that it will remain a prized asset for many decades to come.

No specific formal qualifications are needed but patience, resilience, empathy and a sense of humour are essential.



Having a criminal record is not necessarily a barrier and each application will be considered on an individual basis.

We're looking for applicants who are at a reasonably stable point in their lives and who don't expect any major changes in their circumstances over the next six to 12 months.

Volunteers receive training and ongoing support, including peer support with other mentors.

All sorts of people, from all walks of life, are mentors for all sorts of reasons.

One volunteer says: "Some people do it [mentoring] to give something back, but for me the greatest reward is to be part of the process as someone turns their life around; and to interact and learn from the young people themselves."

## **New Homelessness Strategy for Mid Sussex**

Mid Sussex District Council has produced a new strategy to prevent homelessness and help homeless people find long-term affordable and sustainable housing.

The new Homelessness and Rough Sleeper Strategy was presented to the Council's Scrutiny Committee for Housing, Planning and Economic Development in January. At the meeting, Committee Members recommended that the strategy be formally adopted by Full Council on 1st April.

The new Homelessness and Rough Sleeper Strategy identifies five key priorities for addressing homelessness within Mid Sussex:

#### 1) Preventing and relieving homelessness

The most effective way to minimise the impact of homelessness is to prevent it occurring in the first place. The Council helps residents at risk to ensure they are receiving all the benefits and support to which they are entitled. When homelessness cannot be avoided, Rent in Advance and Deposit Guarantee Schemes can help local people to find somewhere new. Over the last five years, Mid Sussex District Council has helped over 470 households obtain housing through the private rented sector.

## 2) Minimise the use of and improve temporary accommodation

Being in temporary accommodation can be a stressful experience, particularly if the accommodation is located away from support networks, health care, employment and schools. The Council is committed to providing more temporary accommodation within Mid Sussex and enabling households to move on to a settled home as soon as possible.

#### 3) Prevent recurring homelessness

Housing Officers work with people in temporary accommodation to ensure that appropriate support is

provided, either by the Council or an external agency. The Council's Employment Co-ordinator ensures households are receiving all the benefits they are entitled to and provides advice and assistance to enable them to find employment.

## 4) Tackling rough sleeping and homelessness amongst vulnerable groups

The Council works with Turning Tides, which is a community led homelessness organisation that provides support to long-term rough sleepers and those new or at risk of rough sleeping.

## 5) Enable access to suitable and affordable accommodation

Mid Sussex District Council requires all new residential development over 11 units to provide 30% affordable housing. Last year the Council oversaw the delivery of 102 new affordable houses.

Councillor Andrew MacNaughton, Cabinet Member for Housing and Planning said: "Homelessness, in all its forms, can have a significantly detrimental impact on people and their families. Health and wellbeing suffers, there's a detrimental impact on educational achievement and homelessness can act as a barrier for those seeking and keeping employment.

"Our Homelessness and Rough Sleeper Strategy will help to ensure that fewer people in Mid Sussex experience the trauma of homelessness and that those who do can find a settled home as quickly as possible."

#### Seals suprise Lewes residents!

Legend has it that it's been visiting Lewes for years. There have been sightings from Southease all the way up to Barcombe. In January, John glimpsed it vanishing into the murky waters of the River Ouse near Tesco. A few months later, Barry was on his way to work when he encountered the creature hauled out on a pontoon by the Cuilfail cliffs. You'll find 38 species of wild mammal living in or around Lewes. Badgers, foxes, stoats, weasels, shrews, rabbits, hares, moles, voles, dormice, bats, rats, hedgehogs, mice and mink all form the mammalian fauna of a landlocked South Downs town. Yet there's one salty surprise on the list; the Common Seal, an animal that's typically found in Britain's coastal waters 12 kilometres away.

And the seal's certainly a surprise to any Lewes residents who, while innocently strolling along the Ouse, encounter their local leviathan. I've never seen the legendary beast myself but have received plenty of excited tweets, emails and mobile phone photos from amazed observers who can't believe what they've seen.

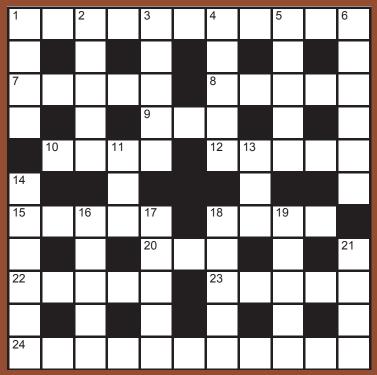

#### **RECYCLE THIS...**

Colin McFarlin is a Volunteer Waste Prevention Advisor with West Sussex County Council. He went along to meet Carol Comber and find out about her recycling.



So, Carol, how did your recycling journey start?
My recycling story began with a visit from you (Colin) to the Village Sustainability Group that I belong to, back in October 2018. Your enthusiasm set us all on a mission!

I immediately started a bag that would be filled with stretchy plastic to go back to the supermarket, and began collecting any textiles because these can



go to the charity shops marked 'rags' for which they get money!

In November 2018, the sustainability group arranged a trip to the black bin recycling plant in Horsham. We all learnt so much about what happens to our black bin contents.

Inspired after a visit to the Ford Recycling Centre in April last year, in July I ran a recycling information stall at a local Flower Show with a quiz and a game of 'Black Bin or Blue?'.

I continue to encourage my family to improve our recycling habits; the cry of 'Can this be recycled?' rings out in our household regularly. We are not perfect, but we have come a long way over the last couple of years, and our Blue bin contents far exceed that of our Black bin now.

Our village has a fruit and vegetable sharing scheme where, in the summer, people can place their excess veg etc from their gardens or allotments on our lovely trolley and others can take the produce. All free!! Just a way to help reduce food waste when successful gardeners have produced a bit too much!!!
